Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

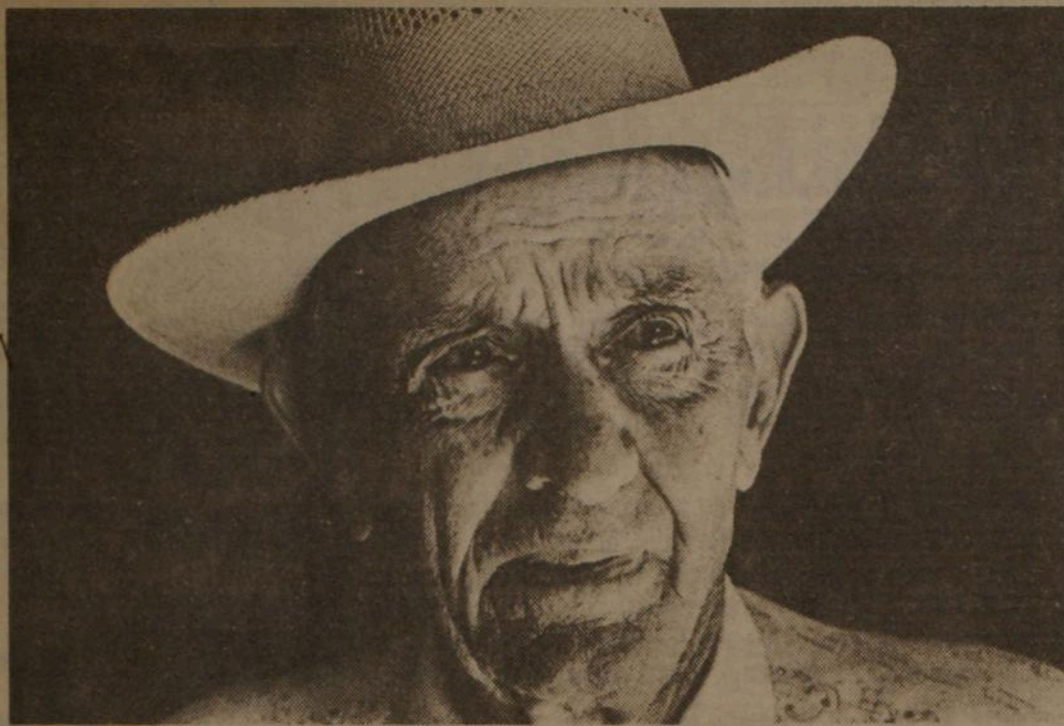

# Old Cowman Sitting Easy in His Saddle

## Nearly 90, He Still Rides Range—and Rails Against Government

ANGELS CAMP, Calif.—In these oak-covered foothills of the Mother Lode, they talk about a "tough old cowman" named Tone Airola, 89, who is so cantankerous that he just might ride up and twist the devil's tail if he thought Beelzebub worked for the U.S. government.

Federal land agents say Airola once got so mad that he roped a U.S. marshal who was trying to serve him with land condemnation papers—a report the rancher denies.

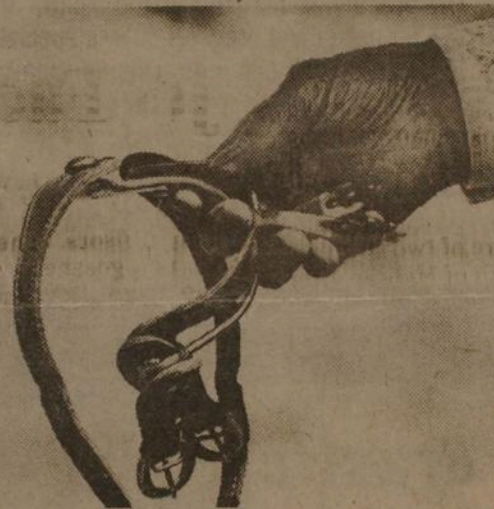
But Airola, a tall man who still sits easy in the saddle, does not deny disliking most government bureaus in general and "the goddamn Corps of Engineers" in particular. He has never forgiven the corps for condemning 2,100 acres of his "home ranch" on the Stanislaus River for the New Melones Dam in August, 1972.

### 'I Just Run 'em Off'

"Why, hell, they came right on my land without asking," Airola said. "They didn't even know where they were; damn bureaucrats kept pointing south and saying it was north. I just run 'em off."

He laughed at the memory as he hefted his saddle onto a roan mare's back, cinched it, strapped on his spurs and climbed on the horse. He rode into a big corral to move some horses, a great-grandfather at home on his range.

"When you deal with Tone, you've got a tiger by the tail," said Morgan Wheeler, Corps of Engineers lands officer. "He's a



crusty old bird, one of a vanishing breed. No one can tell him what he can and can't do."

Tone Airola is tough, shrewd and hard-headed, almost everyone says that, and as he talks, it is obvious that he not only enjoyed his confrontations with the government, he has a lively sense of humor too. His gray eyes twinkle and his weathered face frequently wrinkles into a grin as he spins yarns.

Airola is among the last of the old-time cattle ranchers whose families came to California during the Gold Rush, homesteaded in the Sierra foothills and each summer drove their cattle to federal grazing lands in the high mountain meadows.

There still are a few others like him in these mountains—men like John Fischer, 86, and Sidney (Babe) Airola, 81, a cousin, who

endured the rigors of ranging their cattle in the steep canyons and high meadows, riding 30 miles a day long after other men retired.

But Tone Airola, who will be 90 on Dec. 2, just may be the toughest, if not the most contrary, of them all.

Up in the High Sierra, where winds whisper through the tall pines and a few cattlemen still run cows in the emerald green meadows on the federally owned summer ranges, they still talk about his fights with the U.S. Forest Service.

"He's an obstinate son of a gun," said retired forest ranger Robert Stokes, who explained that Airola once grazed hundreds of cattle on 40,000 acres back of the Calaveras Big Trees, across the Stanislaus River's north fork. "Whenever we tried to get him to follow the regulations, he seemed to enjoy being obstinate. He's a tough old nut."

### Roosevelt Blamed

When he talks of the Forest Service, Tone Airola shouts.

"The cattlemen was gettin' along just fine before 1905, (when) that goddamn Teddy Roosevelt split up the forests (and) cut down on the range."

Over a cold glass of spring water in his comfortable ranch house north of Angels Camp, Tone Airola explained that he is the grandson of Emanuel Airola, who immigrated from Genoa, Italy, to the gold fields in 1860. Emanuel's three sons, John, Gus and Antone, took up homesteads in and around

Angels Camp and Carson Hill and "went to the mountains" with their cattle each summer.

Tone was named for his Uncle Antone. The family simply shortened the boy's name so the two would not be confused.

From the time he was old enough to sit in a saddle, Tone was working cattle beside his father, John. When he took over the ranch, he began to expand, buying up land in the foothills along the Stanislaus River, adding more cattle to his herds.

In June, they used to trail the cattle from the home ranch up into the high country, driving them past Bear Valley, where skiers now play and city folks own condominiums. And in the fall, as the first snows threatened, they "gathered" the cows and calves and headed back down to the winter ranges.

Life was hard, the hours long and working alone in the high mountains, chasing wild cattle was often dangerous.

By 1931, he had title to several thousand acres but owed the banks \$100,000.

During these tough years his wife, Bessie—they have been married 62 years—taught in the one-room schools in Carson Hill and Angels Camp. They reared four

children, three boys and a girl.

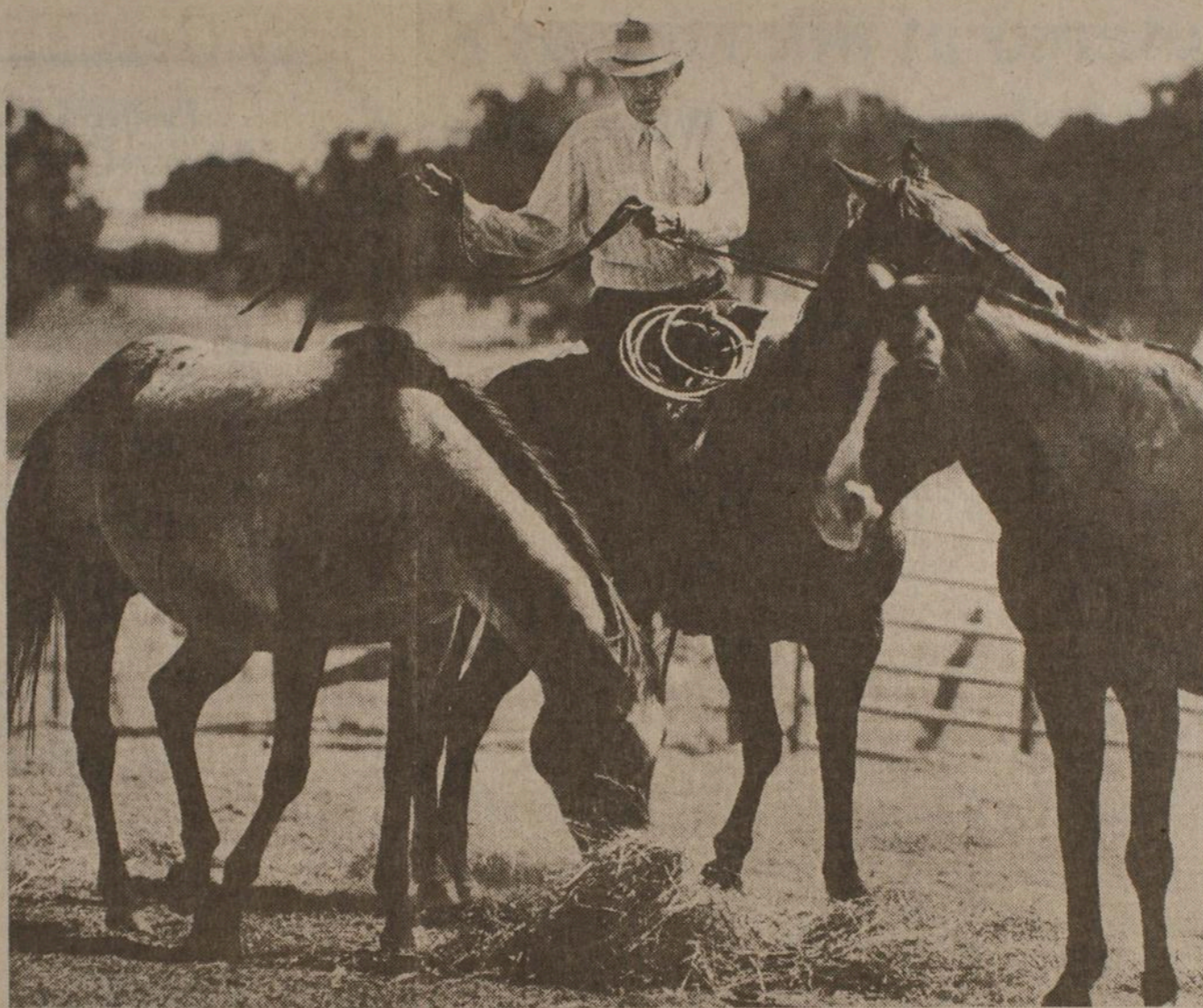
"Old Tone, he was quite a fighter. He wanted what he wanted and he worked hard to get it," recalled Irene Airola, a cousin by marriage.

"They come in offering me \$225 an acre," Airola said of the Corps of Engineers land agents. "I didn't like the way they approached me, acted like they was boss and I didn't have nothing to say about it."

When Tone rejected the offer, condemnation proceedings were filed. He fought back, then finally settled out of court. With the money from the condemnation—he settled for more than \$700,000, according to federal officials—Tone Airola bought more land. Not long after, he retired, turning the new ranch over to a son, Bob, and to John Airola, one of his 14 grandchildren.

Although they no longer take cattle back onto forest ranges, his third son, Bill, who ranches on his own, still is "going to the mountains," trucking 200 cows into the high meadows where they and their calves grow fat on the rich grass.

While Tone still putters around the ranch, he now has more time to reflect and he is quick to say that "the cow business ain't like it was; it used to be good. This was prime land, but now there are too many people, too many regulations."

## Bart J. Bok, 77, Dies; Authored Astronomy Text

TUCSON—Bart J. Bok, 77, an astronomer best known for "The Milky Way," a 1941 book considered the definitive work on Earth's home galaxy, and winner of the American Astronomical Society's highest award last year, died Friday of an apparent heart attack.

Bok was professor emeritus at the University of Arizona.

He taught at Harvard University from 1929 to 1957, when he became director of the Mt. Stromlo Observatory in Canberra, Australia. He came to Arizona in 1966 as head of the astronomy department and director of the Steward Observatory, retiring in 1974.

He wrote "The Milky Way" in collaboration with his late wife, Priscilla. A class of small clouds in the galaxy is now called "The Bok Globules" in their honor. The book itself is now in its fifth edition.

In 1977 an asteroid was named after the couple when it was discovered in a photograph taken at Steward Observatory.

In 1982 Bok was awarded the Henry Norris Russell Lectureship by the American Astronomical Society, the society's equivalent of the Nobel Prize.

## EXPERTS PROBE JUNIPER'S AGE

PINECREST, July 7—Is the juniper tree of the very high Sierra older than the Sequoia Gigantea or Big Tree?

A special study of Tuolumne County's Bennett Juniper in Stanislaus National Forest may decide the question after its rings are counted in a Bay Area laboratory, according to Jack Reveal, United States Forest Service officer at Pinecrest.

Reveal took Nathan A. Bowers and James Allen of Atherton and San Mateo to the tree last week. Bowers and Allen are experts on cone bearing trees and Bowers is the author of a treatise on Pacific Coast cone bearers.

Using an increment bore to get a "core" from the basal limb of the tree, Bowers and Allen got a core which, when studied under a reflective microscope, is expected to show the annual growth rings of the tree.

By comparing the number of juniper rings with the oldest Sequoia growth recorded, the scientists expect to answer the question of comparative ages.

Dear Jack :

Delighted with yours of the 18th. In addition to appreciating your kindness in getting a "rate" for us on the horses, the news that Mrs R will be along makes all this just perfect.

I hold in very high esteem the very few ladies I have known who are really good in camp. What you say about Mrs R means that *she* is one of these rare and much-admired persons. Might even be that we would have a bit of a song-fest around the camp-fire evenings; just like old times!

For fresh meat first night, suppose Jim and I pick up in Sonora enough ground-round steak for four servings. We will also bring from Sonora a couple loaves of bread (pls specify any kind you prefer) and a pound of butter (in metal-coated cubes) Also some powdered chocolate that mixes well with hot water. This because Jim and I don't care so much for coffee.

Other than this, our ideas about grub would be mostly canned stuff such as beans, corned beef and fruit juices. We are not heavy eaters and not hard to please.

I do hope that you can plan to stay two nights, as you say may be possible. If so, that would enable us to complete our work on the big tree and we could all return at the same time the third morning.

Prof Fritz visited my laboratory here last week. He will be awaiting results of our ring count. Same holds for Tucson Tree Ring Lab. That does make us an official "scientific" party, doesn't it, as you told Frank Kruzi ?

As to duffle to pack; Jim and I travel light. Bed roll apiece; couple coils of rope, grub box and personal pack sacks is about the list. In deference to Mrs R, maybe we'll add a clean shirt.

And speaking of Mrs R, will you please ask her if, in addition to meat and bread, she wants us to bring any other items from Oakdale or Sonora? Foodstuffs are expensive these days; maybe she will need a dime or so extra for the trip. Hence enclosed as sort of "advance on Cook's salary". Seems to me we've heard that cooks on scientific expeditions draw down more wages than do cooks working for smoke eaters.

With good luck I'll be at above address Monday night, 25th. Thus I should receive then any word you have for me here with instructions about Sonora pick-ups.

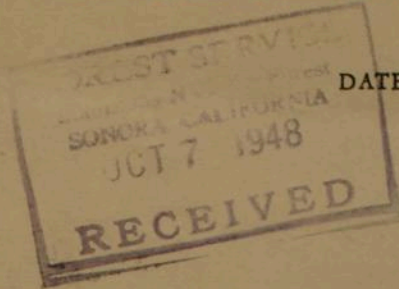

Dear Jack:

I am afraid that I possibly let my enthusiasm run away with me when I wrote you my recent letter from Redding and because I have been in the field most of the time since then, I have just today had an opportunity to get together with the Personnel Board on our mutual problem. I find the following facts which do not stack up very well as far as your particular case is concerned:

1. The Personnel Board is very reticent about authorizing only an open examination, particularly when there are presumably employees within the organization qualified to take an examination promotionally.

2. On an open examination men with veteran's preferences receive ten points, and disabled veterans receive fifteen points. It seems to me that this is an insurmountable obstacle for a man without veteran's preferences. On a promotional examination the veteran's preference amounts to only three points. It therefore seems to me that the only fair thing to do is to apprise you of these facts and give you an opportunity to reconsider your decision before accepting employment with the Division of Forestry.

I have today endeavored to communicate with you by 'phone but find you will be in the field until Friday night. The problem sums itself up pretty much as follows:

1. It appears that we will have to hold the examination on both a promotional and open basis.

2. In view of the veteran's preferences I do not believe you will have much chance to qualify within a reachable range on the eligible list.

3. No further action will be taken until I hear from you upon receipt of this letter. Since I will be in the field most of next week I should appreciate your giving me a ring sometime this weekend. My home number is 5-3245 and will probably be in the office from 9 to 12 Saturday morning. Reverse the charges.



4. In the event that you choose not to take the position on a temporary basis pending certification by examination, I shall write a memo to the Regional Forester and Forest Supervisor setting forth the facts in this case, which I trust will save you considerable embarrassment.

5. Even though the cards seem to be stacked against you, I sincerely hope that you will take the examination since one never knows what the future holds.

6. I am sorry that I have apparently gone off half cocked on this problem, but hope that you will recognize the ramifications of the situation and along with me chalk it up to experience and the process of learning the hard way.

Reference is made to our rather recent telephone conversation in regard to the possibility of the Division of Forestry employing Ranger Jack Reveal of the Stanislaus Forest as Forest Manager.

As you probably know, Mr. Reveal qualified for this position in an examination taken a couple of years ago. On the strength of this information, I offered Mr. Reveal the job and discussed it briefly with you and Supervisor Miller. We later found out that the eligible list had been cancelled by the Personnel Board without notice to this office. Consequently, Mr. Reveal and I are placed in a rather embarrassing position.

In going over the matter with the Personnel Board, I find that a new examination must be held on both a promotional and open basis, and since Reveal can qualify to take it only on the open basis, the opportunities of his being reachable are very small. To further complicate Jack's chances, there is the veterans' preference - veterans receiving 10 points, and disabled veterans, 15 points.

In view of the above, I have informed Jack that it seemed unfair for me to request his taking the position on a temporary basis pending certification. After discussing the matter with him by phone, we arrived at this mutual decision.

If I have caused any inconvenience to your organization and to Mr. Reveal, I want to submit my apologies and at the same time I want to express my appreciation to you and Supervisor Miller for your cooperativeness and willingness to let Jack come to us with reinstatement rights.

Dear Jack:

Mr. McCanlies, Forest Manager for the Division, is accepting employment as logging engineer for a large concern in Oregon. This leaves the position which he is presently filling vacant, and of course leaves me in a very bad situation, being short of that position and already having a vacancy in his assistant's position as a result of George Craig going to the Western Pine Association.

You are on the eligible list for the Forest Manager position and I take this opportunity to offer you this position at this time. The pay scale is \$450.00 to \$556.00 per month. One would, of course, start at the base rate of \$458.00 and will get annual increases of approximately \$20.00 per month until the maximum is reached.

As you probably know, this is a big job, carrying with it the full functional responsibilities for handling the administration of forest practices throughout the state, the acquisition of state forests, the forest insect control programs, and the farm forestry activities. At the present time we have three state forests with a fourth small purchase in the making. It is a job with great diversifications, many interesting and complex problems and every opportunity for an individual to exercise his initiative and resourcefulness. As you know, a large percentage of our work is accomplished through cooperative means with the private land owners and other public agencies.

I believe you are well equipped to handle this job and I would have every confidence in your ability.

I realize that this is a difficult time of year for you and the Forest Service to make a change, particularly since you just recently went to Strawberry. However, Mac will be leaving us by about the middle of August and I am extremely anxious to fill this position by or prior to that time.



Last Wednesday I called

It is complimentary to you that you are being offered an advance. However, I feel this way about it:


You are doubtless desired for the new job because of your experience and familiarity with aerial photos. The new work would add to your proficiency in that field but I believe you don't need it. In the new job you would be doing repetitional work with little new experience. Furthermore, if you should stay with it for the five years the job is expected to last, you will be then where you are now.

Your present job gives you new experience in a field with a definitely better future because of its continuity and the large personnel involved.

If the new job would be in the Eureka supervisor's office, I would still feel the same way about a change, except that you would be in a region where you already have had a good start and where you would have additional opportunity to get thoroughly acquainted with it\*so that you would be independent and could quit and sell your experience as a company employee or as a private consultant. To do this kind of work in a new region would not be so profitable in the end because you have to compete against your own organization.

We have your letter of August 17 and wish to say that we are not in a hurry to fill the Redding position if you are available.





SUBJECT:

During the time arrangements were being made for the transfer of the Farm Forestry Program to the Forest Service July 1, Mr. Plair and later Mr. Christ discussed with you and others your desire to either transfer with the program or to remain with the Service. At the time of discussing this with Mr. Christ this spring you indicated to him a preference for remaining with the Service because of your interest in the Service work program and the opportunities it afforded for doing forestry work on farm woodlands. Acting then on what we felt was in line with your wishes the Forest Service was advised through the media of our Washington office that you preferred to remain with the Service either in the Lakeport-Sebastopol area or, if not there, in some other area where there were opportunities for a professionally trained forester to work on farm planning having to do primarily with farm forestry and other woodland work.

We understand, however, that since that time you have come to the feeling that you would not be happy in this work, and that you would actually like to transfer to a program such as the Forest Service has to offer for it is now your feeling that, as a professional forester, you would prefer that work as a career. As it is not our desire to force employees to remain with the Service who are not keenly interested in pursuing the work of soil conservation, we have written to the Forest Service advising them they have our permission to effect your transfer if it is their desire to now complete the action initially recommended.

If the Forest Service is now willing to consider the action, they will no doubt advise you as to the effective date of your transfer. It will be appreciated by our Service if you will advise your present District Conservationist of any contacts made by the Forest Service relative to the date you would report on transfer so that he, in turn, might keep Mr. Barnes advised.

Delay in answering your letter of July 26 was caused by my absence from Berkeley for two weeks.

I had been wondering what the S.C.S. change as to forestry projects would do to you. Your letter gives the answer.

If you are thinking of quitting the S.C.S. there is no better time than the present, whether you go into the U. S. Forest Service, the State service or into private work. You have a lot of federal experience now, so why not get into another organization?

The California State forestry work is certain to boom and there is not only an opportunity but a need for technical men there. The technical men going into it now would be on hand to see the start of real forestry and would have a big hand in helping shape the policies and techniques.

If you are interested in private employ you should get into it without delay. The risks as to tenure are greater than in public employ, but in my opinion, the satisfactions are greater and the ceiling for salary is limited only by the individual's own limitations. It is all productive work, there is no red tape, a minimum of useless paper work, and one is closer to the job. If you are interested you should call on Mr. Geo. B. McLeod, vice-president, Hammond Lumber Co., 405 Montgomery St., San Francisco, or Mr. E. B. Birmingham, general manager at Samoa. And call on Otis R. Johnson, president, Union Lumber Co., 1000 Crocker Bldg., San Francisco. The first is going some day to make an intensive survey of his property to determine the feasibility of continuous production and Mr. Johnson has the excellent Big River property to manage when he determines to set it up as a Tree Farm. Frankly, you'll have to compete with men like Stewart Snyder, as far as my own recommendations go, if they are requested. I think, however, you have gotten a certain kind of training which should be useful on a Tree Farm.



If your expenditures and losses of these classes amount to more than 10 percent, it will usually be to your advantage to itemize them and compute your tax on page 4.

IF YOUR INCOME WAS \$5,000 OR MORE.—Disregard the tax table and compute your tax on page 4. You may either take a standard deduction of \$500 or itemize your deductions, whichever is to your advantage.
