The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

With separate mail I am sending you twelve copies of our revised proposal to the Smithsonian, and hope this will arrive as fast as this letter so that you can submit it to the Council in Belgrad. As you can see, this is a revision following the advice of the Smithsonian Council as to Digitized the restriction of the work during the circuly war to the Julian Application their neighborhood, since this area is better known and closer to our field of specialization than other parts of your large country, according to the belief of the specialists in what I know in this country. It also revises considerably the budget. Since I could not consult you in that matter, it is possible that we have made reductions that are unwise, but then I hope you will alter these and let your changes be known to the Smithsonian through the Belgrad Council as oon as possible. Since your Council apparently works faster than the bureaucrats in Washington, I hope it can return their positive enswer to the Smithsonian very soon and then also request that this project be pushed through faster than others and not let weit until the meeting of the Council in Weshington in the middle of May, because such a delay not only jeopardizes the student help which we cannot be without but also makes it difficult for us ourselves to stay undecided about what to do during the summer months, which in this country are without pay for University professors. I am convinced that this is an extraordinary fine proposal that will result in many excellent papers and books for which Yugoslavis and America can be proud, so I hope your side will do everything to prevent that those who do not understand its importance from torpedoeing it before it can even start. But as an immigrant to America I have very little possibilities to push much from this side, not least because of the fact that here cytotaxonomy and classical genetics are in low esteem, despite all criticism on the Lysenko treatment of genetics in the Soviet Union, where cytotaxonomy now is extremely strong.

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
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



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# Nominee For HEW Says Job Thankless

TUSCALOOSA, Aia. (AP) — Dr. F. David Mathews, nominated to be secretary of health, education and welfare, says he hopes the public realizes "what a hard and often thankless task this post has become."

Mathews, 39-year-old president of the University of Ala-

bama, made the comment at a news conference shortly after President Ford sent his name to the Senate for confirmation.

He would succeed Caspar W. Weinberger, who resigned, reportedly to return to California because of his wife's health. Weinberger has been mentioned as a possible GOP gubernatorial candidate in that state.

Mathews, who would be the seventh Cabinet member chosen in Ford's 10-month-old administration, said he hoped it was clear that he did not seek the nomination — "I'l is rather a draft to assume an extremely difficult assignment, and it should be remembered that the nomination must be confirmed by the Senate."

But Mathews also said, "I am honored by President Ford's personal confidence in me and pleased that he himself brought my name into this matter."

HEW, which spends one out of every three federal dollars, is beset by money problems. Colleges and universities are seeking more aid, health costs are soaring and welfare rolls

are at an alt time high
Mathews, who has been president of the 13/000-student university since 1969, said he would seek a leave of absence from the school's board of trustees while serving in the Ford administration.

Mathews and his wife, Mary, are both from Grove Hill, a hamlet in southwest Alabama, and he credits his growing up in a small town for his success in life.

"I'm not quite sure what it is, but maybe it's just being surrounded by people who have confidence in you and will support you out of proportion," he said.

#### IN YUGOSLAVIA

The Smithsonian Foreign Currency Program has recently become aware of a critical decrease in the rapidly dwindling reserves of U.S.-owned "excess" Yugoslav dinars. During the past fiscal year, this situation resulted in an indefinite postponement of all new PL 480 funded research projects in Yugoslavia until the flow of dinars from U.S. reserves could be assessed. The progress of on-going projects was unaffected at that time; however, the shortage of funds now threatens continuation of on-going research projects. The duration of our research activities and the amount of funds which will be available during a terminal period of research funding will not be known until the completion of a U.S. Government-wide review. A temporary moratorium has been placed on all dinar obligations until the monetary review is completed.

Because President Nixon and Tito agreed that the most careful use of PL 480 Yugoslav Dinars was of importance to the relations of the two countries, the current monetary review mentalen extends into a determination of both U.S. and Yugoslav Government priorities. After October 10, 1972 the Yugoslav Government is expected to consult the different republics in the course of preparing a Yugoslav national system of priorities. About the end of October, Yugoslav and American representatives will meet in Belgrade to develop an initial joint list of priorities.

Smithsonian priorities have just been presented for discussions to take place in Washington the week of October 9. We have placed on-going research on our first priority list, and research agreed to by both the Government of Yugoslavia and the Smithsonian on our second priority list.

This office is doing everything in its power to guarantee the orderly phase-out of its on-going research projects in Yugoslavia. Nevertheless, the outcome of the monetary review will depend first on Governmental priorities.

Since we believe that we will be able to provide funds for at least one more year of on-going research, we will entertain renewal proposals in the usual fashion at our forthcoming Advisory Council meetings. The next deadlines for submission of renewal proposals are

November 1 - Archaeology and Related Disciplines

March 1 - Biological Sciences

We will be in touch with you as soon as we have substantive information on the funds which will be made available to this program.

Dear Dr. Susnik:

I am taking the liberty of writing to you directly after discussing with Professor Love the problems encountered by your joint botanical project when it was reviewed by the Smithsonian Foreign Currency Program Advisory Council. As I believe I suggested might prove to be the case during your visit to the Smithsonian last year at the time of the XI International Botanical Conference, your proposal was simply too large, cost too much money, and was too ambitious, especially for the first year of an as yet unproven project and team. As Professor Love suggests in his letter to you of February 22 the only way to resolve the doubts of the Advisory Council issued to scale down the size and scope of the project. The Advisory Council itself, in declining to approve the project as submitted, specifically recommended that a smaller-scale proposal be resubmitted. I believe Professor Love sent you a copy of the letter with the recommendations of the Advisory Council.

I would strongly urge that you and your colleagues accept the suggestions of Dr. Löve for reducing the scope of the project, and insure as far as possible the acceptability in Yugoslavia of a smaller project. For our part at the Smithsonian, we intend to review the revised proposal from Dr. Löve as quickly as possible, in order that, if the review of the Advisory Council is favorable, a joint Yugoslav-American project in botany can begin later this summer.

It was indeed a pleasure to meet and talk with you here in Washington last year. Let us hope that the relationship thus established will continue in the form of future

Dear Dr. Love:

I refer to your letter of January 28, 1971, regarding revisions in your grant budget.

As you know, this is a lean year for us because of the unusually heavy demands upon our Program funds and we have had to trim budgets anywhere we possibly can. We were therefore dismayed when you responded to our request to provide us Digitized b with a budget within the \$39,580 support level with a budget which allon is much larger even than the one submitted this year to our Advisory Council. We have examined carefully this latest budget and the accompanying justification, and we feel that on the whole you make a case for some increase in the amount you originally requested. We cannot see our way clear, however, to providing the full \$58, 100 which you ask. We are accordingly offering to support your project at \$50,720, allocated according to the attached budget. If you feel the need of additional funds, you should perhaps apply to other funding agencies.

The reductions which we have made are as follows:

1. International travel is reduced from 10 to 6 round trips. This will provide travel for the American participants and one for use by a Yugoslavian participant or consultant.

- 2. We have reduced the salary for Doris Love. We cannot support a salary for a researcher which exceeds that which he would normally receive at his academic post. We feel that it is a safe presumption that your wife as a research associate does not receive from the University the salary which you receive as a professor and department chairman. We accordingly assumed her salary not to exceed \$1,500 per month.
- 3. We have reduced your vehicle budget for American participants to \$1,800. This allows \$30 per day for the time the Americans are in Yugoslavia. We did not, however decrease the transportation allowance for the Yugoslavs since it was already lower than the reduced American allowance when calculated on a man-month basis. (There are 10 American man-months and 20 Jugoslav man-months covered by the budget).
- 4. We have reduced the per diem allowance to \$3,600, based on a rate of \$12 per day for 300 man-days. This is the maximum which we pay for field maintenance in Yugoslavia, and exceeds the support recommended by our Advisory Council for your project.

If you wish for us to go ahead and write a grant for your project based on this modified budget, please let us know. As we have discussed previously, funds would become available on July 1st.

Dear Dr. Löve:

I refer to your letters of April 14 and 24, regarding your project in Yugoslavia. We have given careful consideration to your requests and suggestions, and I believe that we can be of some help.

You no doubt saw from the proposed contract which we sent to your institution on April 21, that we are going to be able to provide support for your project during the current fiscal year. We have, by the way, just received the signed copy of the grant from the University of Colorado and are now ready to process your travel request.

You should lat once, send us completed travel request forms (\$115) ntation for those of you who will be traveling on grant funds in June or early July. We will have the airline send a prepaid ticket advice to the airline office in Boulder for each ticket. You also should go ahead and make your reservations directly with Pan American or TWA, the two American air carriers serving Yugoslavia. Do not make your reservations through a travel agency as there is no provision for the payment of their fees from government travel order tickets.

There is no way in which we can pay dinars for the travel of the Reid's child. Established government policies leave us little room for maneuver on the subject of travel. If Dr. Reid were going to be in Yugoslavia for six months or longer, we could pay dependent travel routinely for those of his dependents who would accompany him and remain during his stay. Your suggestion that we purchase the tickets with dinars and repay the amount out of funds earmarked for Dr. Reid's maintenance is unfortunately impossible. The Public Law 480 agreement

with Yugoslavia under which the United States Government acquired these dinars expressly limits the use of these dinars to expenditures within Yugoslavia except for the international travel of official U. S. Government travelers.

The travel for Mrs. Reid alone might be paid from the grant if she will be serving as your secretary and recorder, if your project needs her services, and if she has the necessary qualifications. Her travel expense could then be handled in the same manner as any other project participant. You would have to revise your project budget to provide the necessary funds. I believe that we explained to you that we are unable to increase the total funds supporting the project. You might consider either utilizing one of the international trips reserved for one of the project consultants (providing of course that this would not interfere with the project's scientific objectives) or you could as you suggested shift funds from the budget item for maintenance to that for travel. Please let us know just what adjustment you wish to make in the budget. If Mrs. Reid is important to the project, tell us how and what her qualifications are to serve as secretary, recorder, administrative assistant or whatever. We will need to approve the change for ultimate accounting purposes.
