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#### *About the Institute*

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Apareció bajo el título de HISTORIA DE LA FUNDACION DE LIMA, con un prólogo de Manuel González de la Rosa (Lima, 1882); y ha sido reeditada en el primer tomo de las MONOGRAFÍAS HISTÓRICAS SOBRE LA CIUDAD DE LIMA (Lima, 1935), pp. 3-317. La tercera parte, desconocida hasta la fecha, trataba sobre México y Filipinas.

Por lo tanto, el dato ofrecido por Nicolás León es exacto e inexacto al mismo tiempo, ya que la edición aparecida en Lima el año 1882 no afecta al texto publicado en Sevilla, durante los años 1890-1893, pero es parte de la Historia del Nuevo Mundo.

Los mss. originales de la primera parte y del fragmento conocido de la segunda, se encuentran en Sevilla (Biblioteca Colombina y Biblioteca Universitaria), según lo han dado a saber Manuel González de la Rosa y, recientemente, el R. P. Rubén Vargas Ugarte.

Para estudiar la personalidad y la obra del P. Bernabé Cobo existe bibliografía peruana muy ilustrativa, a saber:

y Raúl Porras Barrenechea le dedica un interesante capítulo en su obra inédita sobre Cronistas del Perú, 1527-1650.

In Webster's Dictionary, we find AVA=the Kava, also KAVA KAVA KAVA is either of two Australasian shrubby pieces of pepper from which an intoxicating beverage is made, the root being crushed, formerly by chewing. The root also yields a crystalline acid, kava.

In pharmacy it is the dried rhizome of this shrub used as a diuretic and genitourinary antiseptic.

I just returned from the Latin American Library and browsed through Volume 1; also, Volume 2. These are the only two copies which the library has and the latter volume is lacking No. 11 of the 14 parts that were published that year (1926).

Volume 1 has the following articles on botany, if you can call it that: Volume 1, No. 4, June 15, 1925, page 3, cotton article; page 4, ✓ article on useful plants, namely Nerium; No. 5, page 3, article on seeds; No. 6, page 1, cotton article; page 4, article on useful plants; ✓ No. 13, page 5, Useful Plants from the State of Tamaulipas. This article ✓ was continued to page 11 in the same number, and the author is apparently M. Castañeda. 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


