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About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Dear Professor Bingham:

In conversation with Professor Boedberg I referred to Dr. Joseph F. Rock, the well known geographer and plant explorer in Asia, and his proposal to spend some time at this University in the near future to prepare monographs on the alpine vegetation of West China and Northeast Tibet and an Historical Geography of Northwest China and Portions of Tibet. The Royal Horticultural Society of London has requested the preparation of the former volume and perhaps proposes to subsidize it. The National Geographic Society of Washington for whom Rock made many expeditions has prepared for reproduction in both proposed volumes a large number of the photographs which he has long had on deposit with that society.

In a letter from Darjeeling dated September 16 Rock requests information concerning the possibility of his using our Herbarium and our Library facilities and of obtaining working space. I have determined that the Herbarium authorities will be glad to receive Rock and put at his disposal a portion of the table space reserved for visiting botanists. Doubtless there would be no difficulty in obtaining standard Library privileges for him. With regard to office space it occurred to me that the Institute of East Asiatic Studies might provide it.

I believe that it would be important that Rock's unique knowledge of the floras of West China and Tibet be made available through publication. That he is in a frame of mind to do so is indicated by the preparation of other material published at Harvard and the recent completion for publication of his material on the religious ceremonies of the Na-Khi tribe under the auspices of the Italian Institute for the Middle and Far East. It might be that in general his contact with the work of the Institute of Asiatic Studies would be of mutual benefit.

There is, I know, some past history in the relation of Dr. Rock to the University which might enter into a decision by the Institute to offer him facilities and a certain sponsorship. In any case I am sure that it would be important to specify the extent to which facilities including assistance could be made available to him.

Personally it would be a source of pleasure and satisfaction to me if Rock should establish an headquarters here and I would be glad to forward his proposals in any way that is possible. I expect to hear again from Dr. Rock in the near future and will then have an address at which he can be reached for a certain period at least.

Dear Dr. Birge:

You may recollect that some time ago we discussed on the telephone the character and importance of the 7th International Botanical Congress to be held in Stockholm next July in relation to applications from members of the Faculty for travel grants to permit them to accept official appointments from the Organization Committee of the Congress either as Honorary Presidents, Chairmen of Sections or Vice Presidents of Sections.

Confirming our conversation I wrote to Dr. Carl Skottsberg, President of the Congress, asking for his estimate of the significance to be attached to the various classes of appointments above named. In my letter I referred to the members of the Faculty here and at Davis whose appointments had come to my attention. In Dr. Skottsberg's reply he named two additional persons. The entire list thus becomes: Honorary President, T.H. Goodspeed; Chairman of Section, E.B. Babcock; Vice Presidents, each of a different Section, R.E. Clausen, A.S. Foster, D.R. Hoagland, H.S. Reed and W.W. Robbins. The following is the pertinent portion of Dr. Skottsberg's reply to me.

"The selection as a Chairman, Vice President, etc. is of course meant as a distinction, but not only that. We have tried to pay this honor to men whom we indeed want to come and to take an active part in the proceedings. The Chairman is of course not only nominal, but will take the chair; we shall need Vice Presidents to assist him. An Honorary President occupies a very prominent position during the Congress and is given the chance to speak for his country. We have tried to select these gentlemen with great care and also with a view to have at least the larger and more important nations represented. In your special case, you will be among the not too many who are to receive an invitation to read a paper. I have suggested that you give one of the evening lectures open to the public. The first thing I want the Executive to do when I return to Stockholm in a couple of weeks will be to get these invitations ready. Summing up: we invite people to join as specially honored members because we really want them to come and to form a nucleus of high scientific standing of the assemblage."

May I say that I expect to accept the invitation to become an Honorary President and to present a public address at the Congress subject to the possibility of obtaining a travel grant from the University. My application for such a grant will be made when I have received the additional invitation referred to in the excerpt from Dr. Skottsberg's letter.

Whether there can appropriately be selection for approval of travel

grants among applicants who have been equivalently honored by the Organization Committee of the Congress -- as Vice Presidents of Sections, for example -- would seem to me doubtful.



Attached is the list of foreign students registered at the University of California, Berkeley and Davis campuses, the University Extension Division, Berkeley, and the San Francisco Medical Center for the Fall Semester 1952-1953.

An effort is being made to include in these statistics non-citizen scholars assigned to but not registered in the University. You will find these added at the end of the listing of each campus representing them. You will also find that they are enumerated in the summary of statistics but are not added to the actual number of foreign students. The request has been made that the presence of these individuals on the campus be brought to the attention of the Office of Adviser to Foreign Students. However, no assurance can be given that the list attached is complete.

The determination of exact citizenship status is exceedingly complicated. No assumption should be made as to the legal citizenship status of individuals on the basis of geographical distribution presented.

It should be noted that numbers 1 - 4 as applied to academic class at Berkeley and Davis indicate the year of undergraduate status. Number 5 indicates graduate status. These same numbers as used by the San Francisco campus indicate the year of the student's professional status on that campus and, therefore, are not comparable to the same numbers used by Berkeley and Davis.

The deadline for inclusion in this listing has been arbitrarily set as October 3, 1952. Those registering after October 3, 1952 are listed in the SUPPLEMENT which follows the original lists.

It will be noted that included in these statistics are a considerable number of individuals who are on immigration visas. In this respect a person is legally a non-citizen until he has received his final citizenship papers. In some respects the inclusion of those in immigration status may seem to be inconsistent with the purposes of these statistics. However, it should be noted that in many instances the immigration visa is used for the same purpose as the regular student visas. This is particularly true with Latin Americans and Canadians. In other words, for them it is frequently the most convenient visa to use for temporary status in this country while undertaking educational work. To determine the intent of those on immigration visas would be exceedingly cumbersome and it is, therefore, only logical that those on this visa should be included in our foreign student statistics.

This list is formulated primarily for the convenience of the departments and offices of the University. They, however, are shared with certain organizations and agencies which are in a position to be of service to foreign students. It is understood that its use will be confined within such agencies and that it will not be used for any purposes of publicity without permission.



Dear Dr. Goodspeed:

I was very glad to have the opportunity to meet you recently when I was in Berkeley and wish to thank you for the encouragement you have given me regarding the trip to Argentina.

A letter was received today from Dr. Ross E. Moore, Chief, Technical Collaboration Branch, Office of Foreign Agricultural Relations, United States Department of Agriculture, stating:

"As you already know, we now have Dr. Robbins of Davis making a tour of quite a number of the Latin American countries for a six-months' period, and we do not feel that it is advisable to sponsor a request for another trip at this time."

Dr. Moore hoped that I could make the trip, however, and promised any assistance he could give in making preliminary arrangements for me to visit our collaborating agricultural stations and missions in several republics in Central American and the northern part of South America. Since this possibility of obtaining assistance has been removed, I am turning again to the possibility of obtaining travel expense money from Dr. Descole. I have delayed my answer to Dr. Descole's invitation because I had hoped that Dr. Moore could get the Washington government to sponsor my trip. I now am interested to know how far your correspondence has gone in regard to recommending me to Dr. Descole and in suggesting that travel expense money be allocated.



Dear Dr. Bliss,

Thank you for your letter of July 12. It is disappointing that Dr. Moore will not assist in financing your proposed visit to South America and apparently has no suggestions concerning other sources of support in Washington.

Some weeks ago I wrote to Descole recommending that the Tucuman Congress assist you in attending the meetings. I gave him my estimate of the value of your advice and assistance so far as subtropical agriculture in Argentina is concerned and sent him your bibliography and the titles of papers you might present at the Congress. In the same letter I asked some questions concerning my attendance at the Congress. As yet I have had no reply from Descole but this is not peculiar because, as I think I told you, he was to be in Europe during June and his return to Argentina may have been delayed.

Concerning the translation into Spanish of your papers I would suggest that when finished they should in any case be sent at once to Descole. By this I mean that even though you are unable to attend the Congress the papers will undoubtedly have been prepared particularly for South American consumption and thus should be published in an Argentine journal. It is also possible that if you are not at the Congress some appropriate person could read the papers. On the other hand if you are to be in Tucuman the sooner Descole starts to have them translated the better. Knowing South Americans I think there is only an outside chance of your receiving the Spanish translation before you would leave here.

Dear Doctor Descole:

I was pleased and greatly honored to receive your letter of March 1, and your very kind invitation to attend the II^o Congreso Sud-Americano de Botanica which will be held October 10 to 17, 1948, at the Universidad Nacional de Tucuman. Such a congress is of great importance, not only because it advances the botanical sciences, but also because it fosters a spirit of good will and mutual understanding between the nations of our Western Hemisphere.

After corresponding with my good friends, Señor Alberto Breyer, Maipu 267, Buenos Aires, and Dr. T. H. Goodspeed of the University of California, I decided to accept your kind invitation and to spend a period of four or five months in South America. I intended to make myself available to the Argentine Republic and perhaps one or two other South American Republics where subtropical plants are grown. My specialty, as you may know, is the pathology of date palms, and I am particularly interested in conferring with authorities in Argentina on your date industry. Since our date industry in the United States is less than fifty years old, I am familiar with some of the problems that your industry is facing. I also have some knowledge of citrus and, of course, some insight into plant pathological research in general.

My decision to accept your invitation was based on the assumption that I could obtain travel expense money for the trip. I first made application for financial assistance to the Office of Foreign Agricultural Relations, United States Department of Agriculture, but unfortunately, the request was not approved. I am unable to stand all the expenses of the trip and am, therefore, wondering if there might be available in the Universidad Nacional de Tucuman, or elsewhere, a fellowship or grant-in-aid that would promote the accomplishment of the purpose of the trip. Since I would be on sabbatical leave from the University of California, I would not be allowed to accept gainful employment.

I am now completing a manuscript entitled, "The development of the date industry in the United States," which is intended for the II^o Congreso Sud-Americano de Botanica. I also intend to write another







Dear Mr. and Mrs. Bliss:

Over twenty years ago I became interested in the Botanical Garden at Santa Barbara primarily because of the unique opportunity its terrain offered to conserve, maintain under natural conditions and study scientifically the botanically significant vegetation of the semiarid coast of southern California and adjacent islands. Determining horticultural potentialities of elements of that vegetation, increasing through scientific publications knowledge of the floras concerned and popular education have become supplementary objectives.

Sixteen years ago I urged the appointment of Mr. Van Rensselaer as Director and I believe that my confidence in his ability to forward the Botanical Garden's objective has been abundantly confirmed. Over the last weekend I was in Santa Barbara and reviewed in detail his remarkable accomplishments which have not only developed increasing local interest and the horticultural prestige of Santa Barbara but have also made the Botanical Garden favorably known, scientifically and otherwise, throughout the nation. Cooperation, for which I was in part responsible, between the Botanical Garden and botanical activities in Santa Barbara College of the University of California has added to the scientific stature of the Garden.

Mr. Van Rensselaer's illness in 1946 placed the responsibility of maintaining the Botanical Garden upon the Board of Trustees which, unfortunately, did not at that time include anyone thoroughly capable of appreciating the significance of the institution's objectives or of Mr. Van Rensselaer's success in realizing them. After his return as Director the Board was, somewhat naturally perhaps, unwilling to turn back to him full responsibility and friction which followed has now resulted in some degree of personal antagonism with the consequence that the resignations of both the Chairman of the Board and Mr. Van Rensselaer have been submitted.

I consulted with both these gentlemen, with other members of the Board including Dr. Shantz and through the latter with Dr. Muller, the botanist at Santa Barbara College. The issues involved appear to be relatively clean cut and concern 1) personalities and 2) problems of finance. Whether either or both these problems can be resolved satisfactorily without more consideration of them via the calling in of disinterested and thoroughly informed persons is a question. Certainly no hasty action should

be taken and therefore I was much concerned to learn that the Board of Trustees will pass upon Mr. Van Rensselaer's resignation next Tuesday.

It seemed to me that I should present the situation to you whose generosity and sustained interest in the Botanical Garden's objectives have made them so effectively realized under Mr. Van Rensselaer's direction.

How nice of you to write me. I read your June 15th letter with special interest and appreciate all you say.





Dear Mr. Ambassador:

In November 1948, when I had the privilege of discussing with you personally my continued enthusiasm for the development of a National Botanical Garden in Chile, and later in correspondence you expressed an interest in the proposal. In 1943, with your knowledge and approval I acceded to the request of President Rios and the then Minister of Agriculture to select a site and prepare plans, specifications and a budget for botanical garden development.

Apparently the Government and the municipalities of Valparaiso and Vina del Mar are now proposing to act upon my 1943 recommendation to develop the botanical garden at El Salto near Vina del Mar on land now owned by the Corporacion de Ventas de Salitre and to carry out such development according to my original plans and specifications.

Sr. Gaston Ossa S. M. and my friend, Dr. Edwyn P. Reed, both of Valparaiso have locally been active in stimulating interest in the botanical garden project. Sr. Ossa, with what authority I do not know, has written me that my presence in Chile during the period of development of the botanical garden site is essential and that all travel and other expenses involved would be met. I have replied that I could not consider a visit to Chile for this purpose unless completely satisfied that sufficient money was available for development and that there was a prospect of sufficiently large annual appropriations for proper maintenance. I stated frankly that I did not wish to be put in the position of becoming personally responsible for a project which later on might be labeled a "gringo extravagance" because of lack of initial appreciation of how expensive an asset a botanical garden inevitably will become. My underlying thought is that I must be certain that I am making a real contribution to Chile. Production of a research center in the plant sciences, which a botanical garden should be, would represent such a contribution. I have also indicated that it would be desirable that I receive an official invitation through diplomatic channels before requesting the necessary leave of absence from this University.

Is it possible that you would feel in a position to ascertain the actual status of botanical garden proposal so far as the Government is concerned? However enthusiastic the municipalities of Valparaiso and Vina del Mar may be at the moment, particularly from the tourist point of view in the development of a botanical garden nearby, sufficient funds for initial development and for annual maintenance will, it seems to me,

inevitably become a charge largely against the Federal Government. I will much appreciate any information which you may care to obtain and your reaction in general to the importance of my accepting an official invitation to go to Chile to carry out the botanical garden proposal.

I am sorry to have to tell you that Mrs. Goodspeed died last April following a long illness. Please accept my thanks for your thoughtful cooperation which we enjoyed during our period of residence in Chile.

As I think you know I have been requested by the Chilean Ministry of Foreign Affairs at the instigation of the Minister of Agriculture to spend some time in Chile to initiate development of a proposed National Botanical Garden and Botanical Research Institute at El Salto the designs for which I prepared, with your acquiescence in 1943.

Following considerable correspondence with the Chilean Ambassador in Washington and with the Dept. of State it became apparent that funds would not be available from either source to finance or assist in financing my acceding to the the request of the Chilean Government for the above mentioned technical assistance.

In part through the generosity of my friend Mr. Charles Kendrick of San Francisco and at a personal cost of some \$1000 representing payment to this University of the salary of a substitute instructor during my absence from my courses I am enabled to spend the period November 7 to February 6 in Chile. I am also able to bring with me an assistant, Mr. Paul C. Hutchison, who holds appointment in this University as Botanist in the Botanical Garden.

I am happy to be in a position once more to offer my services gratis to a South American government. I hope that I may be able to accomplish something which will contribute ot mutual understanding and goodwill between Chile and the United States. In the circumstances I shall not, however, need to accept personal responsibility for the carrying out of proposals for Botanical Garden development and I shall feel under no obligation to anyone except yourself as the representative of my country to whom I hope that I may come, as in the past, for counsel should occasion arise. My freedom from financial obligation to the Chilean Government will also permit me to devote a portion of my stay in Chile to furthering my research on the character and distribution of the floras of western South America.

I am leaving here on October 24 to spend a week in the Caribbean area and according to my present plans will arrive by air in Santiago on November 7th. I hope that I may have the pleasure of paying my respects to you soon thereafter.

Received your recent communication in answer to my letter for sources of supply of *Amaryllis* bulbs in Chile, South America. I would be very happy to receive any surplus bulbs you have from down there. You did not specify the price of them. Since it is for the breeding work I am doing with these bulbs I would be happy to pay for them. Do you have a copy of the recent book of Dr. Moldenke, on *Amaryllidaceae: Tribe Amaryllieae*? If you don't I will gladly send you a copy. It should be invaluable in identifying bulbs from that region of South America.

In the above book a statement is made that the narrow-leaved *Amaryllis* do not cross with the broad-leaved ones. I have made some crosses of the narrow-leaved ones with the broad-leaved ones. As you know the large Dutch hybrids do not come in yellow or purple. If I can just secure pollen or bulbs of this color I believe a cross can be made. Dear Miss Brackenridge:

I am sending you seed of two collections of Alstroemeria from Chile. Unfortunately what was sent in as A. violacea (U.C.B.G. 49.2017) has not germinated with us as yet. I hope that I have now located in this Botanical Garden a few plants of this rare and beautiful species collected during our Second Andean Expedition which I was afraid had been completely lost. If, when the plants flower, they prove to be A. violacea I will send you living material. It would be very interesting to see whether hybrids could be made between this and other Alstroemerias. The other Alstroemeria species of which seed is being sent (U.C.B.G. 49.325) has not been flowered by us but I am confident that it is an Alstroemeria. The third package carries the field determination Hippeastrum but it again has not been flowered here and I can therefore say nothing about it.

Bulbs of certain other Amaryllids were through error all planted. In the summer there should be considerable duplicate material for you but I would appreciate your dropping me a line in this connection should you still be interested in receiving what we have. Of course there is no charge for any of these seeds and bulbs.

I would be glad to have a copy of Dr. Moldenke's book, Amaryllidaceae: Tribe Amaryllideae. I appreciate your thoughtfulness in suggesting it.

In view of the rarity of the file it would not be issued for use outside the Library under ordinary circumstances. What do you advise?

I found no papers of any surrounding nearby towns for 1884 or 1885. We do have several pamphlets on Sonora history which might perhaps be helpful, though they contain very little specifically referring to your period. These can be issued for home use for a short-time if you wish. We will be glad to check for any specific items you think of, such as information on particular individuals of the area.

Dear Muriel:

You were very kind to write me as you did. Your letter was among the most helpful of the many we received following Florence's death. I have not acknowledged your thoughtfulness earlier in part because of various natural preoccupations, but principally because I was not sure of your situation for the coming year or of how I might be of some assistance in connection with it.

I judge that there is no present certainty that the position at Davis will materialize. It is however true that the University budget for 1950-51 has not gone to the Regents and may not go until their meeting late next month. In other words, actually the Davis people do not know what they will have available. In this connection, since an opportunity to obtain a foothold at Davis might be quite important to you, I should think you might tell Brooks that your opening salary need not be commensurate with what you should receive or, indeed, equivalent to what you were paid here last year. You may have left this impression with him but it might pay to reinforce it by being specific.

Up to this last year I annually received a number of requests to suggest candidates for positions. Since that time none have come in. I doubt whether the nurserymen in this region are sufficiently prosperous, operate on a sufficiently large scale or are forward looking enough to be interested in employing someone with your training and experience. They would inevitably want you to give up more and more time to selling plants. In Southern California I should think there would be more possibilities and the professor of horticulture at UCLA whose name at the moment escapes me, or even better, Walter Lammerts should be able to advise you. Should anything of this sort turn up I would of course be most happy to forward your candidacy for a position.

As you know, the last two years have been difficult ones for me and I have had neither the time nor the inclination to accomplish as much on the Nicotiana monograph as I could have wished. The last year in particular has seen relatively little accomplished. However, through your efforts and those of Mildred and Helen-Mar, and with what I have done and hope to do before leaving for

Stockholm on July 7th, a first draft of everything, except perhaps the taxonomy, and a "final" copy of some parts will be ready. Thereafter careful editing involving, as you know, great detail, must be done. Selfishly, it would be of importance to me if you could have a share in it. Therefore, I can guarantee you three months at not less than \$300 per month presumably as a Research Assistant or Research Associate with such salary. Whether I could continue such an arrangement beyond three months would depend upon what research grant I get and what the Garden budget will be for the coming year as well as progress made during the three month period. You are under absolutely no obligation to me in the above connection. Obviously, what you need is a permanent post or one that can become permanent and you must first consider your own best interests. If the Davis post or anything comparable might be open in the fall or even later rather than July 1st my offer would be an obvious way to fill in the interim, or part of it, of advantage to us both. If it is clear that the Davis post will not be open for at least another year you should start an intensive campaign throughout the country, in which I will be glad to cooperate, looking toward securing a proper position. However, your immediate problem, as I see it, is whether you care to reappear here on a temporary basis.

The position at Davis is uncertain. The last word from Reid on the subject was quite noncommittal. However, I had not indicated that I would definitely be interested, so perhaps he was just being cautious. I shall write him tonight and show more definite interest. Another possibility has been suggested by Dr. Huskins, namely that if he gets funds he has requested he might include me in his research group. He has also written a letter to Hollaender at Oak Ridge to see if there is anything available there. So, although nothing is certain, I am hopeful.

Dear Dr. Goodspeed:

June 8, 1950

I apologize for having delayed so long in replying to your generous offer. Last week I was occupied in writing several letters to Reid Brooks and to Dr. Tufts in connection with the possibility at Davis. The past four days I have been nursing a case of flu and have been rigidly confined to bed by a couple of tyrannical house-mates.

I thoroughly appreciate your kindness in offering me three months' work and under other circumstances would enjoy accepting it. Because of recent developments, however, it is unlikely that I shall take advantage of your offer. Since I am sure that you will want to do the final editing, I am inclined to believe that whatever I could do to the book at this stage would not be nearly as useful to you as the impression of its usefulness you so considerately tried to convey. That aspect of your offer is also much appreciated.

However, if there is really any way in which I could be helpful in getting the book into final form, I would be delighted to assist. When I learn where I am going to be, sections of the book could be sent to me with instructions concerning what is needed. Since I would feel particularly obligated to turn out the work as rapidly as possible, there would be no question of the postponement of extra work that has characterized my "accomplishment" in the past months. As I say, it would be a pleasure to me to give (without pay) any assistance I could, partly because of my interest in the book and partly because that would be one way of expressing my gratitude to you for all you have done for me in the past years. I hope you will seriously consider this suggestion if there is any way in which I can be of assistance.

After a long dearth of developments here, everything started popping at once. Dr. Huskins learned that he would have a sizeable research grant and offered me a position for the next three years with a good salary. The same day I received an encouraging letter from Reid Brooks which has since been followed by considerable correspondence with the Davis people.

The situation at present is that there may be an opening at Davis about August 1st. and from implications in and the tone of Dr. Tuft's correspondence, it appears that the position is very likely to materialize and be offered to me. Although the work with Dr. Huskins might be more interesting and I know that he and his group are congenial and stimulating to work with, the greater certainty of long-term continuation of the Davis position would influence me to accept that if it is offered.

I took the liberty of giving your name to Dr. Tufts as a reference. If he should ask for your comments, I would appreciate your stressing, to the extent that you can honestly

do so, that I am not difficult to get along with. Reid thinks Dr. Tufts may be hesitant about having a woman in his division because of the division's unfortunate experience with Charlotte Nast.

Dear Mildred:

July 31st.

It was so very good to see you again and I wish I could have spent more time with you, talking over a number of things both professional and personal. I had hoped to be able to call you and pass a bit of the time of day on the day I left, but we went to Davis that day, took the river road back, including spending the best part of an hour to change a tire, and we didn't get back to Berkeley until a half hour before I had to leave to catch my plane. Consequently all I had time for was to pack up my things and make myself a bit more presentable. It was a pleasant ride back along the river, but if I had known how much longer it would take, I would have suggested the main highway.

I imagine you felt rather let down after Dr. Goodspeed finally got off, after all the dither of preparations for his absence and all. Or was there such an accumulation of things to be taken care of that you had no time to let down with a bang?

It was pleasing to find that Dr. Goodspeed looked as well as he did. After the terrific strain of the past couple of years it wouldn't have been surprising to find him in much worse shape. I hope the trip does him a lot of good. Hope also that things are in such condition that you can be more or less relaxed while Dr. Goodspeed is away, without too many things that tie you to the office.

I told Dr. Duncan that I was going to write to you and offered to make inquiries about orchids that the garden may have. He was most appreciative of Dr. Goodspeed's generous offers of material if it is available. What he is most interested in is the lady-slipper group - *Phragmopidium* (*Phragmopetalum*), *Selenepidium*, and *Cypripedium*. Of the *Cypripediums*, the only one that he is very anxious to obtain is *C. irapeanum*. Since it is Mexican, it may not be represented in the garden. But he would be interested in any *Phragmopidium* or *Selenepidium* obtainable. It would not be necessary to send him living material, altho if there should be lots of plants there (which I doubt) he wouldn't mind at all having a cutting from one. What he particularly would like would be a root tip or two fixed in Craf or Randolph's. Marion probably has the solutions for those made up. The root tips should be those that are underground, not aerial. And unless the end of the root tip is translucent with a white zone back of that, there will be few or no divisions. Chlorophyll apparently interferes with divisions. He says that one good root tip should provide lots of material, two would be almost superabundant, and three would be a waste of material. There is no rush about getting the material, however. I like to see Dr. Duncan get any assistance he can, for in addition to being a fine person, unless a cure is found soon for multiple sclerosis his time is limited.

It seems that Dr. Huskins got sorta balled up on his figures, so my salary after the first three months is not yet assured. When he offered me the job apparently he was counting on some of his graduate students leaving and being able to use their salaries for me. (The graduate students here have a fine set-up. Each one has some assigned duties, mostly minor and not requiring even half-time, and gets paid about 100 per month out of research funds.) But now he is somewhat embarrassed to find that two he had thought were

going back to China and one elsewhere are not leaving. So he wrote to Dr. Moe asking him for suggestions about where he might apply for funds. I wished he had written to anyone else, for I wanted to write Dr. Moe that I had an assured position with salary. It is likely that Huskins will find the funds somewhere, but I wish it were all settled. After the first of the year there should be less question about salary, for then several graduate students will be leaving, but the interim is not comfortable.

I was surprised on returning here to find that never had I hated returning from a vacation so much and to find that I am more homesick for Calif. and all you good friends than I had thought. I want to hurry back to Calif. as soon as I can. It was more or less settled with ~~the~~ Dr. Tufts that when the assistant there resigns, they will make a place for me. However, since there could be a slip-up, I am not announcing it far and wide. The work would be mostly anatomical, alas, but probably there would be some cytological work too, so wouldn't have to devote the rest of my life to not looking at chromosomes.

I suppose Marion will be returning to Berkeley soon. I guess the Scanlans spent last Saturday with them, Jessie on her way to Mexico, Ralph to visit a sister in the vicinity of San Diego for a week or so after which Walker is supposed to come down and drive him back. I hope Jessie will not be disappointed in her Mexican venture. She needs and deserves a good change of scene after being tied down for so many years.

How does Joan like her present job? Do you see her very often? Too bad she didn't chose one of the lines running out of the Bay Region.

We have finally found an apartment in which we can stay indefinitely. (We have been subletting from a faculty member for the summer.) It is in a good location and is quite adequate -- a bit too much so, for we have an extra bedroom which in view of the high rent we are paying we feel we should rent. We have to pay \$100 per month for an unfurnished apt. It seems that Madison is one of the highest rental areas in the country. In spite of what we are paying, we consider ourselves lucky in view of prices being asked in general. Our lease here isn't up until the 15th, so in the meantime we are paying for two apartments. At least it gives us time to accumulate the necessary items of furniture, which will be the cheapest possible that still look respectable.

I haven't yet gone to the library to see if Metcalf and Chalk is there. I have to finish ~~the~~ the revision of my part of Reid Brooks' and my technique manual before the end of August, so won't be able to do much, if anything, on THE BOOK until September.

Again let me tell you how much I enjoyed seeing you and eating lunch with you in the good old fashion. Wish I had had more time to talk with just you. Better luck next time I hope.

Dear Muriel:

No doubt you have before now heard from Dr. Goodspeed. I today received a letter from Rome where he had my letter about your interest in the possibility of working on the book, and another written later from Sorrento after receiving your letter. In the one from Rome he said to renew his previous offer and to tell you that we really need you badly -- and suggested that I telegraph you. The one written later tells me that he has written you and hopes that financing has not appeared there in the meantime. He expected that I would have the Rome letter earlier but it was delayed somewhere along the way; I am not telegraphing since you probably have his letter already. If funds have been arranged there in the interim you probably can get a deferral, in the circumstances.

I am not certain whether your proposed 3 month leave was to begin Sept. 1 or Oct. 1. Thought the latter which might be better since Dr. G. will not be back until Sept. 10-12. Dear Dr. Goodspeed:

I intended to write you long since and to thank you again for the opportunity you provided for those most pleasant months in Berkeley working on *The Book* again. The work was not only pleasant, but also stimulating and exciting, and I really think *The Book* should create quite a splash, for no-one else has brought together as varied or as abundant data on any genus as you have, nor has any such "resynthesis" of any genus been made, to my knowledge. If there is any way in which I can be of assistance in completing the work, I hope you realize that I shall consider it a privilege to assist, particularly since I have the nagging feeling that I should have covered more territory while I was there.

I am the envy of various people around the department here because I am the possessor of those handsome and interesting floral illustrations you so thoughtfully gave me. They are not yet framed, because the weather here does not encourage shopping for anything but the essentials, but if spring will only come to Madison, I shall make arrangements to have them framed and properly hung for further admiration, not to mention my own pleasure.

It may be a few weeks before I resume work again on the trichome paper, for I am not fully settled here, but may move again. Also I find that fighting the weather here (the high today was 18°) takes enough additional energy that by evening I am in no mood to concentrate on anything as technical as trichomes. Dear Muriel:

It was good to hear from you and to know that all is as well with you as it can be for a Californian in the midst of a Wisconsin winter.

I am somewhat encouraged about the book as a result of finally prying loose the morphology with corrections. They really amounted to very little and make no change in derivations. Theoretically, and I hope actually, all statements in the morphology have been checked against the taxonomic descriptions. In other words, everything can now go forward with prayers that the taxonomy will be done by the time the rest is finished.

The tomentosa cuttings have become rather large. Of the most recent ones, made for you last November, only one of A-087 P9 has survived. This and two cuttings of normal can be sent you anytime. The only problem is would they freeze in transit by air with trans shipment from Chicago to Madison. I have not yet been able to see the older cuttings of A-087 P9, still in the greenhouse, but fear they have become much too large to ship successfully. We will start some new cuttings which could be established in six weeks and will include in the first sending some unrooted ones which you might care to propagate there. The cuttings should root in sand with bottom heat. The established plants need ordinary greenhouse culture and with some commercial fertilizer will go on in the same pot even if quite large.

Would you care to have a short account of your *Nicotiana polysomaty* work in the book? I think we talked about this but can't remember what the decision was. It could go in at the end of the treatment of euploidy after the brief reference to chimerical tomentosa. I would, of course, be glad to see the trichome paper whenever you have it ready. It would be appropriate to refer in a footnote to a Botanical Garden Contribution number. If you let me know when I will supply the number.

Everything is much the same with me. My poor mother is becoming more and more confused because her memory fails more completely each day. I hope that the situation in your home is better. The store teeth below are in (and hurt) and I say farwell to what remains of my own above sometime soon.

The opportunity to have your help on the book was very much appreciated and we all miss you.

Dear Dr. Goodspeed:

I apologize for not having replied to your letter at an earlier date, particularly in respect to the tomentosa plants. I had to take a few days out to have a light touch of something in the flu line, and in the past week I have been working almost every evening helping Ph.D. candidates get their theses in order to meet the approaching deadline. Thanks to a lot of training I received from you in the past years in formal writing, I think I can honestly say their theses have been improved by my touch, and indirectly yours.

The plants and cuttings arrived today, all in good condition and I expect that in a few weeks they will have become sufficiently established that I can begin experiments on them. There are several points that need to be cleared up by additional material. I greatly appreciate your sending the plants to me, and probably no further material will be needed, provided that the green-house man here has a sufficiently green thumb to bring the cuttings through. His reputation in the department is good, so I am hopeful.

It is good to hear that progress on the book is encouraging and that corrections in morphology have not affected postulates of species relationships. In regard to the inclusion of a brief account of the polysomaty work, I doubt that it would be of any great value, since it would be merely something quite irrelevant to the aim of the book. Also study of only one tissue has been completed, and so far I have not had much time to investigate other tissues and anticipate that it will require several more months to complete the work at this rate. I have not even written up the results of investigation of the pith -- the tissue that has been completed.

I hope that the opportunity to pitch into the trichome paper again will come along in the next few weeks, but so far my time has been too occupied with other matters. When I do finish the paper (and I really am anxious to see it completed) I shall send it to you and at that time you a Botanical Garden number can be added. I suppose it is appropriate to have such a number more or less in sequence of publication dates, is it not?

I am sorry to hear that the situation with your mother is becoming more difficult for both of you and can appreciate what you must be going through, in view of my father's condition of the past year or two. My father is still living, but gradually weakening in all respects.

The five months in Berkeley now seems like a most pleasing dream -- peaceful yet stimulating -- and I thoroughly enjoyed it, for which many thanks to you. And here's to The Book -- toasted in California sherry.

Dear Dr. Goodspeed:

I heard from Dr. Tufts that you have sent him a fine letter of recommendation for me, which I appreciate greatly. If he is successful in getting me the higher rank he is proposing to the administration, I am sure it will be thanks to you in no small measure.

In any case I shall start work in Davis October 1st., which should give me time to complete or almost complete the project I am working on here. I suggested that date rather than July 1st. since I know how difficult it is to finish up one project on spare time while working full time on a new one. The trichome paper is, alas, a case in point. However, I hope to have that also completed, or nearly so, by October 1st.

An anthropologist, Dr. Milton Barnett, from this university is going to be in Venezuela next year, part of the time in Andean regions. Purely conversationally I asked him how he would like to look for Nicotianas while there, and was surprised when he said he would be interested. It seems that he wants to have various projects of that sort as opening wedges in conversations with the Indians. Apparently he will be in some little-explored regions, trying to find out things about the Indians that the Venezuela government doesn't know and would like to. So I shall show him herbarium specimens of Nicotiana so that there may be a chance that he will recognize the genus if he meets it, and shall give him your name and address so that if he finds anything he thinks is Nicotiana, he can send it to you. I don't hope for much, both because he is no botanist and because there may be no Nicotianas in the region. But we might just possibly be surprised.

I hope that long before this the Book has been sent to the publishers. I believe it is a much worthier contribution than Babcock's *Crepis* monograph, since it incorporates the essence of a greater variety of investigation and also of greater bulk, but without all the minute detail in which very few would be interested.

Many thanks for your recent letter of recommendation, as well as for all the backing you gave me for the Guggenheim, which I am sure was responsible for my getting the fellowship and for the three years here, which have been highly profitable.

I hope you have a really pleasureable and relaxing vacation this summer.

Dear Muriel:

Mildred has just shown me your last letter. It is good news that you are going to have time to tackle your trichome paper. Probably Mildred has told you that we put the ms, illustrations, etc. of The Book in a large black wooden box and at 4:45 PM, Friday, July 25th the Express Co. received it with ~~some~~ reservations as to its contents. I think it suggested to them the coffin of a large flat fish! We felt much the same way!

I presume that you are right that no journal will publish all the material on trichomes you want to present although you might have in mind that the Torrey Botanical Club Memoirs might consider it. You have probably seen their 200 page thing on Petunia by Stout issued in March of this year.

However, your suggestion that you may have to publish in sections reminded me of our "Decisions re trichome and chimera" of October 1949 in which it was suggested that a second section (after publication of the book) you would deal with "trichomes in relation to phylesis".

For your first section (or sections), the factual evidence, you may want to see, for reference, the trichome treatment in The Book in which the description of types and their distribution is presented as a resume of what is to be your more detailed treatment of that evidence. It will go forward to you as soon as we have word from Verdoorn that he has received the black box. Enclosed are photostatic copies of charts and trichome plate used in Book. These you may keep if you wish; please return the ms at your convenience.

Referring again to the "Decisions" Mildred is still accumulating evidence on A-087 P9 progenies. Later on when you are nearby we can talk about what might be published in connection with them following your account of what makes A-087 P9 act that way -- something which I judge you hope to publish shortly.

We are all looking forward to your being once more a Californian and hope to see you often in the gloomy halls of LSB.

Heartiest congratulations on dispatch of The Book. (I pause to drink a toast to you and to The Book -- a toast in my favorite hot weather drink, burgundy and ice. I wish I could think of as interesting a toast as the author's toast that is well known: "here's to my last one the publishers lost on. May the next one be sexy and censored in Boston." But in my present state all I can come up with is something along the line of "To Dr. Goodspeed and The Book. May both enjoy a long, felicitous and highly appreciated future." Trite, I know.

I can imagine the rejoicing that accompanied completion of the book. I don't doubt that it will prove to be well-worth all those years of effort. As I said before, it should be much more readable than Babcock's monograph, and no doubt more useful because it packs a terrific amount of information into a small space. Not to speak of the use of the information in arriving at conclusions concerning the probable past of the species.

Thank you very much for sending the copies of the charts and trichome plates. I shall be very glad to have a chance to see the trichome treatment in The Book. But, if you have not already sent it to me, it might be better to wait until I get to Davis. The reason is that I find I bit off a lot more than I can chew on in the next few weeks. I started out nobly, and the writing of two papers at once, with a third to be done too, looked as if it could be accomplished easily. But I hit snags that have slowed me up. So at the moment, considering that I still have some experimental work to do and that my time in the next few weeks is going to be cut into by extraneous matters, I shall do well if I finish the papers on the work I did here. Since it is easier to get the needed criticism of the people here while I am here, and since something has to be carried over to Davis, I believe it is wiser to finish the trichome paper in Davis. But I promise that I shall pitch into it there and finish it with as much speed as possible. Fortunately I still find it an interesting subject.

I have not forgotten our agreement re trichome paper of 1949. However, my memory is a bit rusty on interpretation of the same. For the reason that in my original writing of the trichome paper I had a section that dealt with relationship of species and sections as indicated by evidence from trichomes. Was that what you meant by trichomes in relation to phylaxis? I have no intention of including that in any case. But it occurs to me that you might object to such statements as "The trichome types of species A links it to species B of section X. This in agreement with evidence from other sources which indicates that species A bridges the two sections X and Y." I would like to include such statements. But on the other hand, I would not want to violate the agreement -- or your understanding of it. -- if such statements are contrary to it.

Which brings me to the question of authority for classification of sections. Do I cite The Book?

Your suggestion of the Torrey Botanical Club is a good one as a possible place for publication. For without any possible reference to phylaxis, the paper should be quite a bit longer than most journals want. I shall of course use the Botanical Garden numbers. Probably you would want to see what I have included in a semifinal form and I would of course appreciate your comments. So, unless you would prefer not to be bothered with it, I would like to send it to you when I have it completed. At that time the appropriate Botanical Garden numbers could be assigned. The same applies to the A-087 paper.

Hoping that your vacation at Bohemian Grove was a really relaxing one, after all the hustle and bustle about The Book.
