To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Dear Sir:

In response to your inquiry
I collected in Oregon & Washington during
the years 1882 & 1883 under the Northern Transcontinental
Survey.

In 1882 beginning about The Dalles —
then over the Simcoe Mountains to the Yakima
Region, and in that vicinity. In 1883
about Walla Walla, thence to Umatilla, the eastern
slope of the Cascade Mountains near Mt. Rainier, on
Snoqualmie Pass, Mt. Stewart and the Yakima
Region.

In 1885 I collected Larix Lyallii,
Picea breweriana, & Thuja mertensiana for the Jesup
Collection to Prof. Sargent, and at the time made
as full a botanical collection as the advanced
season permitted. I collected about Portland,
The Dalles, Mt. Stewart, Waldo, Grant's Pass
etc.
