The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

THIS Volume will contain Forty-Eight accurately coloured Engravings of British Birds, with copious Descriptions relative to the peculiar Manners of each Species, the Modes of Nidification, Generic and Specific Characters, with various other Particulars illustrative of their Habits; it is handsomely printed on a fine Yellow Wove Royal Paper, with a new Type. A considerable Number of the Drawings and Engravings in this Volume were executed for the late WILLIAM CURTIS, Author of the *Flora Londinensis*, *Botanical Magazine*, &c. who had in Contemplation to publish a Work on the same Subject, and of which these were to have formed a Part; the Remainder of the Plates will be executed in the same correct Manner, by HOWITT, from Drawings made by him, in most cases from living Subjects.

It is presumed, this will form the most complete Work on the Subject ever submitted to the Public; as a Plate is appropriated to each Species, and where any considerable Difference exists in the Colours of the Sexes, Figures of both are given, whereby an Opportunity is afforded of displaying the peculiar Specific Characters of each Bird, better than by the most laboured Description.

A Volume of the Size of the present will be published Annually, and the Numbers continued Monthly, as heretofore, with this Difference, that every Third Number will contain Six Plates and Descriptions; the Author has made this Arrangement in Compliance with the repeated Solicitations of a Number of his Subscribers, who wish the Work to proceed more rapidly than at present.

The Numbers may be had one or more at a Time, the first Four, containing Six Plates each, at Five Shillings the Number, and the remaining Eight, with Three Plates, at Two Shillings and Sixpence each.
