M1 - M 11. 6 miles from Carson on road to Fallon, Ormsby County; 6/18/37. Soil loose rock, sandy loam, some clay.

- M 1 Sphaeralcea ambigua
 "Desert mallow", "wild geranium"; "mu-ha" (P); "goina kumbe"(S).
 Assoc. sagebrush, ephedra and Indian paint brush.
 A medium sized sp., the only one in bloom; flw. apricot color.
 Roots bruised and used as poultice by Paiutes. Seed used
 formerly for food.
 See M 12.
- M 2 Salvia carnosa
 "Flowering sage"; "sa-wa-bae"(P) & (S).
 Assoc. same as M 1.
 Flws. purple.
 Medicinal tea; forage plant.
- M 3 Castilleja angustifolia
 "Indian paint brush"; "ne-ma-maw-tawber"-(Snake's son-in-law).(S).
 Brilliant scarlet bracts; going to seed; plants plentiful.
 Rattlers sometimes found at roots.
- M 4 Eriogonum ovalitation

 "Wild buckwheat", "sulphur flower", "butter balls"; "na-ka-donup"

 (tribe not given). (Information from Carson Indian Agency).

 Plants plentiful; flw. yellow.

 Tea from roots used by Indians to cure cold.
- M 5 Asclepias cordifolius ? "wisha"(S).

 "Milkweed"; "wa-na"(P); "wisha"(S).

 Plants rather scarce, just coming into bloom, low in stature (plants young), have large tap root, wide green lvs.

 Sheep poisoning plant. Root (or juice?) used for ringworm. (From Lovelock flower exhibit).
- M 6 Phlox stansburyi?
 "Phlox", "sweet william"; "deep-taw-ne-gah"(tribe not given).
 Flower varying from white to pink.

- M 7 Ephedra nevadensis?

 "Indian tea", "Mormon tea"; "chu-dupe", "tsurpe"(P); "tu-rumbe"
 (S).

 Browse plant. Branches boiled for sick inside. Shoshones
 make coffee from ripe seeds, parched and coarsely ground.
 Tea from stems is a blood purifier.

- M 9 Chylismia "Day primrose"; "ya-ung-taw-negah"(P); "we-a-tum"(S).
- M 10 Cogswellia?

 "Wild celery", "salt and pepper"; "ye-duts"(P); "bass-o-wep"

 (S); "ik-nish"(K).

 Assoc. sphaeralcea, chylismia, astragalus.

 Plant common.

 Food, flavoring soups (seed or lvs. used); very large roots boiled and eaten, and water therefrom used to kill mites on chickens. Klamath use identical.
- M 11 Hermidium alipes
 "Four-o'clock"; "he-wovey"(P) & (S).
 Plentiful in small colonies.
 Powdered root blown on sores of impetigo effects a cure.
- M 12 Sphaeralcea
 "Desert mallow"; "goina kumbe"(S); "mu-ha"(P).
 Near Fallon, Churchill County; 5/18/37.
 Assoc; Four e'clock, abronia and cogswellia; in sandy soil.
 Tap root; flw. apricot color.
 Seeds used for food in early days.
 See M 1.

M 13 - M 18. Schurz, Mineral County; 5/19/37. El. 4,000 ft. Desert sand, granite boulders.

- M 13 Chylismia "Day primrose".
- M 14
 Plants flat and tiny, larger where favored by shade. Flw. yellow.
- M 15 Populus
 "Cottonwood"
 Growing along irrigation ditch; small trees but thrifty.
- M 16 Salix
 "White willow"; "tsu-be"(P).
 Along irrigation ditch.
 Stems used in basketry.
- M 17 Gramineae
 Along ditch bank, rather dwarf, plentiful.
- M 18 Omit

M 19 - M 25. 10 miles NE of Schurz, between Rawhide and Schurz, Mineral County; 5/19/37. Desert soil.

- M 19 Abronia villosa
 "Sand verbena", "sand puffs".

 Assoc. with Oerathera, delphinium and mentzelia.

 Bright rose-purple.

 Seed for ornamental.
- M 20 Mentzelia albicaulis
 "Gravy plant"; "ku-ha"(tribe not given).

 Plants unusually large; flw. yellow.
 "Ku-ha"(tribe not given), this term applied to various small seeds used as food which have been tossed into a basket with nearly dead coals to shuck the husks and subsequently pounded as for "Pinole" in California.

 Paiutes use as food, commonly called gravy plant.
- M 21 Astragalus pomonensis
 "Rattleweed", "loco weed"; "ta-da-gin-up"(P).
 Only one specimen found.
 Poisonous to stock.
- M 22 Pentstemon confertus var. aberrans?

 "Sanddune pentstemon".

 Unusually tall, robust stems, flws. pink-white blossoms;

 those near Winnemucca are more lavender.

 Seeds abundant and grows hardily in desert conditions.
- M 23 Tetradymia spinosa?

 "Spiny horse brush", "matchweed";

 Very stout in full bloom; flw. yellow. 5/20/37.

 At Owyhee in lambing time, this was considered responsible for wholesale sheep poisoning in 1936.
- M 24 Lycium
 "Buckberry"; "we-yumb"(S); "hoopoya"(P).

 Flw. white, stems at right angles to a running rootstock.
 Think this is wild jam bush of Indians, berries eaten raw
 or made into jam. 5/20/37.

 See M 258-frts.
- M 25 Stipa?
 "Mt. grass".

 Very tall slender grass, looks like Stipa, upper half 8 in.
 tall, total plant 24 in. tall.

M 26 - M 35. About 12 miles W of Schurz, in the mts., Mineral County; 5/20/37. El. 5,000 ft. Soil sandy, granite outcrops.

- M 26 Lewisia rediviva
 "Bitter root"; "kanigda"(tribe not given).
 Assoc. with astragalus, aster, ephedra and castilleja.
 Flw. large; root small, forked about size of radish.
 Roots cooked and eaten; not used as a medicine at Schurz.
- M 27 Pentstemon palmeri
 "Pink pentstemon".

 Among rocks by roadside.
 Plant 3-4 ft. tall; flw. deep pink with deeper center; lvs.
 gray-green; heavy tap root.
- M 28 Pentstemon kennedyi
 "Blue pentstemon".

 Plant 12-20 in. tall; erect tap root with small fibrous roots;

 flw. bright blue with deep blue center.
- M 29 Eriogonum nidularium
 "Bird's nest buckwheat".

 Assoc. with pentstemon, ephedra and balsamorhiza. 5/21/37.
 When dry, plant becomes red-brown ball close to ground.
- "Tsa-na-vi".
 Small shrub, not thorny, lvs. gray-green, flw. tubular and pink colored.
 Boil whole plant for stomach.
 (Informant: Alice Gildersleeve).
 Same as M 55.
- M 31 Salvia carnosa
 "Desert ramona", "little chia"; "tu-be-segi-nobe"(P).
 18-24 in. tall; pungent fragrance; flw. reddish blue; lvs.
 gray-green.
 Lvs. steeped for colds.
- M 32 Hermidium alipes
 "Four-o'clock"; "hewovey".

 Plants spreading; at height of season; exceptionally beautiful rose colored seed envelopes.

 Boil whole plant and apply to head for headache; grind root and apply as wash to sores of impetigo.
- M 33 Aster
 "Dwarf aster".

 About 3 in. high; flw. rays deep purple, disc yellow; grows in mats.
- M 34 Pinus monophylla
 "Single leaf pinyon", "pine nut"; "wapi"-(tree), "tuba"-(pine
 nuts)(S); "tubape"(P).

 Large trees which evidently bear well.

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- M 34 Pinus monophylla Cont'd.
 Valuable food. Seed ground and made into gruel used as a substitute for mother's milk. Wailaki tribe in California same use.
 Cones S. Coll.
- M 35 Eriogonum
 "Wild buckwheat".
 6-8 in. tall; flw. reddish brown; when gone to seed whole plant turns red and makes pretty leafless winter bouquets.

M 36 - M 40. 12 miles W of Schurz, Mineral County; 5/21/37. El. 6,000 ft. Above timber line, pinyon belt lower down, loose granite soil, many boulders and small fragments.

- M 36 Castilleja angustifolia
 "Indian paint brush".

 Flw. brilliant rose red bracts; stalks chiefly single but some occur in bunches where protected by rocks.
- M 37 Astragalus purshii
 "Purple loco".

 Plants small rather uniform in size; flw. purple.
 Poisonous to stock; habit forming; eaten in dry years, cattle continue to eat it, live for perhaps a year and then die.
- M 38 Erigeron,
 "Brass buttons".

 Quite dwarf, no ray flw. disc flw. bright yellow.
 Good for cramps; whole plant boiled.
- M 39 Eriogonum
 "Butterballs".
 Flw. pale yellow.
 No medicinal use at Schurz.
- M 40 Phlox
 "Phlox"; "sana-abu"(P).
 Plant grows in small flat mats; flw. white to deep pink.
 No use medicinally.
- "False dandelion".

 Near Walker Lake toward mountains, Mineral County; 5/21/37.

 El. about 4,000 ft. Desert soil, some rocks.

 Assoc. with Artemisia, Four-o'clocks.

 Plants average 6-7 in. high. Flw. bright yellow; lvs. graygreen.

 Boiled lvs. serve Indians as greens.

M 42 - M 43. S of Schurz, Mineral County. 5/21/37. El. 4,500 ft.

- M 42 Astragalus pomonensis
 "Rattleweed".

 Plants 7-8 in. high; pods highly inflated, rattle when dry,
 hence the name.
 Stock poisoning plant.
- M 43 Sisymbrium
 "Mustard"; "et-sa"(P).
 About 1 ft. high. Abundant.
 Seed formerly used for food, both ground and cooked in soup.

M 44 - M 50. 30 miles S.of Schurz, Dutch creek, Mineral County; 5/21/37. El. 4,000 ft. Wet loam soil, assoc. white willow and thistle poppy.

- M 44
 "White alyssum".
 Flw. white.
- M 45 Mentzelia laevicaulis?
 "Blazing star"; "ku-ha"(P).
 Hardy perennial, flw. large and brilliant yellow; seed vessels
 cornucopia shaped.
 Porridge was formerly made from seed; called "Gravy plant".
 Smaller one M. albicaulis, also used
- M 46 Lycium pallidum?
 "Buckberry", "desert thorn"; "we-yumb"(S); "hoopwe" also
 "kats-arra-buh"(P).
 Greenish shrub 3-4 ft. high; berries were green, turn red
 when ripe.
 Good to eat or dry for jam.
 (Informant R. Quartz).
 Frt. Coll.
- M 47 Eriogonum inflatum
 "Swollen stalk"; "gwuppa-ursa"(P).
 Plants 18-20 in. high; flw. tiny, yellow-brown.
- M 48 Chenopodium?
 "Pigweed", "lamb's quarter"; "leppé"(P).
 Not yet in bloom.
 Grind seed and cook.
- M 50 Artemisia tridentata
 "Sagebrush"; "sa-wa-bae"(S) & (P).
 3-4 ft. high; lvs. gray-green; pungent odor.
 Steep whole plant in hot water for cough.

M 51 - M 63. 2-3 miles from Schurz, Mineral County; 5/22/37.

- M 51 Grayia spinosa
 "Hop sage".
 Forage plant; low thorny shrub, in sandy soil.
- M 52 "Scarlet hop sage".
- M 53 Parosela polydenia
 "Citrus plant".

 Gray-green woody low plant; flw. bright lavender.
 Used for colds. (According to Richard Millen, this plant can furnish oil of orange).
- M 54 Shrub 3-4 ft. high; lvs. bright green.
- "Waxberry"; "tsanavi"-(red shrub)(P).

 Low woody shrub, small gray lvs.; tubular tiny dark magenta
 flw.

 Boil whole plant for stomach trouble.

 Same as M 30.
- M 56 Eriogonum nidularium
 "Bird's nest buckwheat".
 3-6 in. high; plant when dried becomes red; conspicuous on sandy soil.
- "White four-o'clock"; "hewovey"(P); "ma-goo-du-hoo"(S).

 Low plant, many running stems from single rootstock; flw.

 white; also called "Little hewovey".

 Impetigo plant--root is powdered and applied to sores. For headache boil whole plant and apply to top of head. For sores, dry root, grind fine, peel scab, and blow powder on sores.

 (S) Gray lvs. steep like tea for cold.
- M 58 Oryzopsis
 "Sand grass"; "wey"(P).

 About 6-8 in. high.
 Seed valuable for subsistence of Indians and also for forage.
 Small variety.
 Seed and S. Coll.
- M 59 Artemisia spinescens?

 "Bud sage"; "kube"(P).

 Very dwarf sage, woody tap root, heavy seeded, sage odor.

 Ripe buds used to make sage pillows for tourist sale.

 "Kube" (squirrel food), thus useful to Indians who eventually eat the squirrels.

- M 60 Cenothera
 "Desert primrose" or "Evening primrose"; (no Indian name given).
 In an old lake bed, coral and spongy rocks.
 Flw. white, turning pink.
 Seed for orn. and S. Coll.
- M 61 Mirebilis laevis / wishbone flower"; "little hewovey"(P).
 Old plants woody at base; flw. white.
 Root powdered, dried, put on sores to cure impetigo. Yellow
 dye made from the root.
- M 62 Lupinus nanus?
 "Dwarf lupine".
 Plants tiny, about 1 in. high; flw. deep blue and white, plentiful.
- M 63 Tamarix gallica L.

 "Tamarix", "African cedar".

 At Collins ranch.

 Shrub 6-8 ft. tall; flw. pink; said to have been brought in by old settlers, common around houses.

 Stiff stems used in basketry.

M 64 - M 74. Dutch creek, 30 miles S of Schurz, Mineral County; 5/22/37. El. 4,000 ft. Wet loam.

- M 64 Cirsium
 "Thistle"; "koi-de"(P).
 Not yet in bloom.
 (As used at hot springs at Rawhide Nevada. Informant Rosie
 Quartz). Young plants eaten; peel skin in hot water, then
 feed to patient, let him down in water; patient better
 right away.
- M 65 Cornus stolonifera?
 "Dogwood"; "at-sa-wish-tsi danabu"(P).
 Tall shrub, red stems, clusters of berries.
 Long shoots used to make second baskets for grown babies.
- M 66 Aquilegia truncata?
 "Columbine"; "honeysuckle"; "pahwhanahabu"-(flowers)(P).
- M 67 Thalictrum
 "Meadow rue".
 No flw. brought in.
- M 68 Mimulus (M. guttatus?)

 "Monkey flower"; "pah-what-na-abe"(P).

 Not yet in bloom, probably will have a yellow bloom.

 Lvs. cooked as greens; also used as medicine by Paiutes.

- M 69 Cardamine
 "Pah-munh"(P).
 Flws. white.
 Cooked for food by Paiutes.
- M 70 Radicula
 "Water cress"?; "putzida"(P).

 Very little of plant brought in. Leaf tastes like water cress.

 Eaten fresh.
- M 71 Trifolium
 "Bur clover"; "tonega"(P).
 Looks like bur clover; flw. too poor to identify.
 Forage? no other use by Indians.
- M 72 Aquilegia?
 "Columbine"?; "pah-wha-na-ha-bu"(P).
 Perhaps same as M 66; two informants differed but both agreed on name.
- M 73 Sisymbrium
 "Big mustard"; "tsa-buni", "tsa-bu-nu"(P).
 Tall much branched.
 Food, soak seed for soup.
 S. Coll.
- M 74 Epilobium??
 "False nettle"?; "oo-see-gwad-sebu"(P).
 Medicine for swollen legs, grind leaf and rub leg any place.

M 75 - M 79. About 15 miles N of Schurz on the way to Fallon; Mineral County; 5/23/57. Soil almost pure sand.

- M 75 Oryzopsis
 "Sand grass"; "wey"(P).
 Very tall compared to that around Schurz.
 Seed eaten extensively.
 S. Coll.
- M 76 Abronia villosa?
 "White sand verbena".
 Plentiful—very large plants.
- M 77 Gram.
 Tall grass grows with sand grass; 15-20 in. tall.
- M 78 Oenothera truncata?
 "Evening primrose".
 Not yet in bloom.
- M 79 Abronia
 "Pink sand verbena".
 Flw. bright pink; dwarf specimens.

M 80 - M 82. About 10 miles S of Fallon, along irrigation ditch, Churchill County; 5/23/37. Heavy clay soil.

M 80

"White alyssum".
Thrifty plant with odor common to honey plants; flw. white.

M 81 Asclepias
"Narrow leaf milkweed"; "wisha"-(string net for carrying)(P);
"wa-na"-(any net)(S)
3-4 ft. tall.
String made from this plant, also carrying nets for water bottles.

M 82 Chaenactis
"Old maid's pincushion".
Flw. white.

M 83 - M 87. Near Indian sub-agency, about 10 miles from Fallon, Churchill County; 5/24/37. El. 4,000 ft. Sandy loam soil.

M 83 Cleome lutea
"Bee plant".

Growing scatteringly along irrigation ditch. Flw. yellow.

Honey plant.

Seed used as food at Nixon.

M 84 Salix
"White willow"; "tsuba"(P).
About 10 ft. high, slender habit.
Paiute favorite basket material; old shoots used, bark
shredded from them is buried in manure to set color black,
unfadeable. This is for pattern; shoots for foundation.

M 85 Chenopodium?
"Goosefoot"?
Plentiful by roadside.

M 86 Cuscuta
"Dodder", "bind weed", "love vine".

Many colonies vigoriously climbing over neighboring small
plants. Parasite--eventually kills host.

"Wire grass".

In irrigation ditch; fibrous roots deep in mud. Not very large. A heavier or older wire grass was used by Paiute women for woven petticoats ribbing them with tule thread.

M 88 - M 89. 3 miles out of Fallon, Churchill County, by ditch; 5/24/37.

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- M 88 Asclepies speciosa?
 "Big milkweed".
 Sturdy plant.
 Stock poisoning, especially lambs.
- M 89 Atriplex
 "Saltbush".

 Very fine sharp thorn on this shrub.
- M 90
 5 miles NW of Fallon, Churchill County; 5/25/37. Soil pure sand.
 Assoc: saltbush, evening primrose.
 Shrub; 2-3 ft. high, not thorny. Plant infested with bug which surrounds buds and spins cotton about them eating seed.

M 91 - M 95. 20 miles from Fallon, Churchill County; 5/25/37. Shore of Lake Lahontan. Soil volcanic clay, plenty of lava rock.

- M 91 Heliotropium
 "White fiddle neck"; "tuba-manabe"(P).
 Flw. white tinged with lavender; similar to fiddle necks but
 with smooth stems.
 This is the white flowered small plant by Lake Lahontan, used
 as an emetic by the Indians. Boil plant and drink.
- M 92 Boraginaceae
 "White for-get-me-not".
 2-3 in. high.
 A distant blue relative of this furnished purple dye from root.
- M 93 Chylismia
 "Day primrose".
 Tall and branching; 18-24 in.; buds red and underside of petals pink.
- M 94 Thelypodium laciniata?
 "Squaw cabbage", "Prince's plume"; "hevupa"(P).

 Flw. yellow.

 Basal lvs. cooked and eaten.

 S. Coll.
- M 95
 "Vervain"?
 Six inch mats; tiny blue flw.
 Larger form of this used as an abortifacient and after child-birth by Indians of California. Tea made from root.

M 96 - M 100. 35 miles NW of Fallon, Churchill County; 5/25/37. Distinctly desert, but not clear sand, some rocks and loam.

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M 96 Malacothrix???
"False dandelion".
12-18 in. tall, flw. yellow.
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M 97 Lygodesmia ?
"Desert star".
Flw. pale straw color.

M 98 Glyptopleura marginata
"Rabbit guts", "peanut butter plants"; "kumi-segee"(P).
Stems reddish.
Lvs. eaten raw.

M 99
"Blue desert gilia".
Flw. bright blue.

M 100 Nama
"Pink gilia"???
Flw. bright rose pink making bright spots on desert floor.

M 101 - M 105. 40 miles NW from Fallon, Churchill County; 5/25/37. Semi-desert.

M 101 Oryzopsis

"Little sand grass".

Plant z size of big sand grass, not as extensively used as the larger form for Indian food.

Good forage plant. Considerable seed gathered by Walker River Indian Agency for reseeding.

M 102 Abronia
"Pink sand verbena".
Flw. deep pink.

M 103 Abronia villosa
"White sand verbena.
Flw. white.

M 104
Lvs. in basal rosette.

M 105 Caulanthus glaber
"Squaw cabbage".
3-4 ft. tall; among sagebrush; large basal lvs.
Used as food; lvs. cooked.
See M 94.
500d

M 106 - M 113. Near Carson Indian Agency, Stewart, Ormsby County; 5/26/37. Stewart dump.

- M 106 Arabis fendleri
 "Arabis", "rock cress".
 18-24 in. tall; flw. dark purple.
- M 107 Delphinium
 "Tall larkspur".

 Flw. dark blue; plants 24-30 in. tall.
 Stock poisoning plant.
- M 108 Prunus andersonii
 "Wild peach", "desert peach".
 Thorny low shrub; flw. pink.
- M 109 Lupinus laxiflorus?
 "Silver lupine".
 Tall; flw. blue-purple.
 Accused of stock poisoning.
- M 110 Oenothera brevipes
 "Dwarf evening primrose".

 Bears much seed which germinates well under dry conditions and frost.
- M 111 Crepis?
 Plant 10-18 in. tall.
- M 112 Balsamorhiza sagittata
 "Arrow leafed balsam root".

 Ray flw. yellow-orange color; resinous gum in roots.

 Seed and gum eaten; root steeped for medicine.
- M 113 Allium anceps
 "Wild garlic".
 3-4 flowering stems from one bulb, scimitar shaped lvs.,
 bulbs when ripe redden, strong garlic odor. Grow readily
 from seed.
 Eaten raw.
- M 114 Delphinium

 "Blue larkspur". About 12 miles from Schurz, Mineral County
 in Pinyon belt. This specimen taken from Wild Flower Show
 at Carson Indian Agency, Stewart, 5/29/37.

 Flw. pale sky blue.
 Pale blue larkspur is not considered by stockmen as poisonous
 as the dark one.

M 115 - M 116. Fallon Indian School exhibit at Carson Indian Agency wild flower show. Stewart; 5/29/37.

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- M 115 Rumex hymenosepalus? **Sand dock"; "tu-ha-konobe"(P), "wainatsu"(S).

 12-54 in. tall, reddish stem and root.

 For burns, root powdered and applied. Yellow dye obtained by removing bark and making tea.
- M 116 Pinus monophylla
 "Single leaf pinyon", "nut pine"; "tubape"(P), "wapi"(S).
 Trees 18-20 ft. high; seeds well. Nuts are staple article of
 Nevada Indian food and are sold in stores as delicacy.
 Food; nuts.
 Paiute for pine nuts is "tuba".
- M 117 Mimulus guttatus
 "Yellow mimulus"; "pah-what-na-abe"(P).

 Tall plant, grows in wet places; flw. yellow; this specimen obtained from Carson Indian Agency wild flower show at Stewart, 5/29/37, as part of Schurz exhibit.

 Lvs. used as medicine; method not given.

 See M 68.
- M 118 Allium anceps?

 "Wild garlic", "wild onion".

 Short stemmed umbel of rose purple flw. Specimen obtained as part of Schurz exhibit at Carson Indian Agency wild flower show at Stewart, 5/29/37. No bulbs with specimen.

 Bulbs and lvs. eaten by Indians.

Short, thick, tough-looking trees; 20 ft. high.

Bark used as a tea for heart trouble. Grind and apply to

sores. It is this bark that one wears in the hat so light
ning and thunder won't harm. These trees are valued by

Indians for wood and for cattle forage in winter; for posts

and fuel.

Note: Yellow moss, Evernia vulpina, which grows on this tree

is considered by Pete Snap of Fort McDermitt, Humboldt

County, Nevada, the best because it produces the most

lasting smoke to make yellow buckskin.

"Pine cone orchid"; "a'ne".

In collection at Nixon, Washoe County; 6/30/37.

Probably came from California; described as raising earth at foot of pine trees. Common near Hoopa, California.

Tea made from fresh or dry roots given for severe colds or pneumonia; also used this way in California.

Spec. in manila envelope.

Leptotaenia multifida "Mt. parsley"; "todsa"(P) & (S). On mountains near Nixon, Washoe County; 6/30/37. El. 4,500 Plants 2-3 ft. high; flw. yellow. For treating sores; cut fresh root and immediately scrape off oil which appears and apply to sore. For bad disease boil root and drink tea; this may be from dry root; also mix fresh root with root of sand dock (fresh), boil and drink. For distemper in horses: let him run a little, so he will breathe hard; put bits of todsa on hot charcoal; put a sack over horse's head and the todsa under his nose so he must inhale aromatic fumes. This will cause him to snort and cough out all the stuff that is in his head. Also, mix with Indian tobacco and smoke for cold; is then called "todsa-pahmo". Roots for H. Spec.

Indian recipe for acorn soup: Shell the acorns and grind them in a mortar; sift the meal, regrinding coarse particles; make a mattress of wild hay, spreading thin cloth over it; spread acorn meal on top of the cloth; tie more hay together in cloth and put on top of acorn meal; pour lukewarm water over the hay gradually raising the temperature to boiling point; this washes away the bitter taste; do this until meal turns pink; then hang it up in cloth to drain; when drained cook with hot water for soup. California Indians do this, substituting incense cedar twigs for hay.

Same acorns are used by Indians of Sherwood Valley, California, Pomo Tribe, and meal is made in same manner. In that locality is a blood red earth which is added to the meal, about 1/3 earth to 2/3 meal; it is mixed quite stiff and baked in round loaves for bread, in ashes, long baking; loaves wrapped in fern lvs.; turn a brilliant black and with lv. imprint on them look like lumps of fossil coal. Bread is exceptionally sweet and good for intestinal disorders.

Cereus greggii "Night-blooming cereus"; "Ho-o-kiwa". Seed pod mixed with deer grease to make salve.
