The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.


We can loan you our copy of Bertha Baron's Ph.D. thesis through a recognized library. You mentioned the University of Pennsylvania in your letter of June 15. This is perfectly acceptable.

This incurs a cost of \$2.22 each way to the borrower. 
I am remiss in answering your letter of January 6th - it got in the wrong pile of papers on my desk!

I was also in error concerning the original description of Cereus maritimus Jones, in saying that it was an unsigned article. Jones described several plants in a note titled "New plants from California and Nevada, etc.", which appeared in two parts in volume 17 of the American Naturalist. Sisymbrium acuticarpum was described on page 875, and was reported "Near head of the Valley of Palms, Mexico, and within a few miles of the California boundary, April 7, 1882." In a continuation of the note or article, on pages 93-94, he described Cereus maritimus from "Encinada, Mexico, April, 1882." This note was signed Marcus E. Jones, Salt Lake City, Utah, on page 974. I guess that I failed to note that the article was signed.

I don't know if we will write up anything about the last Mexican trip. Dr. Moran is quite busy, and we didn't find anything very newsworthy. Of course some of the scientific results will appear later on.

We are very interested in the progress of your Mexican botanical bibliography. That is good work!

Dr. Moran told me about your visit. I am sorry to have been away while you were here, because your work is of particular interest to us.




This is to acknowledge your letter of October 9 concerning your book "Selected Guide to the Literature on Mexican Flowering Plants."
