Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

In accordance with your request, I send you specimens of Nos. 274, 272, 278, & 130, 159, 231 (= 418?). Dr. Vasey kindly allowed me to reserve specimens for myself, in cases where the material was in sufficient abundance, so that I am able to send you these half dozen. In the list which you sent me some time ago, as a basis for writing my "Notes", you mention Euphorbia obovata, from Neutral Strip, as having no number. This is no doubt 266. The number having been misplaced. All the other numbers I can not account for. I do not seem to have any specimens of them. I shall give a few of the names, as far as I am reasonably certain of their correctness, from my notes:
