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About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

My dear Sir

I have received £2. 14. 8½
from you, through the kind-
ness of Mr. Hammers & you
state £2. 8. 3½ to have been
sent in books & that Dr.
Greville has paid me £4. 14.

I do not for a moment
doubt the correctness of
this statement: but I do
not recollect at this time
ever receiving any such sum
from Dr. Greville: & when
inquiring of Dr. Greville he
tells me that he has never
paid me anything for this,
& that no money transac-
tion whatever has taken
place between you & him.
I therefore again take this

liberty of begging you to write
a few lines to me & to Dr
Greville simply to explain
where this transaction
took place & on what
account the money was
paid. I refer to your
letters for a long time back
& I can find no reference
to any such payment.
