#### TO THE PUBLIC.

IN announcing a New Universal Biography, it is needless to expatiate on a Subject so interesting and important in itself as Biography confessedly is, thought it is highly requisite that its Compiler should give ample and satisfactory reasons to the Reading Public, for submitting a new work to their attention.

The principal advantages of this "New Biography" over all other works of a similar nature, will be found—1st, in the completeness of its reference; there being at present, no work on the subject, but what will frequently disappoint the reader who has occasion to refer to its contents, inasmuch as many hundreds of names, of frequent recurrence to the mind, are not to be found in any such collection.

2nd. The arrangement of this Work is altogether Novel, differing herein very essentially from all other "General Biographies;" which, being arranged on the Alphabetical Plan, are attended with every possible disadvantage, except that of ready reference, to which accommodation are of necessity sacrificed all those more important advantages arising from a chronological and classified mode of disposal.

In a merely alphabetical disposition, the subjects presented to view are generally so opposite and so incongruous, that no reader, however patient, can long proceed in a continuous course of reading, without experiencing displeasure and fatigue; and, even if he did continue it, such reading would be so irregular and inconsequent, as to be altogether destitute of the benefits resulting from a more systematic arrangement. In the alphabetical order of position, every article stands unconnected and isolated; no part strengthens and illustrates another; the whole is, in fact, but one large index; a confused mass, a complete chaos, of unconnected and heterogeneous parts, jumbled together without system, without order, without reason, and every succeeding edition completely destroying the preceding one. #### NEW UNIVERSAL BIOGRAPHY.

To reduce these discordant materials to something like order and harmony, is the grand object of this "New Blography." The convenience of reference will be fully preserved by an ample General Index, so that every defect of former works will be remedied, without risking a single advantage. In order that the reference from the Alphabetical Index may be as perfect as possible, every Article will be rendered complete in itself, the same as in the Dictionaries.

In the classification of the subjects, considerable difficulties must, from the very nature of the undertaking, inevitably occur. The Compiler has, therefore, only attempted a General Classification; and the plan he has acted upon has been to place every Person in that class in which he appeared most eminent. A variety of a children with the class and and appeared most eminent. subdivisions might have been formed, and many minute distinctions made, which he has neglected, preferring a general to a particular division, as well on account of its simplicity, as its answering every useful purpose, an extreme minuteness ultimately tending to perplexity.
