
PERU DISCUSSION SEMINAR



Dear Mr. Kreuzschner:

I cannot tell you how much I regret the misunderstanding which has, unfortunately, impelled you to write to me in such severe terms of castigation and abuse. I could scarcely believe that such a denunciatory letter was possible from the House of Friedländer, even had the provocation been much greater than it actually was.

I am guilty of misinterpreting the price of the Tulasne volumes, but must plead mitigating circumstances. When a colleague of mine received the same 3-volume set for a total price of \$19.50, I felt there might have been some error in your quotation of DM 205.70 (approximately \$58.50) in spite of the curt note that the "Preis wurde inzwischen vom Verlag erhöhe." Consequently, I sent you my check (dated Feb. 29, 1972) which you have received, in the belief that if I was in error, you would promptly call my attention to it. When such notification was not forthcoming, I dismissed the matter from my mind, assuming (quite incorrectly, as it turns out) that I had received the books at the old rate. Also, almost four months have passed since I sent you my check and only now do I have at hand your stern letter reprimanding me in the strongest and most uncompromising terms for my mistake! Altogether, I cannot but feel that the manner of your condemnation is quite unwarranted.

Within a few days, I am going on sabbatical leave to Peru where I shall be for the remainder of the year, but before doing so I wish in any case to settle my account and enclose a check in the sum of \$39.00, which together with my earlier draft of \$19.50 should erase my indebtedness. 
Many thanks for your assistance with the identification of the specimens that I sent to you. It is quite interesting to find that the fungus appears to be a Favolaschia. I had looked at some of the details of the fungus but had been unable to place it any place that appeared satisfactory to me. Thus far I have not been able to examine it any further and check the references that you mentioned. I have Singer's Agaricales (2nd edition) but do not have the Lloydia that you mentioned. In order to try to obtain some additional specimens I shall periodically visit the spot.

If I can find other specimens for study, but even if I do not, perhaps we could compare notes on our observations and arrive at some decision on the disposition of the fungus.

I am sorry to hear that you won't be coming to the ASB meetings. Perhaps, however, the time in the future when your visit to Atlanta will take place will become a little more definite. At least I hope so.

It looks as if I will begin to have a little more of an opportunity to get out into the field for more collecting this spring and summer. I am trying to get a little group of interested students and others together for regular excursions, at least once a month. Should this work out satisfactorily I can begin to be a more productive collector.

Best wishes on your plans for another Costa Rica trip this summer. I hope that your plans will materialize.


Through the years, I have attended a number of other MSA meetings and forays, but not as frequently as I would like to have done. During the past decade, particularly, my field work has
