To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.




Your letter of July 28 has survived the perils and delays of several forwardings to reach me safely here in New York. Thank you very much for your kind words on the tomato paper. I particularly value them, since I know you by reputation as thorough and careful bibliographer. It was also most gratifying to find that the work had been even of slight value to you in your monumental undertaking. May you have enough strength, patience-- and soap and water-- to see it through.

In checking your questions I have been handicapped by having neither manuscript nor notes with me here. I am afraid, therefore, that my answers depend almost solely on a memory somewhat dimmed by a year of quite different activity.

1. There seems little doubt that the title in the first cross-reference on page 294 is incorrect. It should correctly refer to the "Kreuterbuch." The date 1596 on page 301 must be a typographical error. It is correctly "1586."
2. My treatment of the two editions of Theatrum Botanicum (1696 & 1744) follows the treatment accorded them in the Sturtevant Pre-Linnean library at the Missouri Botanical Garden. Without having the volumes at hand, I am unable to justify it beyond that. Should you have reason to disagree, I should be very interested in hearing it.
3. In all cases the bold face date refers not to date of publication but to the date on which the quoted material refers to the tomato. In this case the work Les Plantes Alimentaires was published in 1927, but it contains a reference to the use of the tomato in 1760.

If I can be of any more help to you, and I am afraid this information will be of little use to you, please do not hesitate to let me know.


The paper about which you inquired in your letter of the 14th instant, *La Geografia del Istmo de Tehuantepec*, should be in the library of the School of Philosophy and Letters, National University of Mexico. Several copies were left with Geogge Vivo (at that time Chairman of the Geography Department) to be deposited in that library. Maps and diagrams were a prominent part of the work. Each copy of the work had an envelope attached in the back in which these were enclosed. The paper would have little value without the maps.

I wrote the thesis in Spanish and I have no knowledge of a translation. I have a copy of the work which is in Spanish.

If you have attempted any library research in a Mexican library you may understand the lack of efficiency in these libraries. Some branches of the University library had materials that had been piling up for years without indexing or classification when I was in the University.

I trust you may be able to use this in your bibliography--there is an excellent chapter on vegetation, along with at least one map.

Dear Mrs. Langman:

This is in reply to your letter of April 1. We regret that our reply has been delayed because of unusual pressures of other work.

The document which you saw in this Division on previous visits is cataloged as: *Recetarios medicinales del Maya*. It is an 89-page photocopy, exclusive of the title page and its verso. I am enclosing two contura copies of the title page in order to facilitate any comparisons you may wish to make with the material that you used at Tulane. Unfortunately, the copies are of a very poor quality because of the lack of contrast on the material being copied. I have had the Spanish words printed on one copy.

As you probably know, the bibliographic control over the Indian Language materials in this Division is provisional and incomplete. A list prepared by the Hispanic Foundation, for administrative circulation only, indicates that the *Recetarios medicinales del Maya* is a William Edmond Gates photoreproduction. The list further indicates that the Library of Congress item was reproduced from an item in the Robert Garrett Collection, Division of Manuscripts and Rare Books of the Princeton University Library. (It is not specified whether or not the Princeton item is itself a photocopy or the original.) In 1937 William E. Gates issued a brochure, The Maya Society and its Work (Publication 19 [Baltimore, 1937]), in which he provided an inventory of 521 items. The "Recetarios" is given as item 144 on this list.

Gates sold or presented copies of the same material to a number of institutions, including the Middle American Research Institute at Tulane, but I have no way of relating this Division's item with the 1910 item which you saw at Tulane. I am sorry that I am unable to be more helpful.

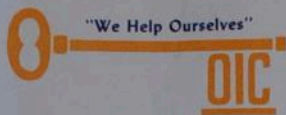

1,200 in Poverty Program Start 'Confidence' Classes

Twelve hundred Philadelphians today began a 180-hour job preparation course at the Opportunities Industrialization Center, Broad and Diamond sts.

The subjects to be studied will include basic reading, writing and speaking, grooming and hygiene, history and minority groups, and the proper way to use government services such as welfare and unemployment insurance.

The Rev. Leon H. Sullivan, program director, said that a \$333,000 grant from the U. S. Department of Labor's Office of Manpower and Automation is making it all possible.

"Feeder Program"

Those who complete this "feeder program," Mr. Sullivan said, will be admitted to another OIC school for job-skill training.

The OIC now operates such a school at 19th and Oxford sts. It hopes to open similar schools in West Philadelphia, South Philadelphia and Germantown, with a \$2.1 million grant from the federal antipoverty office.

Mr. Sullivan told the 1,200 taking the course this morning,

"Your teachers have been carefully chosen to help you with your subjects. A good deal, of course, depends upon you. Your attitude, attendance and work habits will do much to make you progress. Your growth will depend on how much you help yourselves."

Brainwashed

Mr. Sullivan said that Negroes must be taught confidence and must have improved attitudes before they can expect to handle jobs.

"They have been brainwashed for more than 100 years into believing they are inferior," he added. "We are trying to wipe that brainwashing away."

Frederick E. Miller, director of the feeder program, said it will employ about 40 teachers, including some from the Philadelphia public school system, at night.

Courses will be from 9 until noon, 1 P. M. to 4 P. M. and 7 P. M. to 10 P. M.

Some of the courses being taught at the 19th and Oxford sts. center include drafting, electronics, chemistry laboratory, machine tool operation, sheet metal, teletype and restaurant practices.

I have finished going over your manuscript, in the most casual way, I must admit. There are parts that I have not looked at at all. The suggested corrections that I have made are all mostly minor details.

As I have gone over the work I have realized that the most important thing is the organization, or perhaps I should say the classification of the entries. It may be that you will have to fall back on a purely alphabetical arrangement by author. As I told you, I do think that a classified arrangement would be more useful, but that is only true if the classification is logical and consistent. I am sorry to say that I feel that your arrangement is highly confused. Your general headings—Economic Botany, Taxonomic Botany, and Plant Geography [not a good term; it really ought to be called "Floristic Section"]—sound all right but the articles are not really classified in this way.

Taxonomy, as usually conceived, deals with classification, identification, phylogeny, and nomenclature. The great bulk of the papers that you cite under the taxonomic section do not deal with these matters. Take, for instance, the entries under Agave, which number over 100. Not more than about 10 of these deal with the taxonomy of Agave. A good many deal with sisal and henequen and belong consequently under Economic Plants, subsection Fiber Plants. Those which deal with the species cultivated for producing pulque and tequila belong under Economic Plants, subsection Beverage Plants. Other entries which deal solely or primarily with the chemistry of Agave belong under none of your headings but under a main section on Biochemistry. I haven't checked to see if there are any such, but other entries could conceivably deal with the cytology of Agave, the genetics, or the ecology. None of these are taxonomy, but each belongs under a separate main heading.

The section on Plant Geography is equally confused. Such a section should properly be limited to works that would be classified as floristic, i.e. such as deal with the kinds of plants occurring in


particular regions, and this means native plants, or at least plants that are naturalized. Works on ecology as such have no place under a heading Plant Geography or Floristics. Nor have works on agriculture. To choose an example at random, take entry ~~4692~~ 5344 "Geografia elemental del estado de Queretaro. Textbook with brief section on Agriculture." This obviously has nothing to do with Plant Geography. It belongs under Economic Plants in a section Agriculture in General in a subsection By States (or other local geographic areas). Or take entry 4692 under Campeche "Tres cultivos de importancia para Campeche. Cacao, rice, sugar". The only reason that this is classified under Plant Geography is because Campeche is mentioned in the title. However, the article does not deal primarily with Campeche but with three cultivated plants, and the reference belongs under Economic Plants, presumably three times, under cacao, rice, and sugar.

These comments indicate how difficult it is to classify works, a fact well known to librarians. The trouble with your classifications fundamentally is that it is too simplified, more simplified than it is possible to be. I still think a classified arrangement is best, but not if it would mean that you would have to examine hundreds of papers over again in order to reclassify them. If I ~~were~~ were going about something like this I would get myself a Library of Congress classification book and follow that in classifying my entries. It will give a linear order as logical as any. Agriculture in general will be followed by Agriculture Regional and then by Agriculture, Special Crops, etc. I don't envy you the job of reclassifying all your entries but I am afraid that it has to be done. Even if you decide on an alphabetical arrangement for the main entries it will be necessary to provide a classified index for the work to be usable at all. And it is better to decide on the proper categories now before doing any further work.

I'll turn the manuscript over to Dr. Smith now. He may have some additional comments. It will be returned to you in a few days.


Thank you for your letter of December 4. You need not feel at all apologetic about your manuscript. As I told you, or if I didn't I intended to, I do think it is very much worth while and needed and should be carried forward. I should indeed be very glad to write a letter seconding your application for a grant. Unfortunately, I don't know just where funds might be available.

As to the rearrangement of the manuscript you will have to let your conscience be your guide. Changing the main headings would serve to indicate better what you have in mind, but it wouldn't help at all in solving the fundamental problem of grouping together the entities that logically belong together. I truly can't see the logic of placing an entry dealing with sisal and hemp under Economic Botany-Fiber Plants [because more than one plant is treated] and another dealing with sisal alone in an entirely different section Taxonomic Botany or whatever you want to call it. It is true that subdivision of the entries under the latter heading into Taxonomic and Economic would help to make the book more usable but it wouldn't solve the logical difficulty, and it would mean just as much work as if the entries were resorted into wholly different headings. And when you get to your geographic section subdivision would become exceedingly complicated. Take for instance a paper "Sisal in Veracruz". Since it deals with only a single kind of plant you might put it under your "Taxonomic" section under Agave. However, since Veracruz is mentioned in the title you would probably put it under Geographic Botany, but to do so would be to be guided by words alone rather than by content. To my mind, it would belong definitely under Economic Botany-Fiber Plants-Sisal, and I wouldn't think that even a cross reference would be necessary under Taxonomic Botany or Veracruz. Or take a paper "The genus Quercus in Sonora" (don't look it up; it's purely fictitious!) should not be under Geographic Botany-Sonora, but under Taxonomic Botany-Fagaceae-Quercus. I'm afraid that I can't agree that your classification would be more usable than the L.C. classification.

I must still insist that my examination of the manuscript was casual. There are literally hundreds of entries that I didn't even glance at, particularly in the Geographic and Economic sections. When the manuscript is really finished I will be glad to go over it more carefully.

Thank you for your invitation. I have never been in Philadelphia, except in transit, but I may get there some time.







That fact plus the relatively fragile condition of our volumes makes us unwilling to circulate this title on interlibrary loan.

You will note that the ULS shows the California State Library at Sacramento has the set complete; the Huntington Library at San Marino, California, has incomplete volumes 1 - 10; Leland Stanford University has incomplete volumes 6 and 10; Harvard University has volumes 6, 10 and 11 incomplete and New York City Public Library has volume 10 complete.

I am sorry that I overlooked answering an enquiry from you of long ago. I've just come across your card.

I should prefer using Alismataceae rather than Alismaceae. I have myself used Smilacaceae, but as usual the correctness is a matter of personal preference.

I use Euphorbia in an inclusive sense. It is a large genus, but no larger than some others. And if one begins to split it up there seems no end of segregates possible. The true Euphorbia subg. Euphorbia is African or at least Old World and there are no American species other than introduced ones. (But some of these are common in cultivation in Mexico.) If the American are segregated they will go into Poinsettia, Tithymalus, [^]namaesyce, Euphorbiodendron, etc.

I think that Boivin's list of families in Bull. Soc. Bot. France (1956) is all right to use, although I would prefer using the straight system of Hutchinson, Families of Flowering Plants, ed. 2, which is a more standard and authoritative work. I don't think that many botanists would go along with Boivin's major divisions, which include such barbarisms as Welwopsida, Dicopsida, Lignidae, etc.

I expect that these opinions are too late to do you any good, since I imagine that the working of editing has about been finished. Sorry to let you down.

Dear Dr. Hasler:

I am not sure whether this should go to you or to Dr. Farnworth, Project Manager of the Tropical Ecology Workshop. If you decide to forward it to Dr. Farnworth, please accept my thanks for your cooperation in doing so.

I have just received the pre-publication synopsis of the results of the Tropical Ecology Workshop and found it of considerable interest. Since my interests lie in botanical bibliography, I would have liked to see more emphasis on that aspect of research as contributing to the activities of the workshop and, for that reason, I am writing to inquire what arrangements are being made along these lines. Since I have just finished my work for the Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, I am interested in making connections with another group, particularly in the tropics.

As the author of the Selected Guide to the Literature on the Flowering Plants of Mexico, I have lived and travelled in Mexico for three and a half years. Before that I worked at the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia, as a museum teacher. Then, before joining Hunt, I was bibliographer for the Index Nominum Genericorum Project, at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C. Work for the Hunt Institute sent me to Spain and Portugal for slightly more than six months. I am practically bilingual in Spanish and English, and can manage fairly well in Portuguese. I can also translate (in biology) from French, Italian, German and Dutch.

Among the participants in your workshop who knew me, are the following: Jose Sarukhan, Arturo Gomez Pampa, Loren Neuling, Enrique Beltran, and in Wisconsin, Hugh Iltis.

Eight principal investigators (PI's) were chosen to direct the project. These individuals (Drs. F. Colley, R. Inger, D. Janzen, E. Medina, W. Milstead, J. Milton, H. Mooney, and J. Tosi) represented a broad range of tropical interest and expertise. The principal investigators met in Washington, D.C. on April 17, 1972 to organize and plan the project.

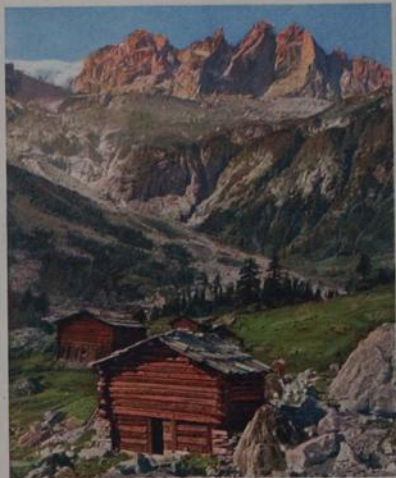

Dear Ida,

As you see by the heading I am many miles from Mt. Pisano. I came here nearly three weeks ago with my two sisters, a three weeks which I have much enjoyed. We came by automobile and stopped overnight at Vassar College and at Dorset, Vt.

I was very glad indeed to get your letter and to learn of your experiences since I last saw you. It must be a satisfaction to you to have received your B. S. and to really enjoy your teaching.

Good teaching ought to be
a pleasure both for the
teacher and the pupils.

I have heard Miss Fieber-
mann speak of Dr. Leipzig's
course. She enjoyed them, too.

I was especially interest-
ed in what you had to say
about the birds. The cottage
we are occupying is right
in the woods and near the
shore of a beautiful lake,
so we see and hear a variety
of birds. In the evening the
loons, sand-pipers and whif-
pon-wills sound their calls
and by day we hear the
songs of hermit thrushes,
reebles, peewees and vireos.

One reason the birds are

so numerous is that there are
no cats in the neighborhood.
During the early part of the
month three different species
were raising families within
a stone's throw of the house.
Very near the back door a
red-eyed vireo had swung
her nest on a drooping
branch of a maple tree. It
was great fun to watch the
little ones stretch up their
bald heads and open wide
their mouths when either
parent alighted on the branch.
A little over a week ago we
found the nest empty and

a day or two later saw the entire family prepared to spend the night on the branch of a pine tree, the three fledglings snuggling together with the parent at either end. We have no camera and so could not take their pictures.

Not far from the vireo's nest three young vireos grew to adolescence, their plumage so nearly like the fallen leaves in color that it was difficult to discern them. Besides, they remained almost motionless except when they were being fed.

A third nest belonged to a black and white creeping

warbler. It also was in the ground at the base of a tree near the piazza, covered with dead leaves and with an entrance just large enough for the bird's body.

It is interesting to notice the difference in the flora of this region as compared to Pennsylvania. Grasses are scarce and red wood lilies abundant. The dainty *Pyrola* or shin-leaf grows everywhere in the woods but no Laurel or rhododendrons. In the swamps there are

cranberries, pitcher-plants
and beautiful orchids.

We like particularly to go
hunting on the lake after
supper to get the beautiful
color effects on the water
and sky and the wooded
hills.

Thank you so much for
your suggestion about a
vacation in the Pronos. I
have often heard it spoken
of as a lovely place but
have never been there. Some
day perhaps I shall go, but
not this summer. I'm glad
you're having a good time
there.






