


Dear Ida:

Thank you for your letter of September 28, with a copy of your report to Mr. Sprow. You now have a job cut out for you in finding funds to publish your bibliography. I hope that the proper doors will open for you so that this question can be settled soon. You list a half dozen places where you will look for help. I would be surprised if AIBS, the Smithsonian Institution, or the New York Botanical Garden had funds for a job of this magnitude, but it is always helpful to talk with people who may have brilliant suggestions for you. If the Hunt Library wishes to extend its publication program, it seems to me that your bibliography would give them a wonderful opportunity to make an international impression with a work right in line with their interests.

Thank you for bringing in the copy of "Inter-American Review of Bibliography." I was glad to see this article.

You also brought your entries on my own papers, which appear to be correct, except that Studies in Penstemon III on the Section Cryptostemon should be deleted, as this concerned an upper Californian species. I do not have a copy of that paper in my office to check, but I do not recall that there was a reference to Mexican species in it.

Dear Mrs. Langman:

Thank you very much for your thoughtfulness in having sent the article. I'd not seen it and shall send it on to Bertha's family. They arrived en masse a couple of weeks ago, but now have returned to Arizona.

Glad that you enjoy teaching. I'd like it if it weren't so beastly time-consuming. At the moment, I'm in a terrific maelstrom (spelling?), what with four lectures a week, on South America. And a new course, with very little library material to serve as fodder. In addition, I have a small seminar, which sometimes lasts all day. And, still in addition, I have odd students who show up at all times (one arrived bright and early on Easter Sunday), for assistance with their private research problems. The latter is particularly burdensome at times, but if any local student is genuinely interested, far be it from me to discourage him.

Just the same, it will be a relief when the semester is past, come July, and I'm just hoping I can hold out until then. The past six months have been pretty gruelling. Not only for obvious reasons, but also because I've had a devil of a time with bronchial infection resulting from the dust storms all spring. I've not dared travel very far from the penicillin mask, and since there is only one in Mexico City, the competition sometimes is sprightly.


To boot, I've been working under forced draught, in an effort to mop up on the first volume of the Totonac opus. If it is not in the hands of the printer by July 1, our branch of the Smithsonian stands to lose 12,000 dollars publication allotment--which would be fatal, not only to the Institute of social anthropology, but also to my job. So I've been grubbing 12 to 14 hours a day, and have taken only one Sunday off since the first of November. Just like you, I've been foisting the offering on the editors on the installment plan--and a couple of hours ago, finished the very last line, definitively. In fact, the remaining parcels are all packed, save one, which is left open until my student assistant checks some notes he wrote to accompany one of the tables. It will be a relief to have the thing off my hands, and I take rather grim satisfaction in knowing that the editor will be doing the sweating for the next

few months. I've had a fair amount of editorial experience and know that the report really is in good shape. But since it runs to something over 1200 pages, just reading it will be a chore. Perhaps you may be interested in one of the appendices, which contains what amounts virtually to a check list of Tetonac plants. I hope it may be of use to botanists and geographers. In any case, it goes on record.

Under the circumstances, I can understand pretty well the problems you face in preparing your manuscript--but, of course, bibliography is rather a special problem. And a very narsty one, since every comma must be in the right place, and the whole business entirely consistent in handling. And not even the Library of Congress is infallible, for we checked our little bibliography (not more than 40 or 50 pages, I should guess) against the LC entries, and in several cases found the latter to be in error. Needless to say, I shall look forward to having a squaint at your opus. And I hope you're planning to send trial copies to some of the bibliographers, for a professional is going to be in a position to be much more helpful than I.

No more. This is Sunday evening, and I'm trying to grind out a few letters before tackling next week's lectures.

Dear Mrs. Langman:

As you may know, Mrs. Parkins is on leave for several months. Your letter of December 16th to her has been forwarded to me for reply.

The rumor to which you refer concerning a grant for a special study in the plant taxonomy field is a distortion of the fact. Last year BIOSIS received a grant from the National Science Foundation to re-engineer its system for the entire processing scheme, including editing and indexing. As a part of the indexing study, we elected to examine the authority files used for taxonomic reference and indexing, to coordinate those authorities and update our master files. Financial support for this portion of the overall re-engineering project, relatively speaking, was nil. Nevertheless, BIOSIS recognized the importance of this and has undertaken it with the limited resources available. If the kind of job that is needed is to be done, it will be necessary to make a proposal to the National Science Foundation for substantial support. This proposal has not been made as the idea is still in the early formative stage.

From the foregoing statements, it is obvious that the rumor is only half true. I regret that we do not have a situation where we could employ you part time at the rate you suggest. I hope the circumstance will change in the near future, but at this point it is much too early to say.

Although you will not be returning the references and transcripts directly with your application as these will be sent to us by others, we urge you to submit the reference forms and your request for transcripts at the same time that you make application to TEEA. Experience has shown that it takes a considerable time to get this material back, and we are unable to select an applicant until his dossier is complete.

Thank you for your cooperation. As soon as all materials are in, your folder will be reviewed to determine whether or not you meet the basic criteria of the project. In the event you pass the initial screening, you will be interviewed and asked to take a short battery of tests prior to final selection.

Upon receipt of your application, we will send you the Form 85 Security Investigation Data and two copies of Form 87 Civil Service Commission Fingerprint Chart for you to fill out and return to this office immediately.

Jim graduates from high school this June and has been accepted by the "skin of his teeth" I'm sure, at Michigan State University.


