The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Dear Mr. Dixon

I am working hard at
my address, but cannot get
it done by Monday. I was
never warned of this practice
of printing or supplying journals
with orders prior to delivery;

very busy people, I put off

I am especially sorry in the

Case of the Athenaeum, as I
have commented freely on the
treatment Mr Darwin's Scientific
work has received at ~~her~~ ^{its} hands,
(not to talk of his Theories). This
exposes me to the suspicion of
withholding the address out of
liberalism or other ill-feelings
towards the journal or its
contributors, (which I need not
assure you I do not entertain)
and will cheer willingly
to complete it in time.

I am over head & ears in

official correspondence just-
now, and building new
plant houses & altering the
heating apparatus all over the
establishment, - & the month's
number of the Hort. Magazine
must be finished before I
leave for Norwich. I have
had but 4 hours in bed for
several nights. I hate
doing things in a hurry, & want
every minute I can get. With
the hours of delivery of the Seeds
will give it - me.
