The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.


Dear Dr. Lowy:

I am currently working on a monograph of the moss family Bartramiaceae under the direction of W. B. Schofield at the University of British Columbia. I plan to collect this summer throughout the southeastern United States, and I am interested in locating areas that might produce specimens in this family.

While in this area I will direct particular attention to the genus Philonotis. I should like to acquire living material of the following species: gracillima, sphaerocarpa, uncinata, longiseta and caespitosa. I should also like to make observations and collections to demonstrate any variability within each of the taxa as well as any other taxa in the region.

I would appreciate any information, specific or general, that will help locate camp grounds, park lands, and other collecting sites.


Dear Mr. Zales:

Enclosed are a few maps that you may find helpful for your tour of the southeastern U.S.

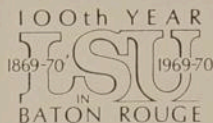



I have been looking over my notes on Tremellales of Costa Rica, which I began working up after my return from San Jose in August of 1964. My study of this material was interrupted when I left for Sao Paulo, Brasil, where I spent my sabbatical year (1965-66) teaching and doing some research under the auspices of the Fulbright Program. I returned from Brasil in September. Now I would like to continue where I left off, to plan spending the summer of 1967 collecting and studying additional needed material in Costa Rica.

I do not think it is too early to look ahead to this now because I am very much interested in trying to have a manuscript ready on Costa Rican Tremellales by the end of 1967. If I am not mistaken, Jay Savage is no longer in charge of the OTS Program and I would like to know to whom I may write to request OTS support for my project, as a Research Participant. 
