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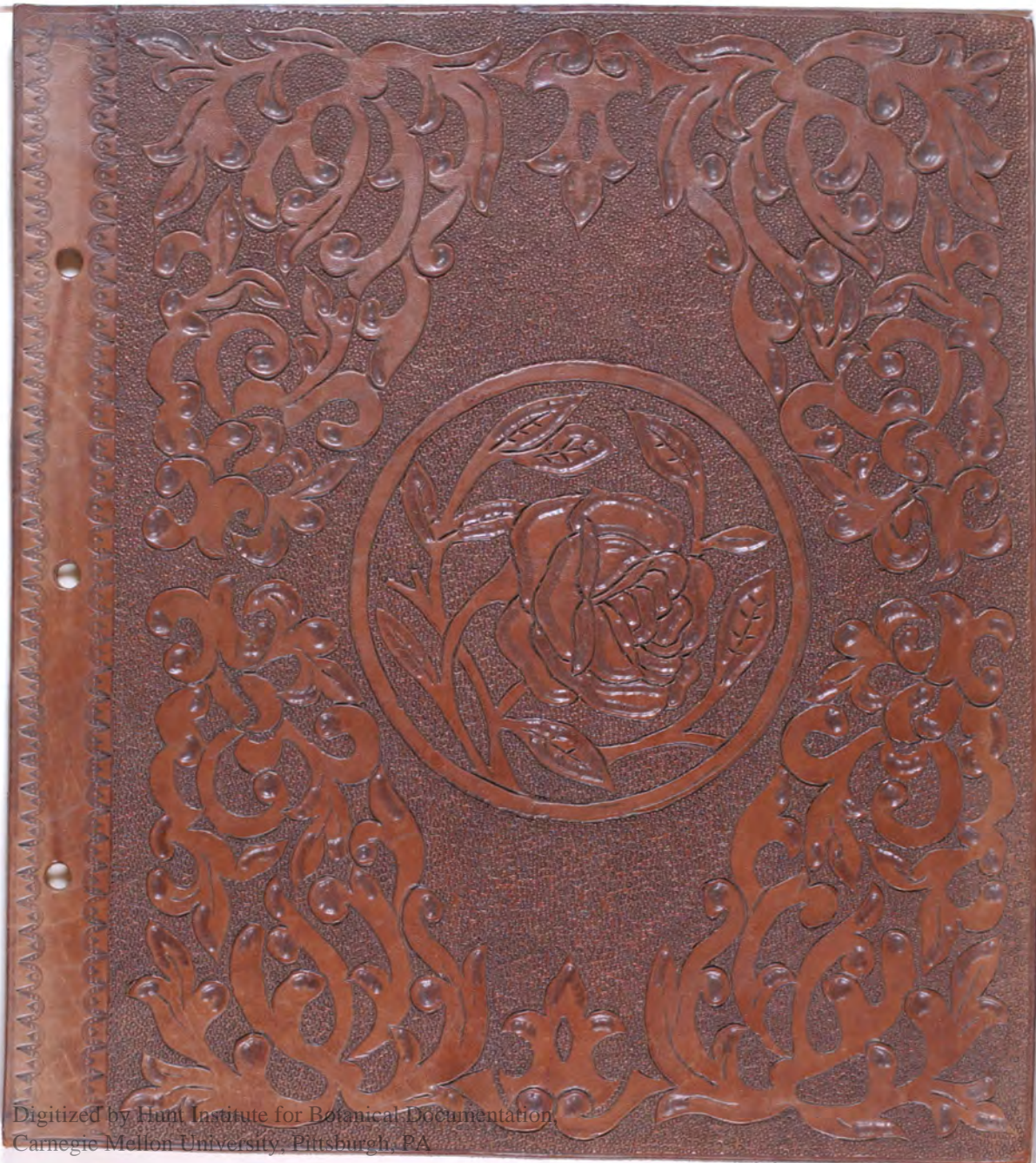
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About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

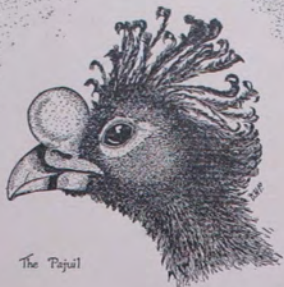

Altadenan Returns Home After Lengthy Absence in Honduras

ALTADENA, May 1. — Dr. Wilson Popenoe, who has been engaged in research work for the United States Department of Agriculture for the past ten years, arrived yesterday from Tela, Honduras. For two years he has been doing avocado research work for the United Fruit Company in Honduras, and is in the United States now for a vacation.

On May 18, Dr. Popenoe will deliver an address at the Fifth California Avocado Show at Whittier, May 14 to 19, and his wide experience in avocado culture will make his talk of particular interest.

Many parties and entertainments have been planned for Dr. and Mrs. Popenoe during their stay here, one of them being a large garden fête given by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Popenoe, 2495 North Marengo avenue, in their honor on Saturday.

Dr. Popenoe plans to stay in the United States about a month, residing at the home of Paul Popenoe, his brother.

NUESTRA INFORMACION CULTURAL

Las excavaciones arqueológicas de Honduras

Una importante obra arqueológica se emprenderá en breve en Honduras, que debe añadir un nuevo capítulo notable a los conocimientos científicos de las civilizaciones antiguas de la América Central. El gobierno de Honduras ha concedido a la señora doña Dorothy de Popenoe, esposa del doctor Wilson Popenoe, permiso oficial para hacer exploraciones arqueológicas en Tenampua, en el valle del Comayagua.

Esta señora es la esposa del doctor Wilson Popenoe, conocido perito en agricultura tropical, y con él ha residido algún tiempo en Honduras, donde el doctor Popenoe se dedica a experimentos en el cultivo de varias clases de frutas tropicales. La señora de Popenoe ha viajado mucho por los países de la América Central, y especialmente en Honduras, ya ha estudiado algunas ruinas de las civilizaciones antiguas existentes en la región, donde va a efectuar sus exploraciones bajo las disposiciones de una comisión de este índole hecha por el gobierno hondureño.

Prueba de la práctica y sinceridad de los proyectos de la señora de Popenoe es el hecho de que, aunque va una bien fundados conocimientos de la arqueología, ha venido a los Estados Unidos a prepararse para sus trabajos. Ha estado unas semanas en el famoso "Peabody Museum" y actualmente está estudiando los métodos de la "Central Bureau" en la "American Geographic Society", en Nueva York.

Antes de regresar a Honduras para emprender sus trabajos científicos, la señora Popenoe asistirá a las sesiones del Congreso de Americanistas, que tendrá lugar en Nueva York en el próximo mes de septiembre, cuando tendrá oportunidad de conocer y consultar a conocidos arqueólogos como Arturo Posnansky, de Bolivia, y doña Zelia de Nuttall, de Méjico, así como a otros muchos científicos y aficionados que se dedican al estudio de las civilizaciones precolombianas de las Américas.

La señora de Popenoe, en reconocimiento de sus trabajos científicos, ha sido recibida como miembro de la Sociedad Geográfica de Mujeres, a la cual pertenecen la señora Zelia de Nuttall y la distinguida escritora Harriet Chalmers de Adams.
