About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

I have the honour to inform you that at a Meeting of the Society held yesterday you were elected a Fellow of The Linnean Society of London.

Subject to the conditions outlined in Bye-Laws, Chap. 2, Sect. 1, and in accordance with Bye-Laws, Chap. 1, Sect. 7, you should attend within six months of your election a meeting of the Society for formal admission. If you are unable to attend within six months, application will be made, at your request, to the Council for an extension of the time. It should be noted that, in accordance with Bye-Laws, Chap. 1, Sect. 10, no Fellow is entitled to vote at any Meeting of the Society until formal admission has taken place.

I enclose a copy of the Charters and Bye-Laws, a card showing the dates of Meetings of the Society during the Session, a publications' form, a copy of the Library Rules, a List of the Society and a communication giving further details and information in connection with your election to Fellowship.

Dear Sir,

Further to the notification of your Election to Fellowship I have to inform you that the Annual Contribution for Fellows residing in the British Isles is ~~28~~ and for Overseas's Fellows ~~26~~. The first payment is due on election and future payments in advance on or before the 24th day of May of each year, except that Fellows elected between the 1st day of ~~xxxx~~ and the 24th day of May in any year shall not be liable for a second Annual Contribution until the 24th day of May in the year following that in which they were elected. If, however, you prefer to compound for all Contributions, the money now to be paid will be in accordance with the schedule in the Bye-Laws.


If it is not your intention to compound, you should send your first Annual Contribution for the year 1973 — 74 . Your next Annual Contribution will be due on the 24th May 1974 . (See Bye-Laws, Chap. 2, Sect. 1.)

It would be a great convenience if you could kindly give an order on your Bankers for payment of your Annual Contributions, and a form for that purpose is enclosed. Cheques should be made payable to "The Linnean Society of London".

It should be noted that tax relief may be claimed on the whole of the Annual Contribution paid to the Society under Section 16, Finance Act, 1958, "provided the subscription is defrayed out of the emoluments of the office or employment relevant to the activities of the Society". It is understood that similar concessions are also available in some other countries.

Fellows in the United Kingdom unable to claim this concession or willing to forgo this relief may materially assist the Society if they undertake to pay their Annual Contribution under Deed of Covenant (Form and further particulars enclosed).


