To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

My dear Sir

We gathered no *Jungermannia* worth your notice except what Mr Francis calls polyanthos, the variety of barbata, & pallescens in a remarkably fine state. The weather was too dry for the Fleath *Jungermannia*. *J. acuta* however was abundant as well as *J. pulcherrima*.

I ought to have told you that I brought away with me from Yarmouth one of your microscopes, which I now return. The three Engravings of *Jungermannia* I hope will give

you as much satisfaction as they
have done me. I expect to find one
or two more finished at Bungay
this afternoon.

Pray return the Vasculum to me
at Halesworth the first ~~opportunity~~ con-
venient opportunity. It is Mr Francis'
& must be sent back to him with plants.

your family & believe me
