Gentlemen:

Since I have the responsibility "... to arrange the program for all meetings of the Society" (Section 1a, Constitution and By-Law of the ASPP) and you all also have a related responsibility this year, I thought it would be well to outline this year's schedule for arranging the annual meeting. I'll include what has been done and the tentative agenda.

- I. In October, 1975, H. Baker attended an AIBS meeting of program chairmen in Washington. He obtained preliminary plans from them and suggested some tentative times on a calendar for ASPP symposia, banquet, and business meeting.

- IX. 11 March, 1976. H. Baker plans to have the complete program to the printer for our Plant Physiology Supplement.

Dr. Briggs described the report of the Siegelman Committee to the Executive Committee and *announced* ~~submitted~~ the following resolutions approved by the Executive Committee.

- A. The Trustees recommend that the Society establish an ad hoc Publications Committee to make recommendations on publication policy and that the Executive Committee charge the Constitution and By-Laws Committee to propose a permanent Publication Committee to the Society.
- B. Whereas the present Editor-in-Chief of Plant Physiology, Dr. Martin Gibbs, has fulfilled duties as Editor-in-Chief as well as duties associated with being managing editor with other journals, we propose that the Society compensate Brandeis University for the release time of Dr. Martin Gibbs for his managing editor responsibilities for a three year period beginning 1 January, 1977. The monetary value of the release time will be negotiated annually.

- C. The Publication Committee and Treasurer are empowered to negotiate with Brandeis University concerning the level of compensation for the release time of Dr. Martin Gibbs.

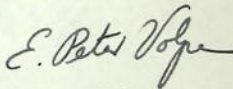

Dear John,

Thanks for the detailed letters on arrangements. Although we have discussed these items by phone, I suspect that you could use a written reference for sometime down the line, so here they are again:

Mixer: 4 speed bars sound appropriate. (To shift gears, how will people fix their mint juleps? I suppose that we shall be required to tell Clanton and the rest of them that the juleps are a casualty of the crowd.)

Partially empty bottles: Sounds strictly like a local problem. But restrain yourself until after the meeting. We may need your performance uncut by excess solvent.

Mixer price: Sounds inexpensive at \$1 plus 0.50 per drink, so it is ok by me.

Banquet salad: Although I personally prefer bleu cheese dressing, I am also aware of the intolerance/allergies/^{dis-}tastes of some people to it. Therefore I suggest Italian dressing as a more universally acceptable choice.

Menu: You have it the way I remember the group's choices.

Ticket deadline: When must we inform the caterers as to the number to expect? That should determine the timing. A deadline should be formally announced, ie Monday noon or evening. We may wish to order 5% excess places and make them available to the late arrivals and absent minded who make late requests.

Head table: I spoke with Winslow Briggs and he indicated the following people: Briggs, Black, Byerrum, Barber, Baker, Gibbs, Key and spouses/dates. Plan on 3.2 spouses. (40%). Since the 0.2 person could present a problem, perhaps one of us could inquire of each of them at the executive committee meeting as to their intentions for a guest. Please note: The Society should be picking up the tab for you and your guest, so we need to get together on the purchase of those two tickets.

Lectarn: Needed for Thomas Hodges, who will provide the evening's entertainment. (He is planning a lecture on a scientific topic.)

Microphone: one should suffice.

Slide projector: 35 mm, remote control and focus is ok with Hodges. (2x2 inch).

Grace/Invocation: Let Clanton do it. (He'd probably say, "Let's eat.")

Banquet price: \$9.00 seems appropriate.

Aside: John, you or I should inquire of AIBS as to the disposal of receipts in excess of expenses. Last year, AIBS handled collection and payment if I understood correctly, but we have not received an accounting of any sort. It makes me incline toward assuming responsibility for the bills so that we may benefit from any excess receipts built into our prices.

Coffee: I confirmed with AIBS that they are NOT willing to provide coffee, so we will arrange it ourselves. As soon as we know the room arrangements, we can make final decisions on locating serving places. It might be good to locate our headquarters room near the sessions, and some of the coffee near the HQ in order to attract visitors.

Placement service: This year we shall try the AIBS placement service rather than provide our own, so the HQ room need not be set up for interviews and appointment notices.

Coffee Service: (It seems I have gotten something out of place. I'll figure it out after the letter is typed.) We shall need tables for the paraphernalia, and should place them where they are both accessible and will not disrupt sessions.

Coffee cost: \$0.16 per cup is reasonable. We should make some attempt to tune the quantity to demand. Peak demand should likely occur on Monday morning and minimum demand on Thursday afternoon. I suspect that we should provide extra cups because I have noticed in the past that many people take partially filled cups, and thus exhaust the supply of clean cups before the coffee. I shall plan on \$500 to 900 for coffee.

Step & fetchit help: We shall need someone to monitor the Poster Sessions. They will need to be present for set-up and take-down and be able to provide masking tape, perhaps 2 surface tape, poster tacks, rubber cement, white glue, string, nails and hammer. I can probably supply all of these items. Duties will peak at the following times: 8-9am, 12-12:30, 1-2 pm and 5-5:30. There should be little poster activity at other times, so this person could do other jobs as second priority items.

Secretary: I do not now see a clear need for a local secretary. Pat Richter will come to the meeting and help on secretarial jobs. We shall need access to an electric typewriter on Monday, preferably with a carbon ribbon such as this. Also we shall need to reproduce a report on Executive Committee actions for the Wednesday business meeting (300 copies), so access to a print shop is desirable. Perhaps one is available at one of the Universities.

Martin Gibbs forwarded two requests to me:

1. Can the Editorial Board Meeting on Sunday evening be scheduled in a room near the AIBS Seafood festival? This is so that the meeting loses fewer attendees to the preceeding meal.

On March 26, 1976 Ralph Hardy, Treasurer of ASPP called you to discuss appropriate registration fees for the 1977 CSPP-ASPP meeting in Madison, Wisconsin (August 16-20). I took notes on Hardy's side of the conversation and understood that you agreed that students would have a significantly lower fee, that a late registration assessment would be made, and that the fees would be as follows:

Regular registration	\$25
Student registration	10
uniform late fee	5

The late fee was to be applied for registrations received after a date to be agreed upon later, probably July 18, 1977.

We need to work out an equitable means of apportioning the financial results of the meeting. Perhaps the way to share the profit or loss would be according to a ratio derived by asking each registrant to indicate his or her primary societal affiliation. Registrants giving ambiguous answers could be ignored in this ratio.

I plan to seek affirmation of the foregoing when I meet with the ASPP Executive Committee on May 30, 1976. To keep these ideas from becoming iron-clad, I will also seek authority for the Treasurer to modify them on his own judgement. That will allow you as CSPP Treasurer and Hardy or his successor to make adjustments as you two see fit.

There are other items that need coordinating. The most prominent is the publication of the program and abstracts.

I propose that the CSPP and ASPP abstracts be co-mingled into one program under the direction of your and our program directors. Clanton Black has that responsibility for ASPP.

I also propose that ASPP have the responsibility for production of the published program and abstracts. ASPP could then supply a previously agreed upon number of them to CSPP for their direct costs only.

If you wish, we could also mail them to your members for you, and share the cost in proportion to the numbers mailed. You would need to supply us with an appropriate mailing list. The costs for the members we have in common could be shared equally so that we could both reduce costs and avoid duplicate copies to them.

ASPP will distribute a preliminary program to its members in the form of a newsletter. It will contain Dates, Sessions, Session directors, meeting room, authors and report titles. It should be mailed "3rd class" about one month prior to the program and abstracts. After eliminating duplications, we should be able to provide it to CSPP members who are not ASPP members for a cost that ASPP could absorb. I shall seek authority to do this from our Executive Committee. It would mean that CSPP would need to provide me with a second mailing list.

Please consider the following time table for production of the program and abstracts.

February 1	Mail a call for papers (an example of ours for 1976 is enclosed)
April 18	Deadline for receipt of abstracts
May 1	Program committee meeting to assemble the program
May 9	Completed program delivered to Baker
May 20	Preprogram completed and delivered to printer
May 27	Program and Abstracts prepared and delivered to printer
May 27	Preprogram mailed to CSPP & ASPP members
July 1	Program and abstracts mailed to CSPP & ASPP members
August 16	Meeting registration
August 17-20	Meeting sessions (Wednesday through Saturday)

This autumn, we should review this schedule to see if any adjustments are appropriate.

If we use the same abstract form (and by implication, abstract recipient) we could combine the call for papers in February. This would require a CSPP mailing list in advance.

I expect $489 + 23$ abstracts for oral or poster presentations and another 90-100 abstracts for publication only. The expected distribution is 90% as oral and 10% as posters. The prediction is based on the following data:

If we presume that an average oral report session will have 12 reports, and an average poster session will have 8 reports, then we should expect 37 ± 2 oral report sessions and 6 ± 1 poster sessions. (Poster sessions may grow at the expense of oral report sessions as they gain in popularity).

ASPP usually has 2 symposia on its program as well. For this meeting, Joe Key, ASPP President in 1977, suggests that ASPP should generate 1 symposium and that CSPP generate another. In some years ASPP has held workshops as well, but perhaps 1977 will not be the year for them. The predicted total sessions is thus 45. Since there are 8 half days available, we should expect 6 simultaneous sessions each half day, except that we may wish to have 2 half days with fewer report sessions to lessen competition for the symposia.

Let me know your thoughts on these proposals. We still have plenty of time, but advance planning is rarely disadvantageous.

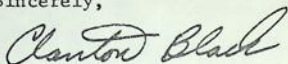

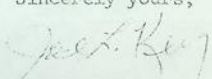

To keep these ideas from becoming iron-clad, I will also seek authority for the Treasurer to modify them on his own judgement. That will allow you as CSPP Treasurer and Hardy or his successor to make adjustments as you two see fit.

There are other items that need coordinating. The most prominent is the publication of the program and abstracts.

I propose that the CSPP and ASPP abstracts be co-mingled into one program under the direction of your and our program directors. Clanton Black has that responsibility for ASPP.

I also propose that ASPP have the responsibility for production of the published program and abstracts. ASPP could then supply a previously agreed upon number of them to CSPP for their direct costs only.

If you wish, we could also mail them to your members for you, and share the cost in proportion to the numbers mailed. You would need to supply us with an appropriate mailing list. The costs for the members we have in common could be shared equally so that we could both reduce costs and avoid duplicate copies to them.

ASPP will distribute a preliminary program to its members in the form of a newsletter. It will contain Dates, Sessions, Session directors, meeting room, authors and report titles. It should be mailed "3rd class" about one month prior to the program and abstracts. After eliminating duplications, we should be able to provide it to CSPP members who are not ASPP members for a cost that ASPP could absorb. I shall seek authority to do this from our Executive Committee. It would mean that CSPP would need to provide me with a second mailing list.

Please consider the following time table for production of the program and abstracts.

February 1	Mail a call for papers (an example of ours for 1976 is enclosed)
April 18	Deadline for receipt of abstracts
May 1	Program committee meeting to assemble the program
May 9	Completed program delivered to Baker
May 20	Preprogram completed and delivered to printer
May 27	Program and Abstracts prepared and delivered to printer
May 27	Preprogram mailed to CSPP & ASPP members
July 1	Program and abstracts mailed to CSPP & ASPP members
August 16	Meeting registration
August 17-20	Meeting sessions (Wednesday through Saturday)

This autumn, we should review this schedule to see if any adjustments are appropriate.

If we use the same abstract form (and by implication, abstract recipient) we could combine the call for papers in February. This would require a CSPP mailing list in advance.

I expect 489 ± 23 abstracts for oral or poster presentations and another 90-100 abstracts for publication only. The expected distribution is 90% as oral and 10% as posters. The prediction is based on the following data:

Abstracts for presentation

1975	391 + 95 published only
1976	469 + 91 published only
1977	489 ± 23 (least squares projection $\pm$ residual variance) + 100 abstracts only
1978	519 ± 23 + 100 abstracts only.

If we presume that an average oral report session will have 12 reports, and an average poster session will have 8 reports, then we should expect 37 ± 2 oral report sessions and 6 ± 1 poster sessions. (Poster sessions may grow at the expense of oral report sessions as they gain in popularity).

ASPP usually has 2 symposia on its program as well. For this meeting, Joe Key, ASPP President in 1977, suggests that ASPP should generate 1 symposium and that CSPP generate another. In some years ASPP has held workshops as well, but perhaps 1977 will not be the year for them. The predicted total sessions is thus 45. Since there are 8 half days available, we should expect 6 simultaneous sessions each half day, except that we may wish to have 2 half days with fewer report sessions to lessen competition for the symposia.

Let me know your thoughts on these proposals. We still have plenty of time, but advance planning is rarely disadvantageous.

This is in response to your letter of September 8, 1975. ASPP President Winslow Briggs asked me to follow up on the Memorandum-of-Agreement (copy enclosed) for the joint PGRWG - ASPP meeting in Virginia in 1978.

I have reviewed the memorandum with several people and we are generally well satisfied with it. There is one item which I would ask you to reconsider and that is item 9. I don't know what specific expenses will be involved, but it might be appropriate for ASPP and PGRWG to share common expenses in proportion to the number of their own registrants. It seems to me to be practically impossible to identify and negotiate all expense generating activities one year in advance, but I do think item 9 should qualify that all items to be shared should be mutually agreed to prior to the meeting.

If you agree with these suggestions, please consider a revision of item 9 to something like, "PGRWG and ASPP are expected to allocate necessary amounts of registration fees for general or specific meeting events as are mutually agreed to by the respective local arrangements chairmen before the obligations are assumed and prior to the actual meeting".

If you have a wording you prefer, let me have it. I must confess that I don't know of specific costs which might be involved, but I can assure you that ASPP will not be extravagant and that VPI is anxious to be our hosts. Under these conditions I think it is fair to ask you to consider removing the "one year in advance" clause from item 9.

I'm sending a copy of this to Charles Stutte in case he should get involved. Time will be pretty short between when you get this and the upcoming annual meeting of ASPP. I will be leaving for New Orleans on May 29,

MEMORANDUM - OF - AGREEMENT

Between the American Society of Plant Physiology and the Plant Growth Regulator Working Group

The ASPP and the PGRWG have tentatively agreed to a joint meeting of their membership in 1978 and being desirous of formalizing the arrangement do therefore agree to the following:

1. The joint meeting will be at the place and time specified by the ASPP for its regular 1978 annual meeting with the understanding that the duration will be set so as to encompass the reasonable needs of both organizations.
2. The ASPP will bear the main responsibility for local arrangements and will serve to reserve and equitably allocate space for meetings, food functions, and sleeping quarters for such joint and/or separate requirements as the ASPP and PGRWG may set forth.
3. The PGRWG agrees to appoint a Local Arrangements Committee whose chairman shall have the sole responsibility to make commitments for the PGRWG on matters relative to space, food functions, sleeping accommodations, etc.
4. The PGRWG agrees to appoint a Program Committee whose chairman shall have the sole responsibility to make commitments for the PGRWG on matters relative to program.
5. The ASPP agrees to provide for a system of reserving sleeping quarters for both ASPP and PGRWG members and to allow the PGRWG to distribute reservation materials to interested parties.
6. It is understood and agreed that the ASPP and PGRWG will be entitled to hold separate technical, general and business sessions and food functions as may be necessary to service its membership in attendance and that in addition jointly sponsored technical sessions, symposia, and social functions, will be encouraged with details to be worked out by the program representatives from the two organizations.
7. It is agreed that separate registrations of members of the two organizations may be performed prior to and during the meeting and that the two organizations will have responsibility for the independent collection of such fees as may be assessed.

8. It is agreed that the registration fee for the PGRWG will be the same as that for the ASPP and that the registration badges of each organization will be honored at all separate and joint technical sessions.
9. If the PGRWG is expected to allocate any of its registration fees for the support of general or specific meeting events such obligations will be negotiated one year in advance of the meeting with the PGRWG Local Arrangements Chairman.
10. Such publications as the two organizations would normally generate from or on behalf of an annual meeting will be generated at the discretion of the respective organizations with the proviso that any publications involving any jointly sponsored sessions will be mutually agreed to by the two organizations.
11. The organizations pledge that they will take all possible steps to hold an effective joint technical meeting.

I have read the proposed memorandum of agreement with PGRWG and have no problems with it except possibly with point 9: " If the PGRWG is expected to allocate any of its registration fees for the support of general or specific meeting events, such obligations will be negotiated one year in advance with the PGRWG Local Arrangements Chairman."

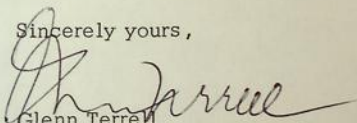

The American Physiological Society has for several years been exploring methods for improving communications with special interest groups and making its own activities of greater professional benefit to various areas of physiology. To achieve these objectives, multiple approaches have been developed. Now that the minutes of the executive committee meeting are finally in hand, let me give you official word as to the present status of things. You are authorized, as you know, to proceed with negotiations with Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University for our meetings to be held there starting the week of June 25, 1978. You are also authorized, as you know, to negotiate with Ohio State University for us to hold our meeting in August of 1979, with the American Society for Horticultural Science, at Ohio State. The success of the American Society of Physiologists depends heavily on contributions such as yours and the Society is extremely grateful. Your term officially expires at the end of September, but since I am going to be away for a bit, I am writing a little early.

Subject: Future meeting sites and related matters.

I will try to bring you up to date on developments concerning future meeting sites:

- Copy to Wash. State for 1978?*
- I) The wheels are in motion for our joint meeting with the Canadian Society of Plant Physiologists at the University of Wisconsin, Tuesday through Saturday August 16-20, 1977.
 - II) It is unfortunate that due to circumstance that came to light only late in April the only dates available at Virginia Polytechnic Institute are the weeks of June 25 and July 2, 1978. At this late date, our two most feasible alternatives are: to accept one of these two dates or elect to join the AIBS who will meet at the University of Georgia August 20 to 25. Unless the committee directs otherwise I will recommend that the Executive Committee approve our arrangement to meet jointly with the Plant Regulator Working Group at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, Blacksburg, West Virginia, June 25-June 30, 1978.
 - III) I have been in touch with Dr. Howard Rollins at Ohio State University and at this time it appears likely that we can meet at Ohio State with the ASHS in August 1979. Unless I hear contrary opinion from the committee I will recommend that the Executive Committee authorize us to proceed with negotiations on facilities and dates. Incidentally the AIBS will meet in Stillwater, Oklahoma on August 12-17 that year.
 - IV) We received a letter in March from Noe Higginbotham suggesting that we meet jointly in August 1980 with the Phytochemical Society of America at Washington State University in Pullman. They have handled groups as large as 12,000. I have requested a formal invitation and forwarded the attached outline of our requirements. The AIBS tentatively plans to meet in southern California at the University of California-Irvine (Santa Barbara, Riverside or Fresno are also possibilities at this writing). I should also mention that we have had in the past year two inquiries from hotels soliciting our interest in using their convention facilities (St. Petersburg Hilton for example has offered a package plan with costs at that time quoted as \$23.00 per day single or double occupancy; Atlanta

Sheraton-Biltmore, no quote). In these two cases it is not clear that the facilities are adequate for our needs, however this type of convention facility in major cities should perhaps be put under consideration for future meetings. Savings in added travel costs to out-of-the-way places may make up for higher costs for room and food. Other conference and convention facilities including Asilomar should be put under consideration.

Other societies that have been mentioned previously as candidates for joint meetings in the future include The American Botanical Society and the Latin American Section of the ASPP. Both have inquired about possible joint meetings. Other societies that might be contacted include Agronomy, Phytopath, Weed Science, Phytobiology, Developmental Biology. I am sure others should be included and if you have suggestions let me know.

- V) As the size of our meetings has grown (see attached data, and that circulated by Clanton Black) and we have begun to organize our own meetings more frequently, it seems essential that we establish clear guidelines for:

- 1) Our requirements in the way of physical facilities and the responsibilities of the local organizers.
- 2) Agreements between the ASPP and other societies meeting jointly with us.
- 3) Areas of responsibility for officers and special committees (site selection committee, etc.) involved in the process of scheduling and planning our meetings.

I am therefore enclosing a draft of a proposal concerning the first matter and will also ask that the other two topics be discussed at the Executive Committee meeting in June. Please convey criticisms or suggestions to me as soon as possible so that they can be incorporated in our final report.

- VI) Because of the increasing number of papers being submitted we will have to increase the duration of our meetings by at least one-half day starting in 1978.
- VII) I will ask the Executive Committee to discuss the suitable periods for scheduling our meetings. With the development of school year calendars where either one semester is completed before Christmas holidays or two quarters completed after New Years, we have some members with teaching obligations beginning in mid-August and others with obligations extending to mid-June. This severely limits the period in the summer when our meeting can be scheduled without excluding large blocks of our members. We have traditionally ruled out meeting in July. I will ask the Executive Committee to provide us with some guidelines for scheduling.

To: Prospective hosts for the American Society of Plant Physiologists

From: The Meeting Site Committee

The following statements outline the facilities required to successfully host a meeting of the American Society of Plant Physiologists:

1. Housing and dining accommodations for 1,000 people (30% family groups) available Sunday PM through Saturday AM of the week of the meetings.
2. a) Lecture rooms for as many as seven simultaneous sessions (seating capacity 100-200). *Req. of Local Reps. and Program Chairman*
 b) Lecture rooms for as many as three simultaneous symposia (seating capacity 300-500) available Monday AM through Friday PM. These rooms must have reasonable arrangements for slide projection and be capable of being fully darkened. They should each be equipped with 2 x 2 projectors with spare bulbs, a pointer and a timer for session chairman, and manned by a projectionist (familiarized with the equipment and the circumstances to be expected during the sessions). If possible they should be air conditioned, have rear entrances so people can come and go without disturbing the session unduly and be within 2 minutes walking distance of each other. *Capability for Sun 9.*
3. Space for poster sessions. Host institution should be able to provide a suitable open area for exhibiting poster demonstrations. This should be able to handle 15 simultaneous exhibits with free traffic flow. The area should be convenient to other simultaneous contributed sessions. Alternatively smaller areas adjacent to each of the contributed sessions may be provided to permit exhibits coordinated with the subject of the formal sessions.
4. Banquet space for 700 people.
5. Space for commercial exhibitors.
6. Space for placement service interviews.
7. Room for Executive Committee meeting on Sunday immediately prior to formal sessions.
8. Other desirable but unessential facilities:
 - a) Previewing room or rooms equipped with projectors for previewing slides.
 - b) Lounges or conference rooms suitable for informal sessions or conversations.

Institutions wishing to host the ASPP should be easily accessible from major cities on primary air routes. If travel requires transfer to regional or secondary air carriers or surface transportation, host institution should provide written assurance from these carriers that adequate transportation will be available during periods of peak travel.

As I remember the reactions of the Committee members to a discussion of Washington State as a possibility, they were rather positive. However, decisions about meeting places have to be made by vote of the Executive Committee rather than by presidential fiat - hence I am requesting a vote. I must mention that The Botanical Society of America has approached me with the suggestion that all American and Canadian Plant Societies meet together some place in the midwest that year. SUBJ: Calendar of Meetings and 1977 Annual AIBS Meeting

You may be aware of, or perhaps were copied on, a memorandum sent to the president of your society at this time last year (6 February 1975) from the AIBS Coordinator of Meetings, Mrs. Ann Kulback, regarding a "Calendar of Meetings" which the AIBS hoped to compile and distribute to the presidents of the various societies. In the memorandum Mrs. Kulback listed the AIBS Annual Meeting plans through 1980 and requested that the society president inform AIBS of his/her society's meeting plans through 1979. Thirty-six (36) responses to the 49 requests were received in our offices. However, of the 36 responses, only 3 societies could give us definite plans for 1975; only 9 societies could give us definite plans for 1976; 8 for 1977; three for 1978; and eight for 1979. Only three societies could give us their definite plans beyond 1979. Obviously, this response makes it difficult to compile any meaningful calendar of meetings. Nonetheless, we have now put together a calendar, based on both the response to last February's request and information submitted by the society with the listing of officers, which is enclosed for your review.

We would appreciate your reviewing the schedule of meetings, particularly as related to your society's meeting plans, and making any corrections and/or additions required. If we do not receive notifications of these changes from you within a reasonable period of time (27 February), we will assume that your society's listing appears correctly.

As I mentioned to many of you who were present at the 2-3 December 1975 meeting of Scientific Society Presidents, the AIBS is now selecting its meeting sites and dates five years in advance in order to allow sister societies to better coordinate their meeting plans and avoid

conflicts of scheduling. Conversely, in order to make adequate assessments of meeting facilities and ultimate site selection for the multiple-society AIBS Meetings, the Institute must be apprised of the number and sizes of the societies planning to meet under its auspices each year. Therefore, in addition to asking each of you to review the Calendar of Meetings, I am also requesting that you let us know, based on the following future AIBS meetings, your plans for meeting with us through 1981.

- 1977 - 21-26 August, Michigan State University, East Lansing
- 1978 - 20-25 August, University of Georgia, Athens
- 1979 - 12-17 August, Oklahoma State University, Stillwater
- 1980 - in August, University of California, Irvine (possibly Santa Barbara, Riverside, or Fresno)
- 1981 - August, considering Midwest, possibly University of Nebraska, Lincoln

We are especially concerned with your participation in the 28th Annual AIBS Meeting to be held at Michigan State University in 1977. The facilities at MSU are excellent and the campus could accommodate almost three meetings the size of the AIBS Meeting at one given time. To date, the following nine societies have indicated that they will be meeting with us in 1977:

American Microscopical Society
American Phytopathological Society
American Society of Plant Taxonomists
Biometric Society (ENAR)

Botanical Society of America
Ecological Society of America
Phi Sigma Biological Sciences
Honor Society
Torrey Botanical Club

Since we will be traveling to MSU within the next month to begin preliminary negotiations for the meeting, we want to extend an invitation once again to your society to join us in 1977. Perhaps you could ask the Secretary of your Society to inform us as soon as possible if you are planning to meet with AIBS in 1977. This information will be most helpful to us when making the first MSU site visit.

On behalf of the AIBS, I wish to thank you for your attention, cooperation, and assistance in this matter.
