The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.



Later, we joined several Easterners in sending out demonstration playground teams. These finally brought organized recreation to all U.S.A. Finally came the playground work Mrs. Goethe and I inaugurated in China, Japan, the Philippines, Java and Hindustan, also in Europe.

Above is mentioned as evidence that We-two, over 40 years, intensely have been interested in planned recreation. One gain therefrom is backfire against juvenile delinquency, other social maladjustments.

Said Orphanage work included kiddies' gardening. Notes thereon were accumulated. Came also our travels under practically every flag. Thus was deepened the conviction that the natural urge to garden can perhaps be linked with another natural urge:- Wanderlusting. Came in this way the writing of a book:- "Geogardening" now is coming off the press. This, unlike my earlier books, will not be offered for sale. The entire edition will be distributed where one hopes it may help awaken in others the joy of "geogardening".

Soon I will send your Library a copy with my compliments.



Dear Mr. Goldschmidt:

Some weeks ago when my friend Dr. Julian Huxley was in Berkeley I told him that I was anxious to make my twenty years experience in South America and my many contacts there pay dividends in terms of increasing international understanding, respect and goodwill, particularly between the two Americas. He suggested that you might be interested and that I might use his name in introducing myself to you.

Enclosed is a statement supplementing biographical information in Who's Who, American Men of Science, etc. with emphasis upon my activities in South America. Particularly in Colombia, Peru, Chile and Argentina I have numerous friends, apart from my botanical colleagues, who occupy positions of some importance in government or business. In some instances I have been the invited guest (including maintenance and transportation) of the republics I served. More often I have been able to offer my services without remuneration of any sort. The Spanish translation (Buenos Aires 1944) of my "Plant Hunters in the Andes" (New York 1941, London 1950) was well received in Latin America. I have written numerous scientific articles on the character and distribution of the vegetation of the west coast of South America certain of which have been useful in increasing agricultural self-sufficiency, especially in Chile and Peru. My reception in the republics above mentioned upon my periodic returns to South America indicate that I am personally acceptable and that my past services are appreciated.

On the basis of some knowledge of the activities and personnel of the F.A.O. and "Point 4" organizations in South America and of a variety of special advisory groups sent there I believe that my South American background and contacts, referred to above and in the enclosed, should make me useful in at least certain of the projects which are being advanced through international cooperation.

I was retired from this University July 1st and immediately reemployed on a full-time basis to June 30, 1955. Thereafter I should prefer to accept foreign service rather than continued reemployment. Indeed, in accordance with this University's pension provisions it is probable that further re-employment will not be offered.

At present I have an invitation from the Consejo Superior de Investigaciones Cientificas of the Spanish government to spend three months in Spain to advise concerning the work of Agricultural Experiment Stations and to lecture on the practical agricultural significance of scientific research in the

plant sciences and other technical topics. The Consejo will provide maintenance and travel in Spain for my wife and myself but not transportation to Spain and return. The Department of State now has under consideration a grant to cover cost of at least my own transportation overseas, necessary to permit me to accept this invitation.

I would much appreciate your reaction to my belief that my training and experience should enable me to be of service in programs of international cooperation and any advice you may care to give me concerning means by which my case might receive consideration.

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

Dear Mr. Goodspeed,

I am most apologetic about not having replied more promptly to your letter of 1 December. My delay indicates a pressure of work rather than a lack of appreciation for your offer of assistance to the programme. I am always most gratified, both officially and from the standpoint of my personal convictions, when individuals of your recognized standing indicate their willingness to participate actively in the work we are trying to do.

Unfortunately for us, we are not in a position to take advantage of your offer. This is a joint programme of the United Nations and the specialized agencies and all requests for expert advice in the field of botany are sent to the Food and Agriculture Organization. I have, however, taken the liberty of writing to Sir Herbert Broadley, who is responsible for the technical assistance activities of that agency, to let him know of your possible availability. I am sure that you will hear from him. Because their operations are so completely outside my jurisdiction, I am unfamiliar with their precise staff needs; but I should think that they would welcome your collaboration should a suitable opening exist.

Dear Dr. Gomez:

Following our conversation of some weeks ago I have given much thought to the proposal we discussed to establish, in conjunction with the development of the National Botanical Garden at El Salto, an "Institute of Agricultural Research" devoted primarily to scientific research in plant nutrition appropriate for solving certain of the pressing agricultural problems of Chile. We agreed that it is essential, both from the national and the international standpoints, that your noble Republic become, in terms of food supply, as self-sufficient as possible by exploiting to the maximum Chile's agricultural potential.

I understand that it is your intention to undertake the development of the proposed Institute under the auspices and with the financial support of the great University of which you are the Rector. I further understand that you hope that support for certain aspects of this undertaking can be obtained in the United States. To assist in obtaining such support you asked me to act as your official representative.

In order to obtain the desired assistance from Foundations, the Government and other agencies in this country I must be assured that sufficient funds will be appropriated by the University of Chile (and, presumably, by the Government of Chile via the Ministry of Agriculture also) to provide the indispensable basic facilities required for the initial development of the proposed Institute and for its continued operation.

Based upon my long contact with the National Botanical Garden I believe that the following are indispensable:

I. Facilities

- 1) improved water supply, including additional pumps, tanks, and distributing systems
- 2) new building to contain laboratories, library, herbarium, and office -- all with proper heating, lighting, etc.
- 3) new greenhouses with temperature and other controls
- 4) improved fire protection, fencing, roads and paths

II. Staff -- an annual appropriation for salaries of:

- 1) Technical staff -- director, botanist, plant physiologists, laboratory technicians, clerk, stenographer
- 2) Maintenance personnel -- head gardener, assistant head gardener, trained gardeners, foremen, laborers

III. Materials -- an annual appropriation for chemicals, glassware, plants, office supplies, etc.

In other words, I wish to have assurance that the University and/or the Government of Chile will provide the Institute with funds for:

- I. new or improved basic facilities
- II. salaries of the necessary technical and maintenance staff
- III. materials for its work

and that these funds will be continuous over a period of years.

If financial support in Chile for the above can be assured I would assist in securing the following for the initial development of the "Institute of Agricultural Research":

- 1) grants of funds to purchase laboratory, library and herbarium equipment for new building
- 2) cooperation in obtaining reductions in cost of equipment (to be purchased by you) for improving water supply and distribution
- 3) cooperation in obtaining reductions in cost of greenhouses and their equipment

I would also attempt to secure Fellowships for:

- 1) North American scientists to assist in the initial development of research programs at the Institute
- 2) Chilean scientists to obtain in the United States further technical training for carrying out the research programs of the Institute

I am happy to report that I have already obtained cooperation toward securing such assistance in this country from the International Science Foundation in San Francisco. Mr. R. L. Champion, Executive Director of the International Science Foundation, has assured me that the Foundation is interested in aiding the development of the "Institute of Agricultural Research" in any way within its means. Mr. Champion has indicated that the International Science Foundation will be willing to work with me on the problem of obtaining grants from the Rockefeller or other similar foundations and in presenting project proposals to United States Government agencies.

Please accept, my dear Mr. Rector, the assurances of my highest consideration and extend to Senora de Gomez Mrs. Goodspeed's and my best wishes and kindest regards.

The city of Porto Alegre, head of the State of Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil, has 400.000 people.

The State Department of Public Works has appointed a 11 members committee to build up a Botanical Garden in a 200 acres area (about 80 hectares) just on the city border and at 5 km (3 miles) from down-town.

The committee is formed by teachers, botanists, gardening and floresty amateurs and landscape architects, some of them have visited, years ago, foreign countries.

As a member of the committee, I hope to have the cooperation of your Botanical Garden and so I am asking the special favour of sending me:

- a) a plan of your Botanical Garden showing the roads, the sections, in order to give an idea of the general plan;
- b) any album or set of photographs, if available, to illustrate the different sections and the views;
- c) and, in case you have under printed form, the last report of the Board of Directors;
- d) also, please, let me know if the area of your garden is divided according the flora of the world geographic regions, or if it is divided according the main different botanical groups of plants.
- e) The 11 men committee does not receive any salary and his cooperation is based upon his love for the idea of giving a Botanical Garden to our city.

Dear Mr. Doelker:

I am considering a continuation of our South American botanical exploration which has been going on for the past fifteen years, by sending one of my assistants on a former expedition, Mr. Walter J. Eyerdam, of Seattle, to Ecuador. I wish him to collect plants and seeds from Guayaquil north along the coast and principally in the botanically unknown coastal mountains of Depto. Manabí. He would leave in November or December of this year and return in May or June, 1951. This expedition like previous ones would be under the auspices of the University of California Botanical Garden, of which I am Director.

In the past W. R. Grace and Co. has generously cooperated with me by transportation without charge collecting equipment to South America and the plant material we collected from South America to California. Also some discount on passenger fares by freighter has been allowed, in view of the scientific nature of our South American work.

Before attempting to secure from friends of the University the funds necessary to finance this expedition I will need an estimate of transportation costs. I believe that at times your ships leave from Astoria which would be a convenient embarkation point in Mr. Eyerdam's case. 

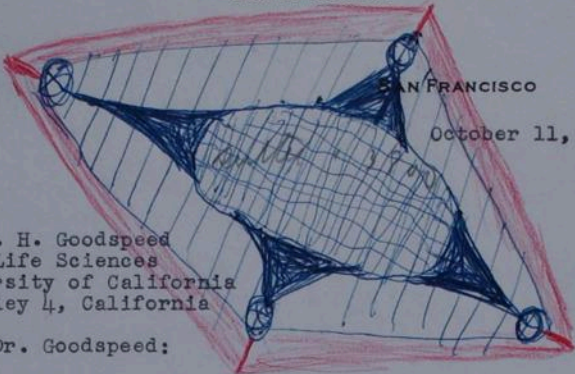

Dear Mr. Lillevand:

Confirming our conversation I am requesting the carrying without freight charges from San Francisco to Valparaiso, Chile of one Chevrolet carry-all, property of the State of California, University of California.

This automobile will be used from November to March or longer in Chile (possible in Peru and Argentina also) to assist greatly in my plant collecting and other investigations of the character and distribution of the vegetation of western South America.

Beginning in 1935 my assistants and I have been in South America five times and have collected plants and mapped vegetation from the equator to Magellan Strait on both flanks of the Andes. This research program has attracted world-wide attention because of the scientific importance of the information we have accumulated and the plant specimens obtained in South America which we have distributed to other botanical institutions in this country and abroad. In addition it has contributed to the improvement of agriculture on the west coast of South America.

The forthcoming expedition like previous expeditions has been designated by the University of California "The University of California Botanical Garden Expedition to the Andes". The Regents of the University have received large donations of funds for my South American research program from private individuals, the Rockefeller Foundation, the John Simon Guggenheim Foundation, the American Philosophical Society, the American Academy of Arts and Science, the Royal Horticultural Society of London, the Instituto Darwinio Buenos Aires, etc.

In appreciation of what my work has meant to South American republics I have been honored by governments and by membership in the leading scientific societies of Colombia, Peru, Chile, Argentinian and Uruguay and by honorary degrees and professorships in numerous South American universities. For the forthcoming expedition the Chilean Government is cooperating by remission of duties and granting me the equivalent of diplomatic status.

I trust that I have made clear the scientific importance of the research program toward the success of which the use of an automobile in South America will contribute. In the circumstances I hope that a concession can be made to permit the transportation of the above mentioned automobile without cost.



As indicated in our conversation of some days ago I will direct a 6th botanical expedition to South America this fall. It will collect plants and map vegetation in parts of Peru and Chile.

Five times in the past twenty years W. R. Grace and Co. has very generously carried our collecting equipment (and in one case a truck) from San Francisco to South American ports and the dried plant and other specimens from South America to San Francisco, without charge. A 25% reduction in passenger fares has also been allowed. I have had the utmost in cooperation from your representatives on the West Coast, particularly in Lima and Valparaiso.

I much appreciate your willingness to continue all this important cooperation in the case of my 1957-58 expedition. I hope to obtain a pick-up or a one and one-half ton truck to be transported from San Francisco to Lima and to be left in Peru. Our other equipment (primarily paper and plant driers and personal effects) will be packed in a relatively small number of wooden cases, some consigned to Lima and others to Valparaiso. On our return these cases will carry dried and other plant specimens to be shipped from Lima and Valparaiso to San Francisco. Is there a sailing from San Francisco to Lima which could carry our truck and cases to arrive Lima between June 15 and July 1?

We refer to your letter of April 26 and our previous exchange of conversation in connection with your 6th botanical expedition to South America this Fall.

As requested, we are arranging to reserve accommodations for one passenger aboard our combination cargo C2 type vessel sailing from Callao, Peru during October to San Francisco and also reserve similar accommodations for one passenger aboard this same type vessel sailing during October from San Francisco to Valparaiso returning from Valparaiso during March of next year, to San Francisco. We presume that this will be a male passenger to be accommodated three-in-room basis aboard the abovementioned sailings.

The cost covering the passage from Callao to San Francisco will amount to \$400.00 plus \$10.00 Callao Pier Tax. The round trip fare from San Francisco to Valparaiso and return will amount to \$900.00 plus \$28.90 Chilean taxes.

As you know our sailing schedules for October and next year have not as yet been set up, therefore we are not in a position to advise regarding specific sailing dates at this time.



Many thanks for your letter of May 2.

I would appreciate your reserving a 2-berth cabin on the approximately September 25 sailing of the Johnson Line MS LIONS GATE from San Francisco to Cristobal if it is possible that we can have reservations on the Santa Isabel sailing October 9th from Cristobal to Callao. I judge that the connection at Cristobal is relatively certain. Whether we should have better than a minimum double cabin Cristobal-Callao will, I presume, depend upon what reservations are available.

I hope that reductions in fares on the Santa Isabel can be granted and on a subsequent sailing from Callao to Valparaiso. On a number of occasions in the past this generous concession has been made on your New York-West Coast vessels between Cristobal and Valparaiso and from Callao to New York.



My dear Mr. Ambassador:

During the past twenty years Dr. T. H. Goodspeed, Professor of Botany and Director of the Botanical Garden, Emeritus, has directed five expeditions from the Botanical Garden of the University of California to study the character and distribution of the floras of Peru and other South American republics. The collections of plants which he has obtained have been shared with the scientific institutions of your country together with information concerning plant distribution which has economic importance for Peru. As Honorary Director of the Jardin Botanico de Lima and Honorary Professor of the Escuela Nacional de Agricultura, La Molina, Professor Goodspeed has on numerous occasions given lectures and scientific advice on matters botanical in your universities and scientific societies. The cooperation of your government has in the past greatly contributed to the success of his research.

From July to December of this year Professor Goodspeed plans to direct a 6th botanical expedition in Peru. Mr. Paul C. Hutchison, Senior Botanist in this Botanical Garden, and an assistant will arrive in Lima late in July; Professor Goodspeed will follow early in October. They expect to make plant collections in most of the Departamentos of Peru.

The following University of California collecting equipment and supplies required for this expedition will be carried by the Grace Line S. S. Santa Adela leaving San Francisco June 25th and arriving Callao on or about July 20th: Ford, 1 ton truck, which will be fully protected by public liability and property damage insurance; news print paper and felt and corrugated plant driers; glass jars for preservation of plant material in fluid; wooden plant presses and miscellaneous small items of equipment (separate list attached). The truck will be returned to this University by a Grace Line steamer leaving Callao between November 15 and December 1.

On departure from Peru unexpended collecting supplies will be given to La Molina or other Peruvian scientific institutions together with duplicates of the plant specimens obtained, as desired. During his stay in Peru

Professor Goodspeed will present lectures before a number of institutions.

May I request, in view of the strictly scientific character of the Peruvian research of the 6th University of California Botanical Garden Expedition and the cooperation with scientific institutions of your country which Professor Goodspeed proposes, that your government be asked to waive import and export restrictions and duties on the expedition's equipment arriving in and leaving from Callao. I might point out, again, that the truck which is the only non-expendable item of equipment, will be returned to this University at the termination of the expedition in Peru. It would also be extremely helpful if official credentials might be issued to Professor Goodspeed and Mr. Hutchison explaining to local authorities the nature and purpose of their activities in Peru.

Please accept, my dear Mr. Ambassador, my thanks in advance for your assistance in securing the above requested cooperation, my best wishes, and the expression of my highest consideration.



Confirming our telephone conversation following receipt of your letter of the 29th I understand: 1) that we have reservations on Johnson Line "Los Angeles" sailing from San Francisco on or about September 26th and on the "Santa Isabel" voyage 89 from Callao to Valparaiso November 20th. 2) that you will cancel reservations on voyage 91 of the "Santa Maria" Cristobal-Callao; 3) that you will retain reservations on voyage 91 of the "Santa Cecilia" Cristobal-Callao as long as possible; 4) that in connection at Cristobal of "Los Angeles" with "Santa Cecilia" appears impossible, you will secure two tourist reservations Panama-Lima on PAA or Braniff with not over one or two days stop over in Panama. 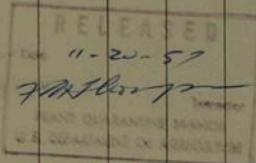

You will, I am sure, remember that the University of California has sent, under my direction, six botanical expeditions to western South America between 1935 and 1958.

The scientific importance of the plant collections made by these expeditions has attracted world-wide attention. Many new plants or plant products of agricultural, horticultural, medicinal and industrial significance were discovered. By mapping plant distribution and recording climatic and other pertinent data, previously unknown agricultural potentialities of Peru, Chile and Argentina were brought to light. The governments of those republics have acknowledged the importance to their economies of our accomplishments by presenting me with decorations and scientific degrees.

In many published accounts of the scientific results of the six expeditions attention has been called to the large share in our success attributable to the generosity of Grace and Co. in, each time, transporting, gratis, our equipment from and returning it and our collections to San Francisco. In reporting to agencies of South American governments on the local importance of our results I have uniformly referred to the assistance furnished by your organization.

During the 1951-52 and 1957-58 expeditions my collaborator was Mr. Paul C. Hutchison, Senior Botanist at the University of California Botanical Garden. He is a highly skilled scientist whose capacity and accomplishments are widely recognized. A seventh expedition to South America is proposed for 1963-64. I am not in a position personally to direct this new expedition and have assigned the task to Mr. Hutchison. I am entirely confident that he will have great success in this new project.

At my suggestion Mr. Hutchison will see you to discuss the possibility of continuation of past cooperation by Grace and Co. In other words this letter will serve as an introduction to you for Mr. Hutchison.

Expressing once more my sincere thanks and that of the University of California for your sustained and indispensable contributions to the success of our South American botanical expeditions and with all good wishes,

Dear Mr. Graham:

I have your letter of Nov. 20th. and regret that it was not possible to see you; particularly because I wished if possible to discuss with you personally the following matter.

As you may know I have long been concerned with the establishment of a National Botanical Garden in Chile. The history of my relation to this project and my reasons for considering it a sound one are referred to in the enclosed copy of a memorandum to the Alcalde of Viña del Mar.

When I left Chile in the spring of 1943 I felt reasonably confident that the Parque del Salitre at El Salto would become the site of the proposed Botanical Garden. At the request of the late Pres. Rios and the then Director de Agricultura, Dr. Casanueva, I had had meetings with certain of the Directors of the Salitre Company to discuss the matter. I gained the impression that a transfer of the property at El Salto to the Government was not out of the question and that the Ministry of Agriculture was prepared to appropriate funds for the proper development and maintenance of a Botanical Garden at the site in question. During the two weeks which I recently spent in Santiago and Valparaiso I found that, apparently, almost no progress has been made on the project.

I have been asked by Dr. Carlos Muñoz, Ministerio de Agricultura, by Dr. Fricke, Alcalde of Viña del Mar, and by a number of others to determine the possibility of reopening the matter. Information gained from various sources, including Mr. David Blair and Dr. Fricke, lead me to submit the following proposals as a possible solution of the problems which appear at present to stand in the way

of the development of a National Botanical Garden at El Salto.

(1) That the development of the area be in keeping with the objectives of similar institutions elsewhere in the world but with emphasis upon investigations which will have significance for the national economy. The plans which I prepared in 1943 will serve as an indication of what would be involved.

(2) That the cost of development be borne by the Min. de Agricultura with the assistance of the Munic. de Viña del Mar.

(3) That the Min. de Agricultura, the Salitre Co. and the Munic. de Viña del Mar unite in the annual maintenance cost of the Garden. In this case, the Salitre Co. would contribute funds up to the amount now being spent upon maintenance of the area and the other two agencies would together provide the considerably larger amount necessary to maintain the site when properly developed as a Botanical Garden.

(4) That the three agencies concerned become joint "owners" of the property now called Parque del Salitre, with the definite understanding that should the appropriation for maintenance from the Min. de Agricultura and/or the Mun. de Viña del Mar become so reduced that proper care of the area becomes impossible in any given year, the property would revert to the Salitre Company.

(5) That a "Board of Managers" (or some other appropriate title) made up of persons concerned with the national welfare be set up, with an "Executive Committee" consisting of one (or two) representatives of each of the three agencies; such "Executive Committee" to have sole administrative power.


(6) That the Min. de Agricultura appoint a Director of the Garden who shall be a sufficiently trained botanist and who shall be responsible to the "Executive Committee".

(7) That the relation and contribution of the Salitre Company to the project be recognized by calling the area in question "Jardín Botánico Nacional "Baburizza" or "El Salitre".

I referred to these proposals in a conversation with the American Ambassador who permits me to say that if and when desired he will express to the Chilean Government his general interest in the carrying out of a National Botanical Garden proposal. Needless to say, Mr. Bowers cooperation in this matter would be of the greatest importance. I am sending him a copy of this letter and

We were happy to have your letter and to know that you and Grayson find the new establishment in Reno so acceptable and variable. You are fortunate to have the sun and good air of the mountains. To date this has been a very gloomy and humid summer about San Francisco Bay. We had a week in Santa Barbara with our son and his wife, and I had three weekends in Bohemian Grove, which gave us some feeling that this is really the summer season. I think that I told you that we have been invited to attend a Botanical Congress in Argentina in October with all travel expenses paid. The University has given me two months leave of absence so that after the Congress we can finish the search for new plants of scientific, ornamental, and economic importance in the Andes, made possible in the past by Aunt Lora's generosity. Such additional plant information is necessary because when I began to publish our earlier results, to which you so kindly contributed, the gap in our knowledge of certain areas became apparent.

I am no longer physically able to do as much of the plant collecting at high altitudes and under other unfavorable conditions as I used to do. For this reason, I will need to hire local assistance in order to accomplish what I have in mind. Other friends and scientific institutions have made donations to the University for this purpose, but I still need \$800. I wonder whether you might care to provide all or a part of this sum. Since it would be a gift to the University, it would be deductible from income tax.

With many thanks for all your kindness to us, Florence and I send affectionate greetings to you and Grayson.



Dear Dr. Greenman:

The three University of California Botanical Garden Expeditions to the Andes (1935-43) made extensive collections of the species of Nicotiana native to South America. The genus has proved to be more polymorphic than previously appreciated and the collections illustrate range of morphological variation as well as of distribution. In addition to better known species such new ones as N. benavidesii, N. knightiana, N. arentsii, N. linearis, N. otophora, and N. cordifolia (known only from Mas a Fuera, Juan Fernandez Islands) were collected.

The limited amount of duplicate material obtained has been held for study but can now be distributed. It has been divided into four sets -- the first set to be deposited in the University of California Herbarium, and a second set in the Herbarium of the USDA. The two remaining sets, each containing approximately 235 specimens representing 27 of the 34 South American species recognized in a recent taxonomic reorganization of the genus (reprints enclosed), fully labelled and annotated, I am offering at 25¢ per specimen.

In addition, approximately 65 specimens of garden cultures grown at the University of California Botanical Garden can be made available, if desired, at the same price per specimen. Of these approximately 40, representing some 15 species, are from cultures grown from seed of the field collections. The additional 25 specimens are garden cultures of seed collections, for the most part of North American species. These add 9 species (6 North American and 3 South American) not represented in the field collections. Thus the field collections plus the garden cultures include 36 of the 43 North and South American species.

If you are interested in purchasing either the field collections alone (approximately 235 specimens), or the complete field and garden set (approximately 300 specimens) I should appreciate hearing from you soon, as I am anxious to have completed the clerical work involved in preparing and shipping the sets during the next few weeks while I have additional office assistance.

Enclosed are 21 annotation labels of Second and Third University of California Botanical Garden Expedition material which is in your Herbarium.
