I am in receipt of yours of
October 11th and have learned with interest that you and
Mr. Long have rediscovered mistletoe in Pennsylvania.

The list of recent names which
you are preparing is one which I am sure you will find
of very great assistance. As far as Carex acuta is
concerned you will find an article by me about a year
ago in the Bulletin of the Torrey Botanical Club in which
I showed that this is the earliest name for the species
which has recently been going under the name of Carex
Goodenovii. As a matter of fact there are a very con-
siderable number of names applicable to the species which
are ahead of the name Carex Goodenovii.
