The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.



## Robert College of Istanbul, Turkey

Robert College in Istanbul Turkey, founded in 1863 through the generosity of New Yorker Christopher Rineland Robert and Dr. Cyrus Hamlin, a dedicated and vigorous educator from New England, was the first American-sponsored school of higher education to be established abroad. With more than a thousand students including its preparatory school, Robert College is today international in character with Turkish and American faculty who conduct their classes in English. In the higher education division at Robert, the School of Engineering enrolls the most students but the modern School of Business Administration and Economics, which was started in 1959 in response to the demand for management personnel, is attracting increasing numbers.

Women students, first admitted to the college level courses at Robert in 1957, now constitute one-tenth of the College population. Their numbers are increasing rapidly and they are doing well in engineering and business administration and in sciences and languages.

The American College for Girls having the same board of trustees and administration as Robert College offers the equivalent of a liberal arts junior college. It also has its own preparatory school. Classes are in English. With 650 students, the Girls' College founded in 1870, occupies a separate campus a few miles from the Robert College "hill." Both campuses are on the Bosphorus, the fabulous and historically important waterway linking the Mediterranean and the Sea of Marmara to the Black Sea. Both schools are American supported and are chartered by the Board of Regents of the State of New York. They operate within the framework of the Turkish Ministry of Education.

The two American Colleges have a faculty of 140 teachers, half of whom are Americans and half Turkish, with a sprinkling of other nationalities. Through their efforts, succeeding generations of students, 90% of whom now are Turkish, have been exposed to Western thought and Western technical and scientific developments.

Those Americans who have been identified with the Colleges now and in the long and distinguished past, the trustees, faculty, contributors, have profited by a closer friendship with the people of Turkey and have acquired a better understanding of their culture. Commenting on the 100th anniversary of Robert College, John F. Kennedy wrote of the Americans who have taught there and worked on behalf of the Colleges that . . .

"Their close association with the heroic and hospitable people of Turkey has led to a greater appreciation of Turkish life and culture and of the strong foundations on which the Republic of Turkey, our close friend and partner in peace, has been built."



### THE AMERICAN COLLEGE FOR GIRLS IN ISTANBUL, TURKEY

FOUNDED in 1871 by American missionaries this school soon became non-sectarian and received its charter as a College in 1890 from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. As the first college for women in the Near East it has had a profound influence that has grown with the developing role of women under the Republic of Turkey.

THE COLLEGE PLANT is located on a beautiful campus of seventy acres of woods and gardens overlooking the Bosphorus, in an excellent residential area 20 minutes from the center of Istanbul.

ADMINISTRATION is headed by the Dean acting under the President of the College and of nearby Robert College for men and the Board of Trustees in the United States.

FACULTY consists of some 60 members, about half Turkish and half non-Turkish, largely American. The quality and character of its staff have contributed to the distinguished history of Girls' College and are basic to its future development.

STUDENTS are ninety percent Turkish by citizenship and are limited to about 660 divided between the five years of Preparatory School and the four years of Junior College training.

CURRICULUM follows a general liberal arts program. The Preparatory School covers the prescribed courses for the Turkish Middle School and the College covers the courses of the Turkish lycee with the final years corresponding to the beginning two years of an American college or university. There is a dual system of courses - one taught in Turkish and the other in English. The government-prescribed program is enriched by a diversified and extensive system of elective courses. With the special requirements in English and in English and American literature, the students carry a very heavy load of subjects.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES are an important part of the American contribution with its emphasis on the development of initiative, responsibility and practical skills. American teachers participate in these activities and share supervisory responsibilities, and these informal contacts with students are a valuable part of their service.

RELATIONSHIPS with both the American and the Turkish communities are cordial and fruitful. In the century since Robert College was founded in 1863, Robert and Girls' Colleges have graduated thousands of students and their alumni are found in key positions in government, education and industry. Dr. Perihan Cambel, a Girls' College graduate was recently appointed to the Turkish Atomic Energy Commission. Many of the alumnae now have daughters attending the College. A number of students come to the United States to continue their advanced training.

## Special Sessions, Visitors Highlight Summer Activities

### \$86,000 Ford Grant Will Enable Robert To Complete English Teaching Project

A Ford Foundation grant of \$86,000 will enable Robert College to complete its project on English Language Teaching Materials by late 1966 or early 1967. Three volumes of the five-volume Book I already are in use.

In recommending that the original \$58,000 grant be supplemented, Professor William Freeman Twaddell, internationally known linguist, educator and consultant to the Foundation, said, "Book I (of Spoken English for Turks) is probably the best single-purpose practical English-teaching course now in existence. . . . A major virtue of this course is the author's familiarity with those Turkish structures which demand a degree of emphasis and a sequence of treatment of specific English features which are learning problems for Turks."

Middle East Technical University and American College for Girls, as well as Robert, will use the two-book course in teaching English. Copies also will be given to every Peace Corps English teacher in Turkey.

The English Language Teaching Materials project is directed by Dr. Sheldon Wise, director of Robert's English Language Division.

Busy as New York's 42nd Street and Broadway in the rush hour, Robert and American College for Girls this summer welcomed—and housed—a steady stream of visitors.

One of the largest groups on Robert campus was a 43-member Peace Corps contingent, the first Corps volunteers to be trained outside the United States or Puerto Rico.

During their seven-week training period at Robert, the volunteers, who will teach in Turkey under the direction of the Ministry of Education, studied Turkish, learned the techniques of teaching English to Turks and followed a Regional Studies course, whose objective was to teach them, in a minimum of time, as much as possible about the country that will be their home for the next two years. Administrator of Regional Studies was Dr. Suna Kili, professor of political science at Robert College Yuksek Division, and a graduate of ACG with a PhD from the University of California.

The program set up by Dr. Kili included Turkish history, geography, tourism, literature, educational system, foreign policy, art, social customs, sensitivities, constitutional law, economy, private enterprise, relations with the United States. Field trips supplemented classroom work.

The Peace Corps program ran from July 19 to September 4.

Also on the Robert campus for a six-week refresher course in the techniques of teaching English were approximately 40 Turkish teachers. Their study program, sponsored by the Turkish Ministry of Education, relied heavily on the modern techniques and electronic devices developed by Robert's language program.

At Robert for an overnight stay were 60 American teenagers who were in Europe as a part of the American Field Service student exchange program.

### Work Campers Visit Robert

From July 3 to July 11 and July 17 to July 29, 85 work campers inbound from Europe were housed in Robert dormitories. Seventy outbound work campers were on campus from August 7 to August 12 and August 21 to August 30.

The Yuksek Summer Session held at Robert in July registered 30 to 40 boarding students and 50 day students.

The ACG campus was hostess from August 13 to August 16 to 38 members of the Middle East Seminar, sponsored by Western College for Women, Oxford, O. This group was met in Ankara by Dr. Sevkiye Inalcik, who was a visiting lecturer on the Middle East at Western during the past year.

Two other groups that met on the ACG campus late in the summer were the Quantum Chemists Conference, a group of about 20 lecturers and forty students and the Fulbright Commission Orientation Conference, attended by 40 people.

### Information for the Prospective Teacher

#### Location

The Robert College grounds, in Bebek, only twenty-five minutes from the center of Istanbul, comprise one hundred eighteen acres of land facing Asia across the Bosphorus. The American College for Girls is located in Arnavutkoy on seventy acres of woods and gardens, several miles from Robert College.

#### Terms of Employment

Remuneration at the Colleges is kept as nearly competitive with teaching salary levels in the U.S. as is permitted by a budget that carries a heavy additional burden of transportation costs. Total compensation consists of : a salary paid in Turkish liras, an American salary paid in U.S. dollars, and maintenance. The lira salary paid in Turkey, is subject to Turkish income tax which amounts to 20-25% of the total lira stipend. The dollar component paid in the U.S. or elsewhere outside of Turkey is not subject to tax provided the recipient live abroad not less than eighteen months. Maintenance includes quarters furnished with essential pieces of furniture, heating provided by the Colleges, electricity, meals and laundry. The Colleges provide families with a house or apartment with essential pieces of furniture including a refrigerator and a stove. The cost of basic repairs, as well as rental charges, are assumed by the Colleges.

The cost of round trip transportation between the point of hire and Istanbul for the appointee and family is borne by the Colleges on the basis of a three year appointment. An allowance is also made to help defray the cost of shipment of excess personal effects.

Other benefits include the standard social security payments, one-half the cost of medical and hospital insurance (Blue Cross and Blue Shield are available), free medical consultation at the Infirmary. The Colleges participate in the Teacher's Insurance and Annuity Plan (TIAA). Tuition is also paid for appointees' children attending Robert College Community School (grade one through nine).

#### Rewards for the Teacher

Professionally there is the opportunity for personal growth through new experiences and the development of new fields of interest. Vacation periods are generous and there is time for travel, recreation or research. Teaching and living in Turkey at the crossroads of Europe and Asia with the opportunity to influence its youth is a decided challenge. It is also a great responsibility. The task before the teacher who goes abroad today is not merely to educate the young people of another country but also to demonstrate that a sound educational enterprise is among the most effective contributors to the development of a free society.


In none of these are the articles you cite nor any others on Mexican plant life.

Since this Mexico was published in Los Angeles and is devoted primarily to the Arts it is apparently not the periodical you wish.

Could this perhaps be Mexico Forestal (Sociedad Forestal Mexicana) published in Mexico, beginning with January 1923?
