The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

## ADVERTISEMENT.

**T**HE Changes made in the Number of Plates published Monthly, has unavoidably introduced some Irregularity in the Size of our Volumes. Difference of Opinion has occasioned some Difficulty in deciding how best to remedy this Inconvenience.—We had prepared for publishing with this Number Two Title-Pages and Indexes for the whole of the last Year's Publication, containing just enough to make Two Volumes of the Size of the original ones : but, upon Reconsideration, we are persuaed, that it will be best to defer publishing these till the 1st of March, when there will be a sufficient Quantity to make Two Volumes of the same Size with the XVth; Two of which, when bound together, will make a very handsome Volume, which we have only thought it necessary to divide for the Sake of accommodating our Friends, who have been accustomed to bind up the Volumes in a different Manner.—Our Publisher informs us that the greatest Number have been used to bind Two of the original Volumes in One. These, by still continuing the same Plan, will find no Irregularity in their Libraries; the Fourteen Volumes published in Mr. CURTIS'S Life-time, or within a Year after his Death, remaining of the original Size, the small Increase of the subsequent ones will only serve to mark out the new Series.

Those who have been used to bind Three Volumes together will find no Inconvenience from the small Increase in the Size of the XVth, and by hereafter binding only Two of our Volumes together, these will be nearly of the same Size as before.
