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The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Policies effected by persons on their own lives, and afterwards assigned as a bona fide security to others, will not be rendered void in consequence of death by suicide, duelling, or the hands of justice. Policies so assigned will thus afford effectual security to Creditors, whose interest in the life assured can never become a question in this Establishment.

** Every requisite information, together with full instructions for effecting assurances will be given to parties applying at the Office, or addressing a letter to the Secretary.

Agents and Medical Officers will immediately be appointed in all the principal Agents and Meedeal Officers will immediately be appointed in all the principal towns throughout the Kingdom, on the Continers, and in the Colonies: so that assurances in those places may be completed without delay or inconvenience.
