



Dear Friend,

Many thanks for your letter of April 8th. enclosing the seed of *Caesalpinia Gilesii*. We have sown it and will look forward to the mature plants which I remember added so much when in flower to the landscape near Cordoba.

I have just been invited to become President of the Cytology and Genetics Section of the Second South American Botanical Congress to be held in Tucuman from October 10-17 of this year. The Congress generously offers to pay air transportation to Argentina and return for Mrs. Goodspeed and myself and maintenance during the Congress period.

If I accept this kind invitation, as I hope to be able to do, I wish to take advantage of our presence in Argentina to carry forward the many past years investigations of the character and distribution of the Andean vegetation rather than return to California immediately following the Congress. In the circumstances this University will permit me to be away until December 15th.

My present problem is the necessity of arranging to meet added transportation costs in South America and the cost of reasonably comfortable living during the two months following the Congress. When we spoke in Berkeley of my attending the Congress you were good enough to say that there might be some possibility of arranging financial assistance. I mention this thoughtful suggestion of yours only because I am now on the point of making a decision concerning my plans in connection with the Congress.

We greatly enjoyed the too brief visit we had with you and your husband. Florence has just had a letter from "Horty" Paine who was much disappointed that they did not see you in Santa Barbara.

We were sorry not to see you again during our stay in Buenos Aires. I hope that my lecture and film at the Soc. Rural was of some interest. I certainly enjoyed the opportunity to appear again before that most representative group.

Toward the end of our Buenos Aires visit I read a digest of the Annual Report of the Sociedad Rural in the "Standard" or "Herald". Unfortunately the clipping which I took of this article has apparently been lost.

In the near future I must prepare a report on certain aspects of my recent sojourn in South America. The only authoritative information on the current condition of Argentine agriculture is, so far as I know, contained in the Sociedad Rural's Report. Would it be possible for me to obtain a copy or a digest of the Report either in Spanish or English? To be of service to me the Report and/or the digest would need to be sent by air mail. I would hope to be permitted to repay the cost of postage.

I would be delighted to get it - also if is not too much bother, a small sample - of soil (humus) where ponderosa pines grow well - I believe the reason why they so consistently fail ^{may be} so due to the lack of the specific mycorrhizae any way I'd like to try. Humus from your coastal region would be very welcome too. - My myc. should be naturally guarded against. - ordinary post should be the best way to get it over I think. especially if addressed ^{to me as} ~~President of Forestry~~ ^{to me as} ~~Presidente de la Comision Forestal~~.





Dear Harry:

At Camels Camp you were kind enough to introduce me to your friend, the Vice-President (?) of the World Bank. Unfortunately I did not keep a note of his name.

He recognized my name via that of my cousin (Dr. E. J. Goodspeed) whose excavations in Egypt had, apparently, interested him.

As you may remember he inquired about my South American botanical explorations and most kindly offered to give me introductions to his associates in the World Bank stationed in South America and/or certain officials of South American governments.

If, considering the very informal circumstances under which this offer was made, you think it would still be appropriate to follow up the matter I would much appreciate your reminding the gentleman of it.

I will be in Peru from October 15 to December 1, in Chile from December 1 to February 1, 1958 and in Argentina from February 1 to March 15. These dates are approximate ones.

This will be the 6th University of California Botanical Garden Expedition to South America that I have directed in the past 25 years. Our objective has been a scientific survey of the character and distribution of the floras of the Andes and adjacent areas from the Equator to Magellan Strait. Information obtained which has had agricultural and industrial significance for the economic improvement of the South American republics in which we have worked has been made available to them. I have officially served those republics in a number of advisory capacities and have lectured extensively in their Universities and for their scientific societies. I have received decorations and a variety of types of scientific recognition.

If for any reason you do not feel in a position to "pass the word along" I shall understand it perfectly.


Dear Harper:

In respect to U.S. dollar accounts elsewhere than in Lima, we are told by the First-National City Bank that these are not available in Santiago and, while possible to establish in Buenos Aires, they are not recommended as some waiver of responsibility form is required there and a complication about tax on withdrawals. Other than your arrangements in Lima, it seems best to rely upon a good supply of National City Travelers Checks which are obtainable here at any of our banking offices.

I know that George Martin of the World Bank (International Bank for Reconstruction and Development) was sincere in his offer to make introductions to some of his associates in South America and I shall try to reach him before your departure. Dear Harry:

Thanks so much for your kindness in proposing to get into touch with Mr. George Martin. I feel confident that whatever cooperation he is in a position to arrange will be of large importance to me in South America.

I rather suspected that the establishment of dollar accounts in Chile and Argentina might not be possible or desirable because of local banking regulations. However, if the Chilean and Argentine branches of the National City would accept my dollars checks on the Lima branch I would deposit in the latter the major share of the funds I will require during a six months period in South America. Then I would periodically buy dollars travellers checks in the Chilean and Argentine branches rather than carrying a relatively large sum in travellers checks issued here and/or in Lima.

I hope that it is not too much of an imposition to ask you to obtain an opinion on the above proposal.





Dear Sirs: -

I am interested in pool plants for an outdoor gold fish pool. So far I have been unable to find any literature that gives much if any information on such plants. - Only for inside and mostly heated aquaria. We plan a cement pool shortly and I would like to learn more about these plants to be better able to construct elevations suitable in depth for the different plants as we make the pool.

Also I would like to learn about scavengers for pools and aquariums. At present I have some water snail that I thought were Japanese snail until I read later that the Japanese snail bear the young alive. This snail lays quantities

of eggs on water plants - How do I know? I brought one snail in the house with a couple of fish that were not doing well. I lost the fish after I ^{had} equipped a glass aquarium with a few plants. Later this snail was observed in the process of laying her eggs.

I also have at least one snail that appears to be a "pond" snail. and several that are similar to the Red ram's horn. I am told that these snail will not become as large as Red ram's horn and if my memory is correct they are not of such vivid red as the Ram's horn. Should they remain together?

Also one place I read that Red Ram's horn could not be kept with some other variety but there was no information as to which varieties could be placed together or which can be used in an out door pool.

Local pet shops do not seem to have much on gold fish either indoors or outdoors.

During my recent sojourn in South America I was effectively assisted by your representatives to whom you were good enough to give me introductions and whom I called upon in Buenos Aires, Argentina, and Santiago, Chile. The cooperation of Mr. Mason and Mr. Pool in Lima was especially helpful and generous.

For some time I have attempted to import Peruvian orchid plants by air express. My plant collector, Mr. Felix Woytkowski, has had a number of difficulties with your Lima office concerning rates, routes and shipping containers. The shipments have been en route much longer than appeared necessary. In one extreme instance a shipment was in some manner rerouted via Brownsville and required sixteen days to reach me.

I am sure that these difficulties are things of the past as a result of the interest taken in the problems involved by Mr. Mason and Mr. Pool and if the question of transportation between Los Angeles and San Francisco can be properly arranged.

A trial shipment of orchids expedited by Mr. Pool left Lima on Monday, December 6, at 7.30 p.m. and arrived in the Los Angeles airport on Wednesday, December 8, at 4.30 p.m. It was routed via United Airways to San Francisco (addressed to the Plant Quarantine Station) and was supposed to leave Los Angeles on the evening of the 8th. Actually it did not leave until the afternoon of the 9th. and, because of the unfamiliarity of the customs officials at the San Francisco airport with proper procedure, was not delivered to Plant Quarantine until too late to be examined until Monday. In other words, we did not receive the plants until December 14. The delay was largely responsible for the almost complete loss of the most valuable plants in the shipment.

were returned to the Pier 14 office where the customs officials are familiar with proper procedure and who turned the shipment over to us upon presentation of a declaration of free entry by this University. By contrast, in the case of the last shipment there was not only unnecessary delay at Los Angeles and San Francisco airports but in addition we had to pay \$5.00 custom brokers fee and \$7.88 for transportation from the airport to Plant Quarantine.

In the future would it not be possible again to route shipments via Railway Express from Los Angeles to San Francisco? I feel confident that Railway Express can arrange to forward a shipment on the same day that it is received in Los Angeles, especially if advised in advance of the expected time of arrival there. Certainly time and expense will be saved in San Francisco if Railway Express has the shipment in charge.

I am enclosing the copy of a letter to Air Express International which refers to a different matter but which I think you may wish to see. As yet I have received no answer to or acknowledgement of my letter.





Pursuant to the current provisions of The Pension and Retiring Annuities System of the University of California as recently adopted and to be effective July 1, 1954, it is indicated that you will retire as of that date.

While the details relating to your retirement status under the revised program are being determined, there is also the matter of your potential allowances under the rules of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. While these allowances will be included in the determination of the gross retirement allowances from all sources, they are, however, separate and distinct in that a special application is required by the Carnegie Foundation.

The rules of the Foundation are very rigid and in order to process the application blank so that your pension from the Foundation may be effective July 1, 1954, it is imperative that your application be in their hands prior to July 1st.

Accordingly, in order to make certain that this phase of your pending retirement will not be delayed, there is attached an application blank completed as required by the Foundation, except for your signature in the space provided.

I shall be grateful if you would please sign and return the blank to me as promptly as possible so that it may be available for submission to the Carnegie Foundation when, as and if necessary.

The allowance from the Foundation is made up of sums coming from two sources and is payable as described below.





Confirming our conversation of some time ago concerning insurance on a truck to be used in South America by the forthcoming 6th University of California Botanical Garden Expedition may I ask that the necessary policy be obtained. The truck has been purchased by the University from donated funds.

The following is, I understand, the information you will require:

I understand that the policy will include round trip marine coverage and comprehensive, public liability and property damage, etc., while in use in Peru. Reference should be made to its possible use also in Chile. It will be employed primarily for plant collecting.



Would you also secure a policy covering loss or destruction of 5000 dried plant specimens to be collected in South America and returned to Berkeley. Their commercial value is 25¢ per specimen or \$1250. I understand that the cost of such coverage would be approximately \$20 and that deterioration due to wear and tear and insect damage would not be covered.

Costs of these two policies, as in the case of the policy covering the truck, should be charged to Botanical Garden South American Expedition account -- 64275 13 43760.

As requested, I have obtained the coverage for the 1957 Ford Pickup being transported to Peru for the Botanical Garden Expedition.

Two copies of the policy are enclosed, one of which you no doubt will wish to keep in the vehicle for reference purposes and one for your file. The original will be on file in this office.

Policy was issued by the American International Underwriters, Inc., under Firemen's Insurance Company of Newark Policy No. 66-45747, and provides the following:

1. Marine in transit, San Francisco to Callao, Peru, on board the S.S. Santa Adela, with maximum limit of liability of - \$2,500
2. Bodily Injury Liability ----- \$500,000/\$1,000,000
3. Property Damage ----- \$100,000
4. Comprehensive (no deductible) ----- \$2,500
5. Collision (\$100 deductible) ----- \$2,500
6. War Risk or marine ----- \$2,500

Premium charge comes to \$192.00. Cost exceeded our original estimate in part by reason that the vehicle is being carried "gratis" by Grace Line, which precludes right of subrogation if loss should be incurred resulting from steamship operations and also because of a change in war risk coverage.

It will be noted also that the marine coverage is for "outbound" travel only as it is not possible now to name the vessel which will return the vehicle and the war rates are fluctuating so much. We are therefore marking up the file for December so we may check with you, or you with us, when the data is available and we will endorse on the inbound marine coverage.

Policy and premium are based on the contract being dated June 27, 1957 and running through January 27, 1958 (six months), as date of shipment is June 27, 1957 and the truck is due back about January 31, 1958. So, for a six month period we used the above dates.

Please note that Item 9, on policy copy, shows the agency to be notified in case of accident or loss at Lima, Peru and in Chile.

It is no problem to extend coverage by a binder if time exceeds the policy period or if period turns out to be less than the present policy period, we can cancel.

I believe this covers this phase of the program and I trust satisfactorily, but there will still be needed, when available, the data as to when the vehicle is to be shipped home and on what ship.
