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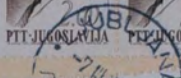
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About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Dear Franc:

With separate mail I am sending you twelve copies of our revised proposal to the Smithsonian, and hope this will arrive as fast as this letter so that you can submit it to the Council in Belgrad. As you can see, this is a revision following the advice of the Smithsonian Council as to the restriction of the work during the first year to the Julian Alps and their neighborhood, since this area is better known and closer to our field of specialization than other parts of your large country, according to the belief of the specialists in what I know in this country. It also revises considerably the budget. Since I could not consult you in that matter, it is possible that we have made reductions that are unwise, but then I hope you will alter these and let your changes be known to the Smithsonian through the Belgrad Council as soon as possible. Since your Council apparently works faster than the bureaucrats in Washington, I hope it can return their positive answer to the Smithsonian very soon and then also request that this project be pushed through faster than others and not let wait until the meeting of the Council in Washington in the middle of May, because such a delay not only jeopardizes the student help which we cannot be without but also makes it difficult for us ourselves to stay undecided about what to do during the summer months, which in this country are without pay for University professors. I am convinced that this is an extraordinary fine proposal that will result in many excellent papers and books for which Yugoslavia and America can be proud, so I hope your side will do everything to prevent that those who do not understand its importance from torpedoing it before it can even start. But as an immigrant to America I have very little possibilities to push much from this side, not least because of the fact that here cytotaxonomy and classical genetics are in low esteem, despite all criticism on the Lysenko treatment of genetics in the Soviet Union, where cytotaxonomy now is extremely strong.

Dear Mr.K.D.Whitehead:

In the meantime I got the letter from Prof.Löve, and so got the answer to what I asked you. The information has not surprised me Because all has gone too smoothly.

In the last time I have several visitors from american Institutions and Embassy, and we talked a lot about the cowork. All they have seen our laboratories and concept of the work. Some days ago I discussed with dr.Higgins /Director MMSC in Salambo/ the possibilities of cowork, and problems which arise with it. I am sorry, that the realizations are often fare from possibilities and our wishes. As the director of Biological Institute University of Ljubljana am interested first of all in the cowork of american scietistes with us in our institution. So I think is the best way that the modern trend in the research work in biology would come to us and together with our scietistes contribute a great deal to the progress. Therefore the cowork with the Smithsonian Institution is for us very interesting, because it makes possible the work of the american scietistes on our Institution. It is a pity that the interests and the fields of cowork are to little known. I admit frankly that the money is in second position.

Iwholy accept the suggestions in the answer of the Smithsonian committee. I regret only, because I did not take them in a count before. The distance Boulder-Ljubljana are too far, therefore it is difficult to accord the programs and the expenses. I was personally very glad, that the project has passed the yugoslav formalities and opened the way to a useful and successful cowork. I would like you to tell me sincerely if such program /cytological and cytotaxonomical/ are interestin at all for your Institution. Speak frankly,I do not want all the ~~work~~^{activity} be without success.



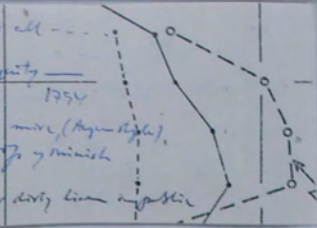

Nominee For HEW Says Job Thankless

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP) — Dr. F. David Mathews, nominated to be secretary of health, education and welfare, says he hopes the public realizes "what a hard and often thankless task this post has become."
Mathews, 39-year-old president of the University of Ala-

bama, made the comment at a news conference shortly after President Ford sent his name to the Senate for confirmation.
He would succeed Caspar W. Weinberger, who resigned, reportedly to return to California because of his wife's health. Weinberger has been mentioned as a possible GOP gubernatorial candidate in that state.

Mathews, who would be the seventh Cabinet member chosen in Ford's 10-month-old administration, said he hoped it was clear that he did not seek the nomination — "It is rather a draft to assume an extremely difficult assignment, and it should be remembered that the nomination must be confirmed by the Senate."

But Mathews also said, "I am honored by President Ford's personal confidence in me and pleased that he himself brought my name into this matter."

HEW, which spends one out of every three federal dollars, is beset by money problems. Colleges and universities are seeking more aid, health costs are soaring and welfare rolls are at an all time high.

Mathews, who has been president of the 13,000-student university since 1969, said he would seek a leave of absence from the school's board of trustees while serving in the Ford administration.

Mathews and his wife, Mary, are both from Grove Hill, a hamlet in southwest Alabama, and he credits his growing up in a small town for his success in life.

"I'm not quite sure what it is, but maybe it's just being surrounded by people who have confidence in you and will support you out of proportion," he said.



IN YUGOSLAVIA

The Smithsonian Foreign Currency Program has recently become aware of a critical decrease in the rapidly dwindling reserves of U.S.-owned "excess" Yugoslav dinars. During the past fiscal year, this situation resulted in an indefinite postponement of all new PL 480 funded research projects in Yugoslavia until the flow of dinars from U.S. reserves could be assessed. The progress of on-going projects was unaffected at that time; however, the shortage of funds now threatens continuation of on-going research projects. The duration of our research activities and the amount of funds which will be available during a terminal period of research funding will not be known until the completion of a U.S. Government-wide review. A temporary moratorium has been placed on all dinar obligations until the monetary review is completed.

Because President Nixon and Tito agreed that the most careful use of PL 480 Yugoslav Dinars was of importance to the relations of the two countries, the current monetary review extends into a determination of both U.S. and Yugoslav Government priorities. After October 10, 1972 the Yugoslav Government is expected to consult the different republics in the course of preparing a Yugoslav national system of priorities. About the end of October, Yugoslav and American representatives will meet in Belgrade to develop an initial joint list of priorities.

Smithsonian priorities have just been presented for discussions to take place in Washington the week of October 9. We have placed on-going research on our first priority list, and research agreed to by both the Government of Yugoslavia and the Smithsonian on our second priority list.

This office is doing everything in its power to guarantee the orderly phase-out of its on-going research projects in Yugoslavia. Nevertheless, the outcome of the monetary review will depend first on Governmental priorities.


Since we believe that we will be able to provide funds for at least one more year of on-going research, we will entertain renewal proposals in the usual fashion at our forthcoming Advisory Council meetings. The next deadlines for submission of renewal proposals are

November 1 - Archaeology and Related Disciplines

March 1 - Biological Sciences

We will be in touch with you as soon as we have substantive information on the funds which will be made available to this program.

Dear Dr. Susnik:

I am taking the liberty of writing to you directly after discussing with Professor Löve the problems encountered by your joint botanical project when it was reviewed by the Smithsonian Foreign Currency Program Advisory Council. As I believe I suggested might prove to be the case during your visit to the Smithsonian last year at the time of the XI International Botanical Conference, your proposal was simply too large, cost too much money, and was too ambitious, especially for the first year of an as yet unproven project and team. As Professor Löve suggests in his letter to you of February 22, the only way to resolve the doubts of the Advisory Council is to scale down the size and scope of the project. The Advisory Council itself, in declining to approve the project as submitted, specifically recommended that a smaller-scale proposal be resubmitted. I believe Professor Löve sent you a copy of the letter with the recommendations of the Advisory Council.

I would strongly urge that you and your colleagues accept the suggestions of Dr. Löve for reducing the scope of the project, and insure as far as possible the acceptability in Yugoslavia of a smaller project. For our part at the Smithsonian, we intend to review the revised proposal from Dr. Löve as quickly as possible, in order that, if the review of the Advisory Council is favorable, a joint Yugoslav-American project in botany can begin later this summer.

It was indeed a pleasure to meet and talk with you here in Washington last year. Let us hope that the relationship thus established will continue in the form of future

If he does decide to come, I will at once let you know.

Some reorganization at the top level has been made here so two persons may have divided the work of Dr. Manning, who now is the President of the Bridgeport University in Connecticut, but I hope this will not delay the signing of the papers. Also, I sincerely hope that other matters regarding the problems that must be solved before we can make our final arrangements have been transferred to your effective hands so that we will see things going faster than during the past two years of frustration and delays, which apparently were not caused by your office but by all kinds of other bureaucracies that could not be avoided. Thank you very much for your letter. Everything what are you speaking about in your letter could be arranged. In my opinion the most important thing is that we can start with our work in time. In your letter you mentioned the budget- does the change in Yugoslav part mean an increase according to your new propositions /what means 5.600 Doll. more as it was proposed before your visit to Ljubljana/.

I have started to collect plants, and I hope that by time of your arrival we shall have about hundred of them. I have also fixed the chromosome numbers for about 40 Taxa. Your idea of "honorary titles" is very good and also realisable, more about it as you will be here. I have also reserved an apartment /3 rooms with kitchen and bathroom/ in a student hostel from 1.7 to 20.8. In each room there are two beds. The price of the apartment is 120 dinars per night. Besides it I have reserved also one room more /with two beds/. The hostel is situated in city of the Ljubljana /between Hotel Union and hospital- I think that I have shown it to you/.

The ideas of work on a group of ferns is more than good /I think on Dryopteris/.

In letter to Dr. I. E. Wallen /Director, Office on Environmental Science, Smithsonian Institution - the Principal Investigator of the Project: Longterm Research Project on Investigations of Mediterranean Flora and Fauna/, I mentioned the possibility to link both projects / I think I have given you the preliminary copy of them and also we have discuss about/ and to develop a taxonomical center for Flora and Fauna. Up till now I have not received any answer.

I enclose a copy of approved financial funds for 1971 and planned for 1972 through PL.480. As you can see the Smithsonian Institution has for 1971 /from 1/7.70 to 30/6-71/ approved financial funds for Yugoslavia 340.000 Doll. For the next budget /from 1/7-71 to 30/6-72/ they planned 620.000 Doll. As far as I know it is very probable that this money will be approved.

I have not intention to write more of my work, because you are coming soon.

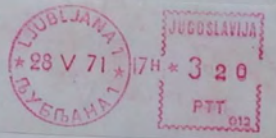

Dear Dr. Love:

I refer to your letter of January 28, 1971, regarding revisions in your grant budget.

As you know, this is a lean year for us because of the unusually heavy demands upon our Program funds and we have had to trim budgets anywhere we possibly can. We were therefore dismayed when you responded to our request to provide us with a budget within the \$39,580 support level with a budget which is much larger even than the one submitted this year to our Advisory Council. We have examined carefully this latest budget and the accompanying justification, and we feel that on the whole you make a case for some increase in the amount you originally requested. We cannot see our way clear, however, to providing the full \$58,100 which you ask. We are accordingly offering to support your project at \$50,720, allocated according to the attached budget. If you feel the need of additional funds, you should perhaps apply to other funding agencies.


The reductions which we have made are as follows:

1. International travel is reduced from 10 to 6 round trips. This will provide travel for the American participants and one for use by a Yugoslavian participant or consultant.

2. We have reduced the salary for Doris Love. We cannot support a salary for a researcher which exceeds that which he would normally receive at his academic post. We feel that it is a safe presumption that your wife as a research associate does not receive from the University the salary which you receive as a professor and department chairman. We accordingly assumed her salary not to exceed \$1,500 per month.
3. We have reduced your vehicle budget for American participants to \$1,800. This allows \$30 per day for the time the Americans are in Yugoslavia. We did not, however decrease the transportation allowance for the Yugoslavs since it was already lower than the reduced American allowance when calculated on a man-month basis. (There are 10 American man-months and 20 Yugoslav man-months covered by the budget).
4. We have reduced the per diem allowance to \$3,600, based on a rate of \$12 per day for 300 man-days. This is the maximum which we pay for field maintenance in Yugoslavia, and exceeds the support recommended by our Advisory Council for your project.

If you wish for us to go ahead and write a grant for your project based on this modified budget, please let us know. As we have discussed previously, funds would become available on July 1st.

You also should go ahead and make your reservations directly with Pan American or TWA, the two American air carriers serving Yugoslavia. Do not make your reservations through a travel agency as there is no provision for the payment of their fees from government travel order tickets.


There is no way in which we can pay dinars for the travel of the Reid's child. Established government policies leave us little room for maneuver on the subject of travel. If Dr. Reid were going to be in Yugoslavia for six months or longer, we could pay dependent travel routinely for those of his dependents who would accompany him and remain during his stay. Your suggestion that we purchase the tickets with dinars and repay the amount out of funds earmarked for Dr. Reid's maintenance is unfortunately impossible. The Public Law 480 agreement

with Yugoslavia under which the United States Government acquired these dinars expressly limits the use of these dinars to expenditures within Yugoslavia except for the international travel of official U. S. Government travelers.

The travel for Mrs. Reid alone might be paid from the grant if she will be serving as your secretary and recorder, if your project needs her services, and if she has the necessary qualifications. Her travel expense could then be handled in the same manner as any other project participant. You would have to revise your project budget to provide the necessary funds. I believe that we explained to you that we are unable to increase the total funds supporting the project. You might consider either utilizing one of the international trips reserved for one of the project consultants (providing of course that this would not interfere with the project's scientific objectives) or you could as you suggested shift funds from the budget item for maintenance to that for travel. Please let us know just what adjustment you wish to make in the budget. If Mrs. Reid is important to the project, tell us how and what her qualifications are to serve as secretary, recorder, administrative assistant or whatever. We will need to approve the change for ultimate accounting purposes.

We will ask the American Embassy at Belgrade to make \$28,100 equivalent in dinars available to the Federal Administration for International Technical Cooperation for transfer to the University of Ljubljana. Under the agreement which we have with the Government of Yugoslavia, all of our payments to Yugoslav institutions have to be made through FAITC. We will ask the Embassy to authorize the Consulate General at Zagreb to pay the remainder of grant funds exclusive of the amounts withheld for international travel directly to you.

Of this advance payment, the designated representative Dr. Love has indicated that he will retain 17,200 US DOLS equivalent under his own control for the maintenance and other expenses of American participants; and that he wishes 28,100 US DOLS equivalent to be transferred to FAITC for further transfer to the collaborating Yugoslav institution. This schedule of payments has been prepared after consultations in the United States with the principal investigator. If circumstances there suggest a modification of this schedule, the Embassy is authorized to make disbursements as requested by the designated representative.

5. The Embassy is authorized to withhold up to 5,420 US DOLS equivalent in Yugoslav dinars from the total grant amount for payment directly to international carriers for the travel and transportation expenses of project personnel and equipment authorized directly by the Smithsonian Institution by the issuance of Government Transportation Requests (GTR's) or Government Bills of Lading (GBL's).
