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About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

I have the ^{second} ~~first~~ series to the end of the 3rd vol. any numbers after that will be of service to me. When you send them please to send the account with them, including also a small bill which I have owed you for some time, I think it is 6/0 or thereabouts. My son, who is now with me, has the first 3 or 4 parts of the second series of the Transactions of the Horticultural Society of London, which he would be glad to exchange for something else that would be more useful to him, if you think they would be of any use to you. He deserves his kind

regards to you.

I received your kind letter of the 29 of July, by your friend O. Gustav Schultze, who call'd on me with it, but he had, previously to his calling on me, suited himself for lodgings, and had got ~~an~~ introduction to the principal Lecturers in Oxford, so I should have been much pleased to have rendered him any assistance in my power.
