To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

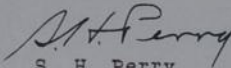

CHAPTER EIGHT
SENATE BILL No. 3.
AN ACT

TO PROTECT NATIVE ARIZONA PLANTS
FROM DESTRUCTION, MUTILATION AND
REMOVAL; TO PRESCRIBE PENALTIES
FOR VIOLATION; AND DECLARING AN
EMERGENCY.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona:

Section 1. The following plants shall constitute
the protected group and the botanical names shall
govern in all cases:

I am very glad indeed to get this publication as it will permit me to distribute the duplicates that you sent me together with the new species without which the duplicates would have had much less value.

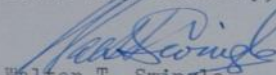

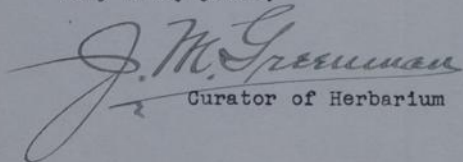

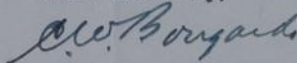

Dear Sir:

We are herewith returning your check for \$23.25 and the notice of delinquent taxes as there are now further penalties to pay.

The fiscal year for the collection of taxes closed on June 30th and the books have been taken over by the County Auditor, Mr. H. A. Payne, who will furnish you with a statement of the amount now due.

Taxes each year become due and payable on the third Monday of October and bills are mailed out at that time for the entire year. The bills show the delinquent dates for both the first and second installments and no further notice is sent.

The laws of California place the entire responsibility for obtaining tax bills and paying on same in time on the taxpayers themselves. The Tax Collector is simply obeying the State law when he adds penalties and costs on established dates on all unpaid taxes. All general information is printed on the reverse side of tax bills.

We might also add that the Tax Collector as well as all other employees in this office are under Civil Service and not subject to election.

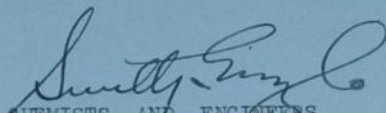

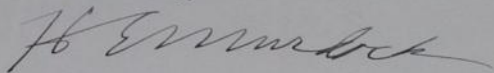
