#### About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

SUBSCRIBERS paying One Guinea, are entitled to walk in the Garden, inspect the Plants, and peruse the Books, &c. in the Library, either singly or accompanied by a Friend, Twelve Months from the Time of their Subscribing.

Subscribers paying Two Guineas Annually, are not limited in the Number of Persons they may chuse to introduce, and may receive Roots or Seeds of such Plants as can be spared from the Garden, with their proper Names, to the full Amount of their Subscription, provided Orders for such Plants or Seeds (Post Paid, if from the Country) are sent in the Month of August, that they may be delivered in the Months of September and October, those being the only Months in which the necessary Management of the Garden will admit of their being sent out.—To prevent Disappointment, the Subscriber is to send an additional List to those Plants more particularly desired.

Subscribers, on paying their Subscription-Money, are to enter their Names and Residence in a Book kept for that Purpose in the Library of the Garden.
