Chernobyl Makes Ukraine Want Independence

To the Editor:

Imagine having your government exhort your participation, and that of your children, in the annual parade down Main Street while, entirely unknown to you, a highly radioactive plume hung over your city, and unseen radioactive dust and ash had spread over that city's streets and sidewalks. Imagine further these same government officials, again unknown to you, having earlier evacuated columns of their own children to distant safety in secretly commandeered planes and trains.

A scene, perhaps, from a science fiction movie? To the contrary, in 1986 in my hometown, Kiev in the Ukraine, these events took place. Five days before the annual May Day parade and celebration, the Chernobyl nuclear reactor exploded some 60 miles north of Kiev. Party officials began secret evacuations of their children almost immediately, but in public statements denied that anything unusual had happened — the May Day parade had to go on as planned. And so on May 1, 1986, tens of thousands of children marched unwarned and unprotected through an environment saturated with radioactive poisons to celebrate the glories of the Communist reign.

Some of our children who marched on that fateful day or who on the days preceding it or the two weeks succeeding it played outside in our schoolyards and playgrounds are quietly dying of leukemia.

Potassium iodide prevents the absorption of radioactive iodine by the thyroid gland. It was widely available in the Soviet Union in 1986. It could have made a big difference. Protective clothing could have made a difference. Even staying inside could have made a difference. So repeatedly muses the half-mad Ukrainian mother who alternates between helpless tears and frightful rage.

The democratic forces of the Ukraine ranging from Green World to *Rukh* seek independence and full-fledged democratization for the simple reason that neither is possible without the other.

The Ukraine seeks democratization and independence for the same reasons Americans and countless others have sought them for centuries: to establish a system of political accountability, which, had it been in place in 1986, would not have allowed some children to ride trains to the Crimea while others participated in a march of death down Khreshchatyk,

the central boulevard of Kiev.

Some in the United States seem to think the push for sovereignty in the Soviet republics such as the Ukraine a kind of nuisance, an untimely challenge to a Nobel Peace Prize winner who wishes to keep the fraying empire intact. I would invite those Americans to come to the Ukraine. Let them visit the mothers of the children of Chernobyl and explain why the man who in 1986 was at the helm of the Government that played with their children's lives with lies deserves continued support.

And let them explain to the mothers why their children had to march while those of the party were evacuated.

In U.S., No Stockpiles

To the Editor:

The fifth anniversary of the Chernobyl nuclear accident emphasizes once again that the United States Government has failed to make provision for a stockpile of potassium iodide to protect the civilian

public health authorities if needed.

Although potassium iodide is not an antidote to radiation effects or entirely risk-free, it can significantly reduce the radiation exposure to the thyroid gland from fallout by blocking radiiodine accumulation in the thyroid. However, potassium iodide must be given to exposed populations immediately before or within hours of exposure to fallout. This means appropriate amounts must be prepared and stockpiled conveniently.

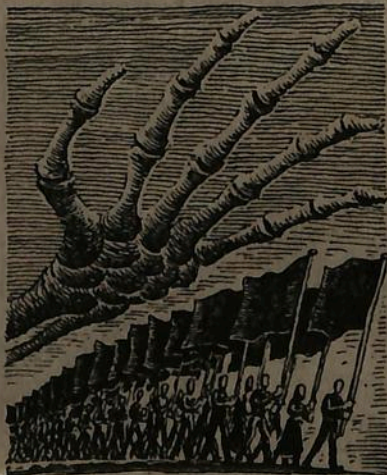
The effectiveness and practicality of potassium iodide for this purpose is established. Shortly after the Chernobyl accident, it was given to 135,000 people in the nearby town of Pripyat. In Poland, approximately 10 million doses of potassium iodide were given to the exposed population in a massive prophylactic response to fallout from Chernobyl. It was considered for use at Three Mile Island, but was unnecessary because radioiodine release was so small. However, sufficient quantities of potassium iodide for public distribution were not on hand had its use been advisable.

The American Thyroid Association, in a letter to the Federal Emergency Management Agency in September 1989, urged the immediate establishment of regional stockpiles of potassium iodide, although general distribution was not recommended, largely because of logistical difficulties. Last July, the Centers for Disease Control convened a meeting of experts to review Nuclear Regulatory Commission recommendations against stockpiling potassium iodide for the public. There was strong, though not unanimous, sentiment for stockpiling as simple, inexpensive and prudent.

There seems little point to reviewing once again the well-established basis for the use of potassium iodide. What is urgently needed is an immediate decision to stockpile it and then an organized effort to design practical mechanisms for rapid distribution if and when needed. Its cost is trivial, especially against the cost of the potential damage to those exposed to fallout in the event of an accident. DAVID V. BECKER, M.D.

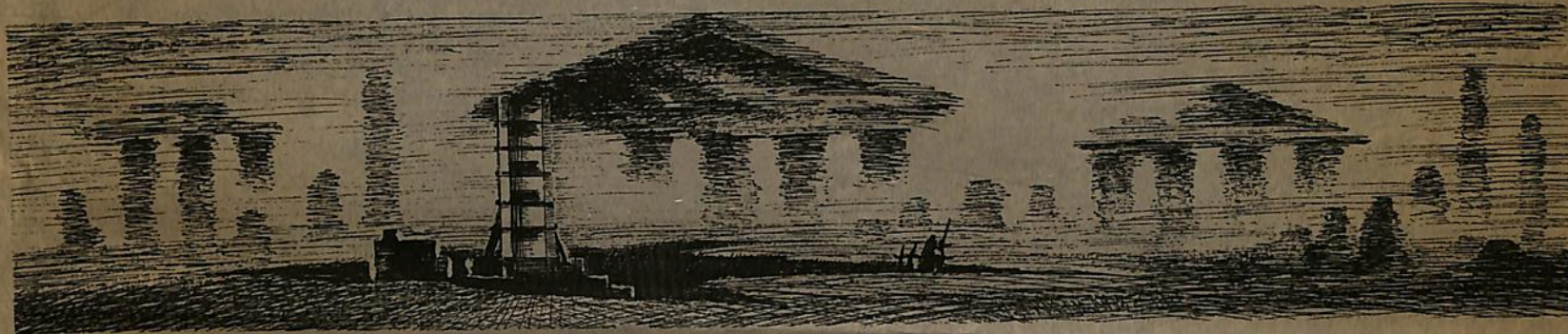

in the uranium in these reactors, greatly reducing the instability. They also have placed mechanical stops on the control rods so that they cannot be withdrawn completely.

Western reactors are stable; if water boils away, they automatically shut down. Nevertheless, they can have accidents, as we saw at Three Mile Island in Pennsylvania in 1979. This is because the reactor contains a lot of radioactive fission products (but not neutrons), which generate heat but not a chain reaction. Water is necessary to carry that heat away, and loss of water may lead to a

industry organization, makes regular, extended visits to each nuclear plant and instructs operators on the best practices. Controls have been improved and operators get frequent training in simulated accidents.

Future nuclear power plants are designed to be even safer than the present ones. It is impossible to guarantee that there will never be an accident again, but there cannot be a Chernobyl in this country. The U.S., and other industrial countries, need nuclear power. □

UKRAINIANS RALLY AGAINST MOSCOW

Thousands in Republic March To Urge More Autonomy

MOSCOW, Sept. 30 (AP) — Tens of thousands of Ukrainian nationalists marched today through Kiev, the republic's capital, calling for greater independence from the central government in Moscow.

"Mother Moscow: We want to be orphans," declared a banner held aloft by cheering protesters as they streamed along the city's main street, the Kreshchatik.

The Ukraine is one of 13 Soviet republics that have taken steps toward greater autonomy from Moscow. The only one that has declared immediate independence is Lithuania.

The Ukraine is the second-largest Soviet republic, after Russia, and is an important grain-producing area. Its Parliament has declared sovereignty from Moscow and claims the right to overrule national laws.

Peaceful March

Nationalist groups want it to go further and take rapid moves toward secession.

During the demonstration today, Interior Ministry troops in armored personnel carriers and riot policemen wearing bulletproof vests guarded key buildings and intersections, but the march was peaceful. No clashes were reported by the Soviet press or by witnesses.

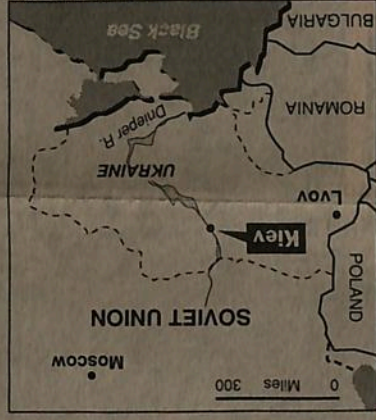

the Rukh movement, the main umbrella group of the nationalist opposition, quickly altered policy to drop their previous hesitancy and fully endorse outright independence for the Ukraine as its declared policy.

Rukh leaders, who until now had some qualifications and differences in their approach toward ultimate independence, appeared to be scrambling to catch up with the republic's new student protesters. The protest stressed that sovereignty for the Ukraine outweighed any promises from President Mikhail S. Gorbachev for a new national union treaty to accommodate the 15 republics' demands for autonomy.

It was an emotional event for the students and for a large crowd of spectators who watched in silent fascination, occasionally tossing a floral bouquet at a well-received performance.

But it was not immediately clear in the crazy-quilt state of Ukrainian politics whether the student demonstration and parliamentary retreat was a singular phenomenon or the beginning of something more far reaching.

The student demonstration appeared to provide what Rukh and other opposition outlets had not yet been able to apply, a simple focus, with doctors dramatically measuring the hunger strikers' health, for venting dissatisfied faction with the Communist status quo and its hard economic times. Ukraine Bows to Student Protests On Charter Backing Sovereignty

KIEV, U.S.S.R., Oct. 17 (Reuters) — The Ukrainian Parliament bowed to protests by students today and voted to adopt a new constitution to support the Soviet republic's declaration of sovereignty.

Deputies also agreed to hold a referendum next year across the Ukraine, the Soviet Union's second most important republic, which would amount to a vote of confidence in Parliament.

To defuse several days of street protests, they also agreed to draft a law that would allow Ukrainian conscripts to perform their military service on Ukrainian soil.

Demonstrators want a new constitution because they fear the Ukraine's proclamation of sovereignty in July might be compromised by any new treaty redefining Moscow's relationship with the 15 Soviet republics.

3 Days of Student Protests

The concessions came after a third day of protests by students in the capital, Kiev.

They demanded the resignation of Prime Minister Vitaly Masol, accusing him of pursuing economic policies that betrayed Ukrainian interests.

Earlier in the day, President Leonid Kravchuk of the Ukraine said Mr. Masol would resign. Deputies voted to take formal note of his statement, but it was unclear if Mr. Masol would step down.

If Mr. Masol resigns, he would be the first official of his rank in a Soviet republic to do so under public pressure.

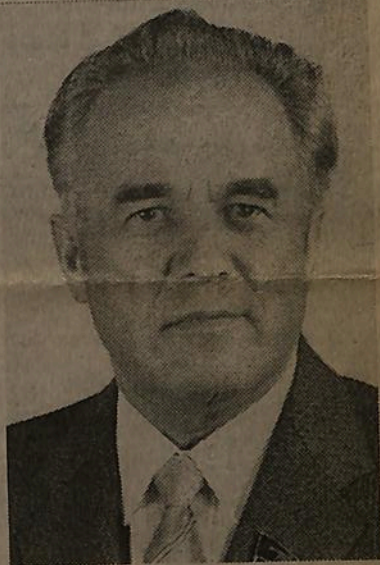
Economic Plan Denounced

Mr. Masol served as Prime Minister under the former Ukrainian Communist Party chief, Vladimir Shcherbitsky, a hard-liner who was removed from office last year after 17 years in power.

The Ukraine followed other Soviet republics last July in proclaiming its sovereignty and control over its own resources, and went further than many other republics in calling for a republican army and separate currency.

Students and radical deputies have denounced Mr. Masol's economic proposals, saying they call for the transfer to Moscow of 39 percent of the republic's hard currency earnings and fail to embrace basic tenets of market economics.

Up to 100,000 protesters have taken part in this week's protests. Students in three colleges have barricaded themselves in and are refusing to attend classes. Protesters in cities across the Ukraine, a key industrial and agricultural region, have supported the Kiev demonstrators.

Radioactive Soviet Ship Called Danger by Finn

HELSINKI, Finland, Oct. 17 (AP) — The radioactive hulk of a Soviet ship in a lake near Leningrad poses a major environmental hazard, a Finnish radiation safety official said today.

"We have every reason to be worried and urgently need more information about the hulk," said Olli Vilkkamo, senior inspector at the Finnish Center for Radiation and Nuclear Safety.

The German-built ship, sunk in Lake Ladoga 30 miles from the Finnish Soviet border, was reportedly used for secret Soviet military experiments in the 1950's.

Lake Ladoga, the largest freshwater lake in Europe, supplies drinking water for Leningrad's five million people.

Finnish officials first learned of the existence of the radioactive hulk from a Soviet-made film documentary, Mr. Vilkkamo said. The Soviet report said the ship contained 2,000 tons of radioactive water containing strontium 90, a deadly substance present in fallout from nuclear explosions.

"If the reports are true, then it's a lot," Mr. Vilkkamo said. "Strontium 90 is extremely dangerous. Great caution has to be exercised in moving the hulk or pumping out the radioactive water."

Militant Students in Ukraine Force the Party Into Retreat

KIEV, U.S.S.R., Oct. 18 — A missing force in Soviet politics, student militancy, has coalesced with a vengeance here in the Ukraine, pushing the Communist-dominated Parliament into deep retreat and forcing the nationalist movement to put a more aggressive edge on its agenda.

Thousands of students exulted as they folded up their tent city in the main square today after two weeks of protest marches and hunger strikes that seized the political initiative in this restive republic.

With an immediate success that surprised many of the students, the demonstrators — a core of 200 hunger strikers plus tens of thousands of students who rushed here as support from across the Ukraine — found Premier Vitaly A. Masol agreeing to resign, as they demanded.

Parliament Bends Too

The students also found the once obdurate Parliament agreeing to at least consider the rest of their demands, including the confiscation of the Communist Party's considerable real estate portfolio and a referendum on the Communist stewardship in this separatist-

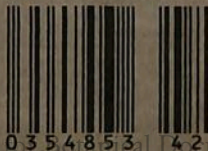
minded republic, the second most important Soviet republic with 52 million people and a fifth of the nation's industrial and agricultural output.

"My old grandfather used to tell me how he fought in the woods against the Red Army," 19-year-old Oksana Burakovska said, sitting teary-eyed in the tent city as the protest ended.

"He always told me to fight for Ukrainian independence, but by the time he died even he had lost faith in that idea," she said as fellow students broke their fasts and hugged one another amid the sun-drenched tent city debris that covered a large marble esplanade under the stony glare of the Lenin monument.

No less impressive than the students' achievements in Parliament was the fallout in radicalism from the students' success in the streets: The leaders of

I happily anticipate meeting with you again, together with your colleagues, and I am eager to greet your family.



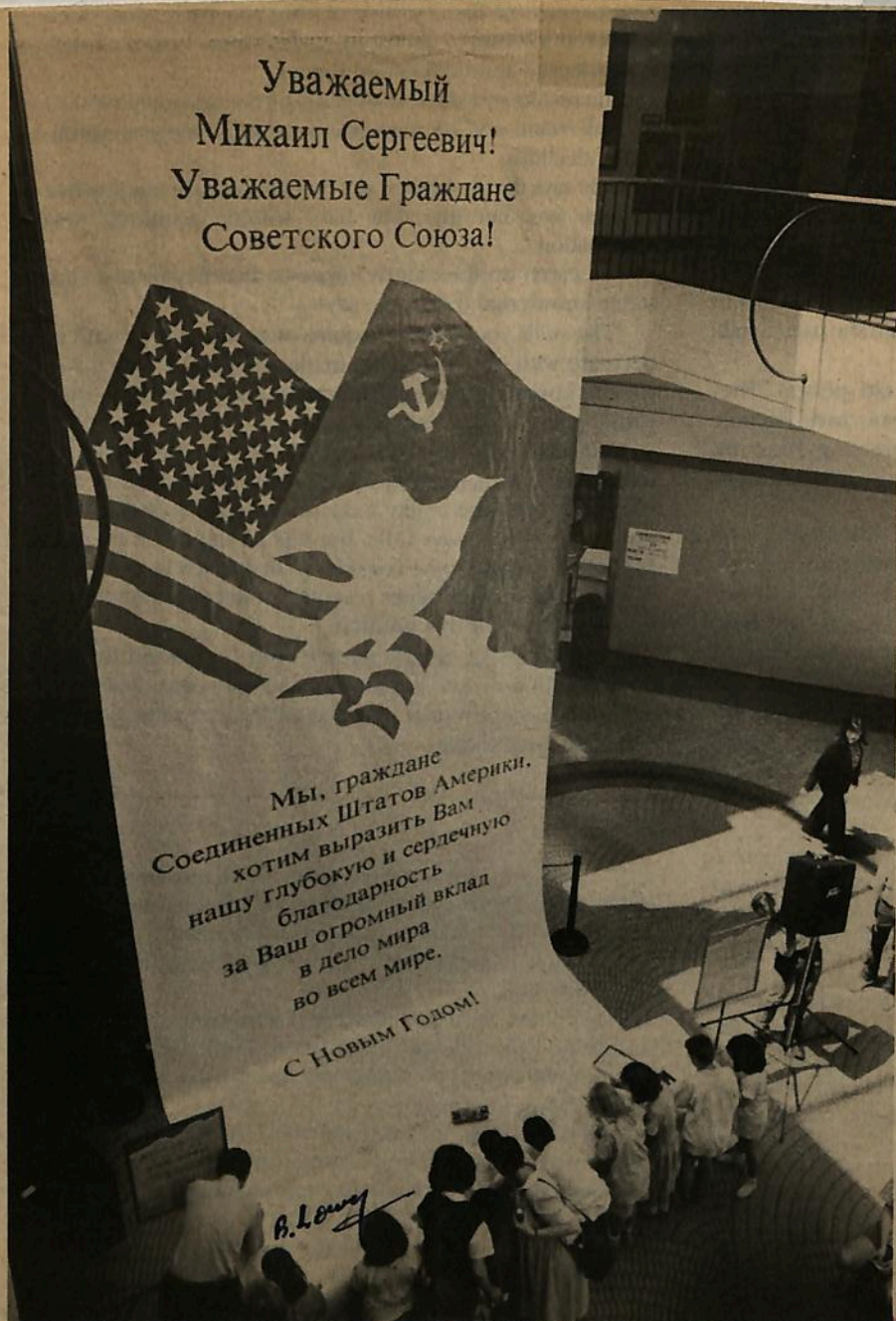
PEACE MAIL

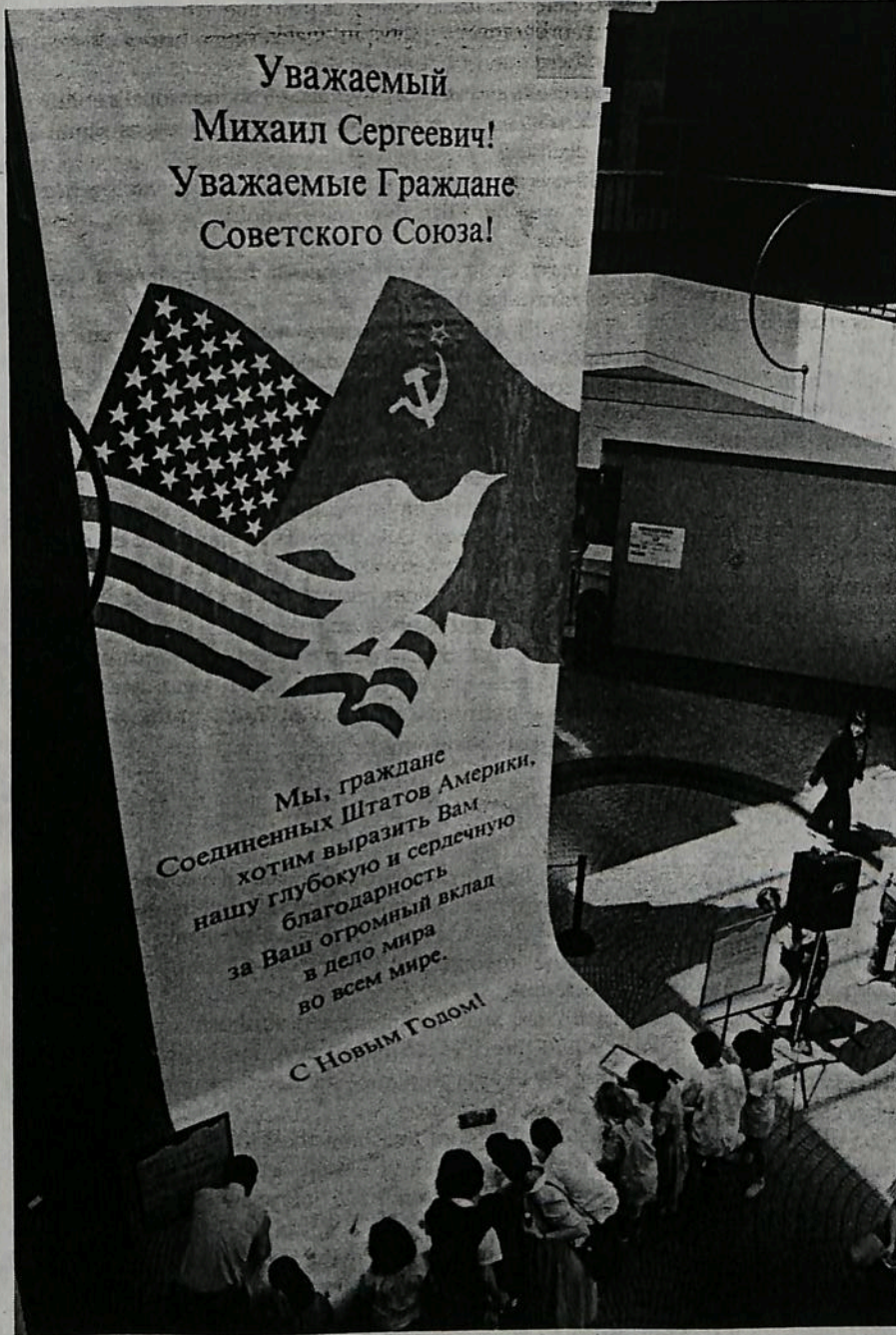

This giant greeting card, bearing New Year's wishes from millions of Americans, will be sent to the U.S.S.R. next winter. The card, designed and constructed by students in The University of Iowa Department of Art, stands 35 feet tall and 12 feet wide. It will be sent around the United States, with stops in 70 cities, collecting signatures of more than two million children and adults. The tour will conclude in December when President George Bush signs the card. The idea was conceived by an Iowa businessman who last year sent the Soviets a similar card with 100,000 signatures. Translated from Russian, the card reads:

Dear Mr. Gorbachev and the people of the Soviet Union,

We the people of the United States of America wish to express our gratitude for your contribution toward World Peace.

Since your recent affiliation with the MEDICAL Institute, no doubt it will require a good deal more of your time. I congratulate you, and wish you success in your new responsibilities.


All is well here, and at the moment our department is trying to convince the university administration that we need more space, especially for research labs, and for graduate student offices. In the basement of the Life Science Building there is considerable room, but several departments have similar needs, so we do not know how the available space will eventually be allocated. As you know, the mycological herbarium and the higher plant herbarium are both in great need of being properly housed, instead of having many of our specimen cabinets in the corridors.

Presently, I am working on my Amazonian collections, dividing the material with the New York Botanical Garden which sponsored my participation in the Flora Amazonica Project. I made over 1000 collections on my 1986 trip to Brazil, and these are being shared with the Research Institute in Manaus, Brazil, (which only recently took duplicates for their herbarium), and with the New York Botanical Garden.

Sara, Maxine, and I are often together on weekends, and next week our younger daughter Doris will join us from her home in Boston. Maxine and I had a very pleasant vacation in Mexico, and brought back with us a few Mexican specialties that we are fond of, including a product made from the spore mass of Ustilago maydis (called corn smut, in English), which when properly prepared is a delicious food. It was known to the Aztecs centuries ago, and it is still highly prized among Mexicans. As far as I know, it is not consumed by the population of any other country in the Americas. Pathologists (at least in the U.S.) are generally unaware that this pathogen is edible.

The time has come for me to make plans for the coming year, and I would be delighted to visit you in Kiev. If you would be good enough to send me an invitation from your Institute, I would attend to the details of my transportation. Tentatively, I would be able to spend about 2 weeks with you, to be followed by a week in Budapest. I could plan to leave home on about June 22, 1990, and stay with you until July 6. My major interest would be to examine some Tremellales that you may have in your herbarium, and also to present a seminar at your convenience. Please let me know whether this plan is acceptable to you. I would be very happy to see you again, and to visit your renowned city, about which I have been reading in the books that you were so kind to give me.

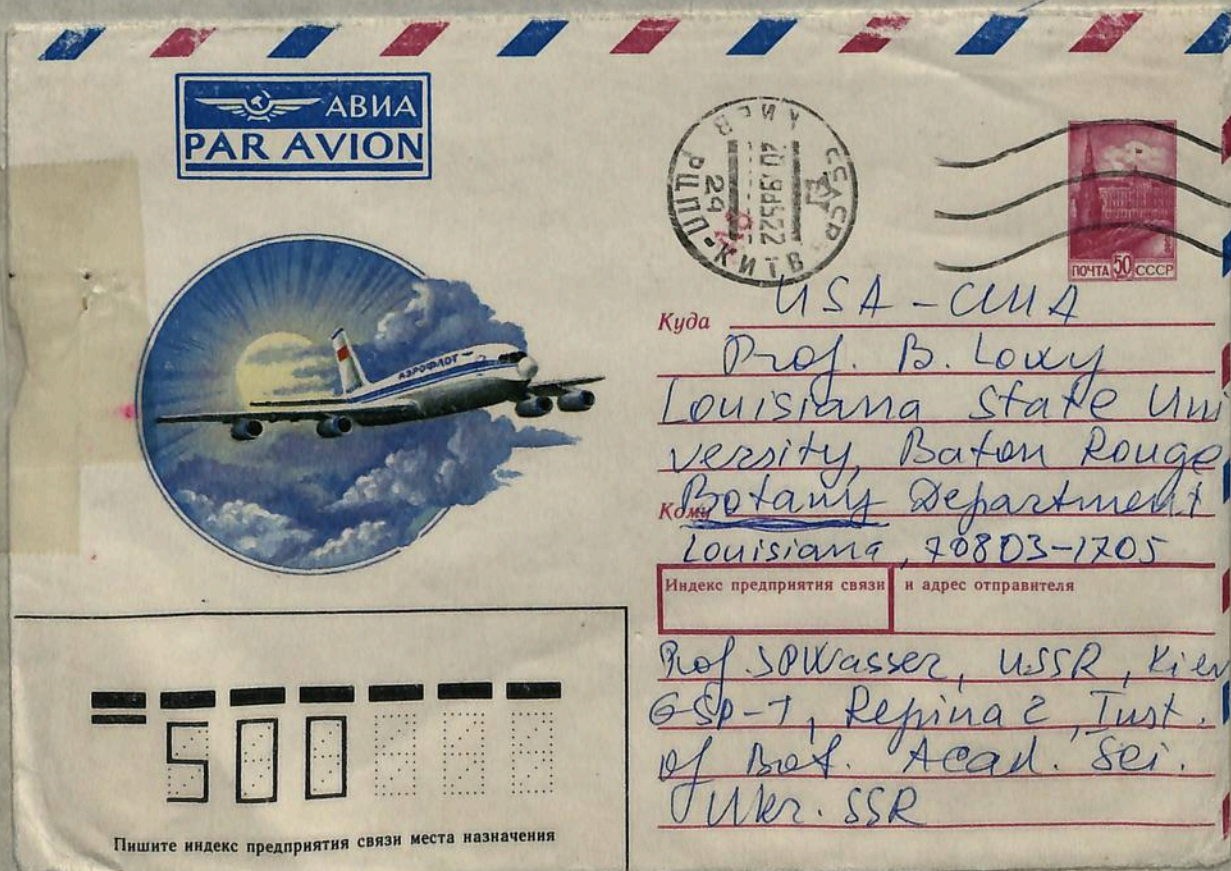
Dear Prof. B. Lowy,
