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#### *About the Institute*

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Dear Dr. Greenman:

In continuance of the exchange policy already established between the University of Pennsylvania and the Missouri Botanical Garden, I am writing to ascertain whether you would care to receive a package of about 260 plants of my own collecting. The specimens which I am offering you fall into two main groups:

1) Plants from the Philadelphia Local Area, that is, roughly, within about a hundred mile radius of Philadelphia. These are mostly coastal plain forms, and represent parts of four states: Penna., N.J., Del., and Md. Duplicates of most of these are in the Herbarium of the Philadelphia Botanical Club at the Academy of Natural Sciences and will help to form the basis for the next revision of the Philadelphia Local Flora.

2) Plants from Southeastern Massachusetts, i.e., Barnstable Co., Elizabeth Islands and Martha's Vineyard. Duplicates of all of these are at the Gray Herbarium and at the University of Pennsylvania. At the former place they will stand a good chance of being worked over and cited ( some have already been ) and those from the Elizabeth Islands will soon form the basis for publication when I finish my thesis upon that archipelago. The Vineyard has been little visited by collectors and I hope to tackle that next.

For some time I have felt that duplicates of these collections belonged in some Herbarium of the middle West, and I know of no place where I should be more happy to have them go than to Missouri Botanical Garden, that is, if you are willing to accept them.

Will you be so kind as to remember me to Mr. Woodson, whom I enjoyed meeting and knowing at Gray Herbarium last year ?



I desire to say a word concerning the few specimens from the island of Penikese, Mass. I am not very proud of these plants, for they were collected under great pressure and are far from being ideal specimens, but they possess a certain historic interest. In 1923, to commemorate the Fiftieth Anniversary of the founding of Agassiz's laboratory on Penikese in 1873, we made a botanical survey of the island from the Woods Hole Laboratory. This survey was written up in Rhodora, Vol. 26, 1924, and the plants which I now send you represent an incomplete fourth set of the material which formed the basis for the list published at that time. The comparison of this list with one published by David Starr Jordan for Penikese in 1874, and the possibilities of its comparison with future lists, lend to these few plants, as I say, their only value, an historic one.



You were good enough, at the New York meetings, to express an interest in the material which I sent to you from my Elizabeth Islands collecting and a desire to receive additional specimens.

I am, therefore, taking the liberty of forwarding to you a package containing one hundred fifty-five (155) plants. This shipment has already gone forward by mail and should reach you shortly.

Most of these specimens are from the Elizabeth Islands, Dukes Co., Mass.; a few were collected in Barnstable and Plymouth Counties in the same state. McVaugh feels that before going on to study L. siphilitica he would like to see that relatives of puberula: namely, aeoena, glandulifera, glandulosa, ludoviciana and flaccidifolia. Dear Dr. Greenman:

Your letter to Dr. Wherry, relative to the borrowing of Iris for Dr. Anderson, has been turned over to me as Curator of the Herbarium.

I am greatly ashamed to have to confess that we have not a single sheet of either I. versicolor or I. virginica from Virginia. The fact is, we have less material in our collection from Virginia than from almost any other state in the east. I have been making a concerted effort to remedy this situation during the last few years and as a result we have added many hundred sheets of Virginia plants, but the Iris are not among them.

We have a pretty fair series of I. versicolor from the local area and a small folder of I. virginica. If Dr. Anderson would care to see these, I should be only too glad to pack them up and forward them under your care.
