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About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Dear Richard,

Enclosed I am sending you a check of \$8.00 to cover my subscription fees for Madroño (1955 and 1956). Sorry for the delay.

So far my copies of Madroño were being sent to my address in Ankara. My assignment in Jordan has been extended for another year by Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. So I resigned from the University of Ankara and decided to stay in Jordan until the end of next summer. Therefore I would like to ask you to be so kind to send my copies of Madroño to the address given above until the end of August 1956. After August either I shall return to Turkey or go to another country. At any rate I shall let you know my new mailing address. However you may kindly keep my copies after next August until my further notice.

I collected quite a few interesting and seemingly new plant material during my botanical explorations in Jordan. I intend to publish them as soon as I find the opportunity to describe them. Of course the best place to publish them would be the "Palestine Journal of Botany" which is published in Israel now. I have no means to contact that journal since there is no political relation between Israel and Arab countries. Therefore I would like to ask you if it would be possible to publish some short articles about the Jordan plants in Madroño?
