Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Mr. CURTIS begs to inform the Subscribers to this Work, that the GENERAL INDEXES are now printed, and are ready for delivery: he trusts they will be found to be as simple, and extensively useful, as any form they could be arranged under; they consist of

- 1st,—A GENERAL ALPHABETICAL ENGLISH INDEX, with the Volume and Number of the Plate prefixed to each Plant; to which the Latin Name is added.
- 2d,—A General Alphabetical Latin Index, with the same reference to Volume and Plate; to which the English Names are added.
- 3d,—A GENERAL SYSTEMATICAL LATIN INDEX, with the same reference to Volume and Plate; to which the English Names are added.

Whatever arrangement the Subscribers have adopted in binding their volumes, the above three forms must be eligible for reference, the Work being mostly bound in the order of publication, the present Index forms a convenient sized volume to bind with it.

This Index, to many who do not possess the Work will be very desirable, for ascertaining what plants are figured in it for occasional reference. As an additional interest to this appendage to the Botanical Magazine, a portrait, with a sketch of the Life and Writings of Mr. William Curtis, the original author of it, is added; and at the end of the Index, blank leaves are inserted, for the continuation of the Index in Manuscript, as many years may perhaps elapse before another General Index will be necessary.

The sale of the former General Index was very limited in proportion to the number of sets of the Work then out; Mr. Curtis has, therefore, only printed of the present Index equal to about two-thirds of the number of copies extant, and hopes no time will be lost by the regular Subscribers to the Work in applying for it; because, whenever it may be out of print, it can never repay the expence of reprinting.
