About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

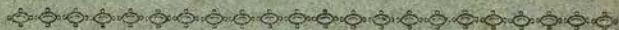

The Subscription to permanent Subscribers is to be considered as due that Day Twelve Months on which they first subscribed.

Subscribers intending to discontinue their Subscription, are to signify their Intentions of so doing, previous to the Expiration of the Term for which they subscribed, or otherwise to be considered as Subscribers for another Year.

To prevent the Intrusion of improper Company, and to gratify the Curiosity of occasional Visitors, such as are not Subscribers will be admitted to see the Garden, on paying Two Shillings and Sixpence at their Entrance, which will be returned should they subscribe; or, if one of a Party subscribes, the whole of the Party's Entrance-Money will be returned.

It being the Proprietor's Wish to keep his Garden in perfectly neat Order, he entreats that none will bring Dogs with them, tread on the Borders, or suffer those under their Care to do so.

Having at his former Garden, Lambeth-Marsh, suffered considerably from the Depredations of the Inconsiderate or Designing, who have made Bouquets of the Flowers, taken Cuttings of valuable Plants, and carried off unique Specimens, he presumes to caution such as visit the Garden, against a Practice so contrary to its established Rules, and so unfavourable to the Purposes of its Institution.

Much Inconvenience having arisen from lending Books belonging to the Library, to Subscribers who have requested the Use of them, that Practice will in future be discontinued.

The Garden will be open every Day, from Six to Eight, from the 1st of April to the 29th of September, and from Eight to Four, the Remainder of the Year.

A Catalogue of the Library, and of such Plants as can be spared to Subscribers, with their Prices, will be ready for Delivery the Beginning of February.
