LA PEROUSE'S HUDSON'S BAY EXPEDITION.

La Perouse (J. C. de Galaup, Comte de, French navigator) AUTOGRAPH LETTER SIGNED, 2 pages, 4to, Paris, 3rd July, 1783, in a 4to album, half red morocco In 1782 La Perouse was sent by the French Government to destroy the English Settlements in

Hudson's Bay.

The present letter deals with the money allowed him for the passengers he brought home in the Frigate "L'Astree," and the Corvette "L'Engageante," and he claimed that considerably more was due to him.
