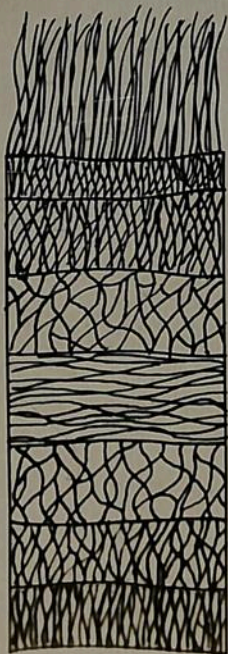

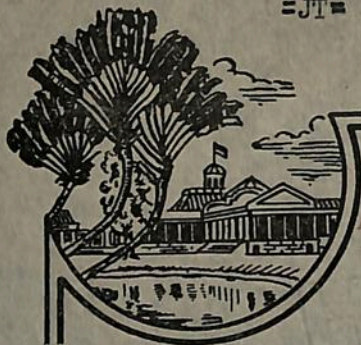

How is Baton Rouge now? And how is L.S.U. and the Department? Friendly

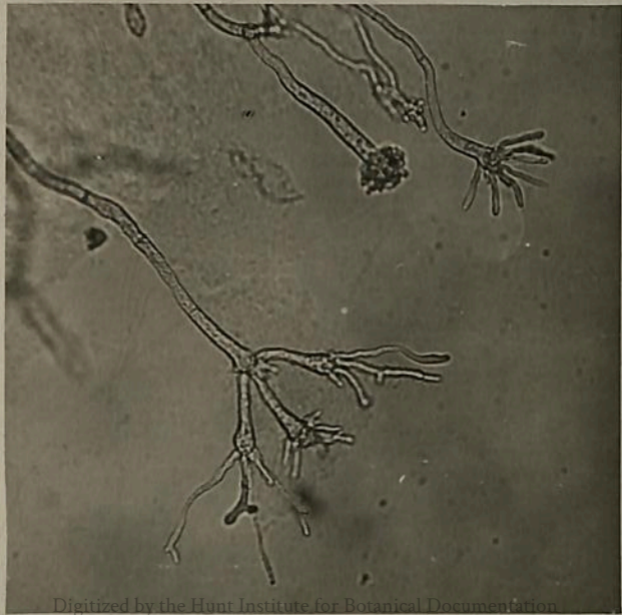
I feel homesick for America and I have difficulty
on readjusting myself to many things in Baghdad.

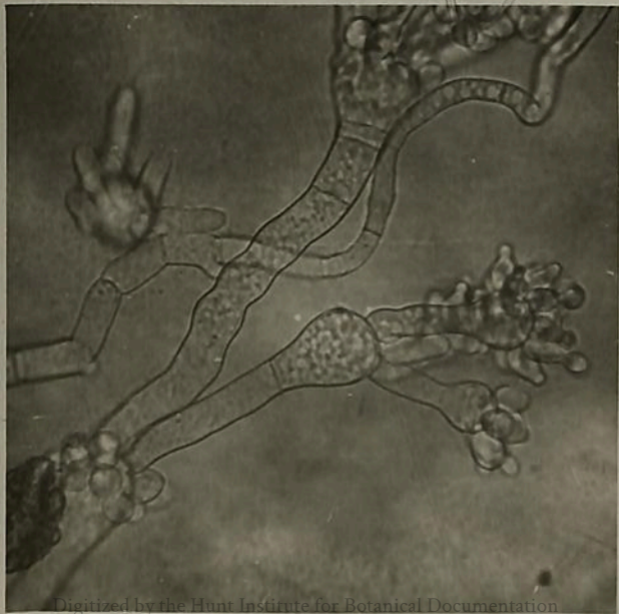
The weather is very cold these days, but

Dear Dr. Lowy,

I am sorry do not write you all this time, but practically nothing much to write and everything is going on the same routine. I hope this letter find you and Mrs. Lowy and the little girl fine and happy. May be there is a fourth in the family, I don't know.

I made many trips in the country south and north and tried to locate some of the Myxomycetes or Tremellales but I didn't have any luck yet. There are some of the Lichens and of course lot of the parasitic fungi.

I am working for the last six months with a colleague on the soil fungi of the area of Baghdad. It is a ~~kind of~~ investigation and it is the first of its kind ~~in~~ for this area. The work mainly include the isolation of the different kinds of fungi and the identification of these fungi. Also it includes some studies for the soil ~~at~~ itself like pH and water holding capacity and many others. Now and then we get some difficulty concerning the references for some of the fungi we isolate. Now we have the difficulty with this fungus which is possible Aspergillopsis but we don't have any reference on it at all. I am sending you some pictures for this fungus just to give an idea. and Concerning the colonies, they are yellowish-green on Coon's medium, small, velvety, and almost colorless in the reverse. Any information you can supply us it will be greatly appreciated and if happen to have some extra copy of any reprint you think which might help us we will be glad to have it with many thanks.

Thank you very much for the illustrated book which was very handy in our work. Thank you too for the reprints, and I am still keeping my eyes open for the Tremellaceous fungi. We didn't have good season this year for the Truffles, hardly I saw it in the market, since I had in mind to send you some.

I had to move from my house to a new small apartment, and we are living by ourselves now (~~you~~ we use to live with my family). Well this business took almost two full months to finish it. Since Pauline is working, and I have the summer vacation now, so I am doing the baby sitting job most of the time.

We postponed our trip to the U.S.A. until next summer, for some financial reasons, and this will give me more time to work or to continue working on the soil fungi. We are almost through with Baghdad Area. We cannot continue in

the summer because of the high temperature, and we don't have refrigerated incubator in our labs yet. But we are planning to do the other work, ~~the~~ then continue again with the isolation and identification next September.

Thank you for your nice letter and enjoyed hearing about your summer trip.



Many thanks for the specimens from Kenya. They certainly bear a superficial resemblance to a tremellaceous fungus but they would make a lichenologist more enthusiastic than a tremellologist. I think they belong to the genus Collema, one of those lichens having Nostoc as the symbiont and therefore slightly gelatinous. However, included within one of the collections is a fruiting body of Auricularia polytricha and another of A. fuscescens, so this is all to the good. I'll put them both in the herbarium.
