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About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.



Dear Wilfrid:

You will have returned from Sweden by the time this letter reaches you, and I write in acknowledgment of yours of 21 September in which I learn for the first time that you "are most rashly doing a 'popular' well illustrated biography of Linnaeus." What a man!

I am afraid that everything that we have is pretty serious stuff by your standards, and I am confident that all of the memorabilia and local color material (such as self-portrait sketches, etc.) remain in Sweden. Ours is a collection of the printed record, and virtually nothing of manuscript and such material.


Certainly his original notebooks on his Lappland Resa do have sketches that he made and I think that there are one or two there of himself. It is a pity that Dr. Uggla is not now living, for this was an area in which he was particularly well informed. I am confident that you spent some time with Carl-Otto von Sydow Uggla's successor in title, and perhaps among the better informed persons on Swedish Linnaeana. Magnus Fries is another whom you surely must have met and who is even better informed than von Sydow. I am afraid that you missed the master of them all, Dr. Birger Strandell, from whom we acquired our collection and who is Honorary Gurator of it. He and Mrs. Strandell have been here since the 19th of September, and will remain until the 10th of October.

We have some 1,800 items of biographical character on and about Linnaeus. They are in many languages. A great many of them are very well illustrated, including reproductions of notebook sketches. Surely an even better collection was available to you at Uppsala, and from them you could in a day or two pick out the kinds of illustration that you seek. The articles in the Svensk Linné-Sällskapets Arsskrift are full of Linnaeana, including a very large number of anecdotes and biographical tidbits that have not been used in most of the published biographies. I think I found more supporting information from the hundreds of articles in those year books than in any other one source. It is most unfortunate that they are in Swedish, because the very brief and almost cryptic English extractions or synopsis give nothing of the real material in each. Too, the introductions to the delightful short publications by Felix Bryk contain a great deal of supporting and quasi-anecdotal material that has not found its way into the published biographies. These include the background stories as to why many of the lesser known publications of Linnaeus were written and published in the first Telmark Fredbärj has written commentaries in the Swedish translations of the LLinnaean dissertations (the Valda afhandlingar series) that likewise give the stories and significance of those works. I believe 51 of them have now been published and the series continues.

If there are any items on which we can specifically help you, particularly by way of sending you photographs of illustrations or xeroxes of text, please let me know and we will do all we can for you. It is good to hear from you and to learn that your versatility now makes you a biographer of Linnaeus.

Dear Mr. Blunt,

The so called portrait of Gerard passed through Christies on December 15th - 16th 1966, lot 431. Both of my colleagues who saw it think that it was almost certainly a Thanet School fake produced by a well-known faker of early English portraits called Shaw. The identification was is certainly wrong; the only authentic portrait of Gerard is an engraving by Rogers of 1598 which was published in the Herbal. We have here a portrait which was in the past called Gerard and which has just been catalogued by Roy Strong in his monumental catalogue of sixteenth century portraits. He has therefore gone into the question fairly carefully. I think you can take it that the portrait on offer to you is wrong in every way.

Dear Wilfrid:

Enclosed is a letter I received from Alister Mathews, written in response to my inquiry concerning the provenance and authenticity of the John Gerard oil painting. John Brindle feels that this is about as reliable a piece of information as one can have for a painting of the sixteenth century.

From the copy of my letter to Mathews, enclosed herewith, you will note that I have asked him to send the painting to you for appraisal. If you think it is worth the price (£150/-) you are authorized to purchase it and for him to send the bill direct to us.

John is of the opinion that the painting requires restoration and that it should be done before it is shipped over here. Would you be willing to take this on as a commission from us, selecting the person or firm to do the restoring, making the arrangements, and checking the final results, will bill for same to be sent direct to us? It was John's thought that such restoration would cost in the vicinity of 150/-. This is something that would have to be determined after the painting had been examined. If the cost is no more than that, and it is decided that we should buy the painting, you are authorized to proceed to have it done. If the charges for the restoration would be more than 150/-, then perhaps we should be advised as to what the estimate comes to.

If, all of this matter about restoring is considered by you not to be necessary at this time, or it is something that you do not want to attend to, then we would have the painting sent directly here. Since it is not so terribly large nor heavy, I think it would be better for it to come by air freight or some equivalent form of air transportation. If you need an advance to cover the cost of this, let me know how much I should send you.

I do appreciate your suggestions in this matter, and I would be most relieved if you could accept the commission to handle this chore for us.

On page 176 (footnote) of my Bot. Ill. I give a totally inaccurate mention of a botanical manuscript in the Sir John Soane's Museum, London. I chanced to examine it the other day and find that it in fact gives a list of about 3600 plants growing in the Botanic Garden in Padua. It was written by Giuseppe Bonato in 1809 for the Empress Josephine, and came from her Malmaison Lib-There are about 160 pages of names of plants, alphabetical in arrangement. It begins with 14 Acacias: A. aculeaticarpa, farnesiana, felicina, glandulosa, glauca, horrida, Houstoni, etc. It has two pretty calligraphic title-pages. Nomina ex Wildenowio desumpta.

I mention it to you because I gather it has never been published and I wondered whether you would like me to have it microfilmed, and possibly proper photos of the title-pages and one page of text. Should you wish it, I will get it put in hand. But it may be of no interest whatever.

I hope all goes well with you. I shall be sending you in the fairly near future a copy of Omar, which comes out on Oct 21. Isfahan is out on Oct 25; they have made a very pretty book of it, and the colour plates are superb.

I have been trying to get Mr. Graham Stuart Thomas (Briar Cottage) Fairfield Lane, West End, Woking, Surrey) to sell us some of his botanical and horticultural paintings. You probably know that he has illustrated such works as:

The Old Shrub Roses (1955)
Colour in the Winter Garden (1957)
Shrub Roses of Modeld (1962)
Climbing Roses Old and w (1965)

He is Garden's Advisor to the National Trust, Manager of Sunnyngdale Nurseries, and obviously an ardent horticulturist of note.

I enclose a xerox copy of his reply to my request concerning our possibly purchasing some of his paintings. It is clear that it is going to take more than any further correspondence from me to get any of them here, although his letter is very friendly and he did send back a completed biographical data sheet. He says nothing about a photograph of himself, although I did ask for one.

I wonder if this is a point where you might be able to help us? I do not know what happens to the original of his paintings after the books have been published and I would be glad to purchase a pair suitable for hanging side by side from any of his works. Possibly one should work through the publisher. Perhaps a personal visit to him would help matters.

My target date for work by him is the Spring of 1969, in preparation for our big quintennial exhibition of contemporary botanical art and illustration to be opened that Autumn, and for which we would have a good catalogue this time, which would go to press early in the summer. That seems a long way off at this moment, but time passes all too quickly and I would rather follow up on this now than to wait until later. I would like your advise on what you think is the most effective way to get the elesired result. Please feel free to make any contacts that you think might be helpful. I am not going to answer his letter for the moment, preferring to wait until I have your recommendation or word of any action by you.

Enclosed you will find a complete set of proofs (except for the facsimiles of the Vatican manuscript) of the Strabo. I have made corrections to agree with those on the set now returned to Enschedé.

I have advised them that I have sent you a set to go over for final reading, such changes as may be necessary, and approval. They are to hold the proof for three days and then proceed with production. In the event that you find the need to delay getting your o.k. to them I suggest that you send a cable in care of Mr. Peter Engel at Enschedé advising him that you have corrections and that you will post them by a specified date.

I have checked Raef's contributions against the set of proof that he went over earlier and on which he made corrections. The present proof has incorporated all of his corrections except as I made one or two notations.

I have checked the proof of your contribution against the corrections you made earlier and find, so far as I can determine, that every comection has been incorporated. I had sent in earlier the correction concerning Roger Latham's London address, but for some reason it was not picked up.

We are promised 100 advanced copies of the book delivered by air in Pittsburgh in time for our Annual Staff-Advisory Committee dinner on 6 May. At the same time, I will ask them to send four advance copies to you, asking that you send two to Raef if he is in the country.

Incidentally, as concerns any corrections you have to send to Enschedé, you need send only those pages of proof on which corrections would appear. I think it would help clarify matters if, in the rare event that there are no corrections from you, you send Mr. Engel a cable advising him that you have read and approved the <u>Hortulus</u> proof. Wewwill reimburse you for all expenses

incurred in connection with the <u>Hortulus</u> work and for which reimbursement has not as yet been requested.

I am off now to give a lecture at Colonial Williamsburg and to participate in four meetings at the Fairchild Tropical Garden in Miami. As soon as I get back I will be deeply emersed in the third volume of HUNTIA papers and in Bibliographia Huntiana.

Since our return from holiday in Venezuela and Surinam I have read your letters of 7, 11, and 15 January together with that of Raef Rayne's of 15 January, all dealing with proofs of the Hortulus. All of the points that you have made have, I believe, been incorporated in the proof. Raef sent directly to Enschede his corrected proofs of the transcription and translation of the Hortulus (pp. 21-68). Unfortunately, Raef sent his corrections only to the printer and I have no way of knowing whether or not they were taken care of. I am asking Mr. Engel to send me a photocopy of this so that in a revised proof I can check each item.

With this letter I enclose a xerox copy of the corrected proof as sent to Enschedé (less the pages of Raef's part). It looks very messy, but I am sure that it will all contribute to a satisfactory production. If you have further notations to be considered in the work, please let me have them.

I have received proofs of the illustrations alone, but none with the overprint of them on the text. In fact, I do not think that this will be possible to send the proof, since it would tie up the presses and we must rely on Enschedé following our lay out instructions precisely. Henry Evans is not going to be particularly happy about this, for I know that he wanted to see the superimposed product in proof form.

All is well here and now that there is a lull in the Walahfrid study, I am directing attentions between <u>Bibliographia</u> <u>Huntiana</u> and the third volume of Huntia.

Dear Wilfrid:

The enclosed copy of my letter to Mr. Peter Engel of Enschedé in Haarlem is self-explanatory. It tells you, that sofar as I can tell at the moment, they are now provided with all of the copy and materials for the Hortulus. I regret the long delay on my part in getting all of this to him, but it did require a solid three days of concentration and only this past week have I been able to really commandeer same. As you will note, I am asking that the work be delivered here by 15 April 1966.

There are one or two depattures in my latest plan for the book that were done without consultation with anyone, but for which I can see no objection. The principal one is the addition (partly in lieu of any full color frontispiece) of the first page of the 1510 and the 1512 editions, together with the inclusion of the colophons of each. That for the 1512 edition is particularly attractive. I also took the liberty of adding the title-page of the Lambert edition of 1924, since it was a wood carving and in two colors. I would have included those of intermediate editions but they are terribly mundane, unattractive and relatively discreditable pieces of typographic work. Inasmuch as the Näf edition continues to be in print, and is covered by copyright, I did not think it wise to have an illustration from it.

You will note that your suggestions on the locations of the illustrations have been followed. The dummy sent to the printer bore on their respective pages an outline of the illustrations in the exact size and placement desired for each. They followed the idea that you expressed for the improvement of same. You will also note that I requested that text be in black ink throughout.

Although I returned the proofs of the sections sent to you, you must recognize that they are only galley proofs and that any corrections that you and Raef have will be made in the page proofs. You will note also in my letter to Mr. Engel that I have requested that you receive a complete set of all proofs, and that it be sent to you directly and not via Pittsburgh.

Could you advise me whether or not you expect to be out of England on any protracted excursions between now and mid-March? I ask this with the thought in mind that if anything serious came up that required a personal examination of any part of the production of the Hortulus at the Enschedé plant, it would be useful to know whether or not you would be willing to fly to Amsterdam and be my representative in such an emergency. It may well prove to be that after the page proofs have been returned there may be fine points that need to be checked and possibly modified in cooperation with the printer, the sort of thing that can be done so easily in person but which is very difficult to convey by correspondence. Should I know that you might be available, and would feel equal to doing it, I might want to call on you for the service. John Gilmour can easily arrange for travel tickets through his agent who sends the bills direct to us. I am not actually anticipating the need for all of this, but I like to be prepared in the event it should arise.

Dear Wilfrid:

Eight more proofs have been received from Henry Evans, and they show a marked improvement over the preceding ones. Nonetheless, I feel I just still impress on him the need to lengthen the vertical axis of future representation and to add floral inflorescences. The two that he did of the Madonna lily (one in bud and one in full flower) are exceptions of this and are most satisfactory. The others are quite exceptable but just a little short of what you and I would have had if we could have stood over his shoulder.

Thank you for your recent note giving me the accounting of expenses for travel in Pittsburgh and to London, and for reporting Raef Payne's expenses. Because our banks charge the equivalent of 10 bob to issue a check in a foreign currency. I combined Raef's expenses twith yours and thought it would not be too difficult for you to write him a check in the amount of \$3.70. I do hope this is not too much of an inconvenience for you. The check for the two sums should reach you in about two weeks' time.

You may be sure that I will have proofs sent to you as soon as received from the printer, but if memory serves me correctly I asked him to send you one set direct from Holland. Conceivably you may receive a set before I do. When laying out the title-page with the printer I neglected to provide for Henry Evans' name on it as the illustrator. This I will correct when the proofs come to hand and I can better visualize how it should appear.

Am still seeing HUNTIA through the press, and know now that it will be half again as large a volume as was the first volume. Despite its lateness in getting out. I am determined that the third volume will come out late in April of next year, thus reverting to April as our month for publication of the yearbook. Please know that we would be highly honored for any article that you would care to write for HUNTIA. This is no idle comment, since I would very much like to publish a paper by you on some aspect of botania illustration

and it would seem most appropriate to include one in the third volume. A manuscript for same would have to be in our hands by mid-January at latest, and I would like to know by mid-December that it was coming and about how long it would be. While the £3 per page honorarium is not very much, it does represent our appreciation for the consideration and effort extended. Do let me know about this.

Dear Wilfrid:

Thank you for yours of 2 June, re. the notations by Professor Carl Morrison.

It has been my plan to take your manuscript to the printer for setting into composition when I go. Under the circumstances, I think the best thing for yourto do is to send me your annotated or corrected draft so that I can have it retyped here. The printer will expect it to be in finished typescript and pressmark. I have checked at the Carnegie Library and at the University of Pittsburgh Library last evening for the Manitius and fail to find it in either library. Perhaps you can get it hy writing to the BM and have the information to be added when we meet, even though it has to be added in the final typescript.

As concerns the sequence of the five sections of your paper, I much prefer personally that the sources for your <u>life of Walahford</u> immediately follow the biographical account itself. As I recall it, it was Rickett who thought that this should go at the end and I bowed to his wisdom and bibliographical experience. If number 5 was a list of sources for all of the other four sections, then its position as the last section would be logical. Since you too prefer it to follow the biographical account, so it will be!

There was one point with regard to the abbreviation of sources of information, and as cited in your paper. Here, I am referring to literature citations, and not the material given on pages 19-20. At present you have given only abbreviations of titles, in parenthesis at the ends of paragraphs (eg. last paragraph on page 14, page 15 etc.). Since the number of references is few, I prefer to spell them out (eg. Codex latinus monacensis). The terse citation suggested by your nephew is, I think, much too cryptic for the average reader of HUNTIA to comprehend. If you agree, perhaps you would write in full in your copy the citations now given in abbreviated form on pages 15 and 15 (excluding the last on page 15 which your nephew has provided).

When I explained to Henry that our budget did not allow us to commission him to make twice the number of drawings that would be required if we reversed the images on the two pages, he saw the point and is now planning to use reversed images on facing pages. He is also going to make some drawings for the early part of the poem, and for the last page of the poem, since those are of pages that are not about particular plants.

I feel very happy with the entire arrangement and know that the illustration phase is in good hands. He tells me that he will have prints of about half the drawings ready in time for me to bring to England with me.

Since last writing you I have had to change my departure time for London and it now stands that I will be arriving there on Thursday morning, July 1st. I have written John asking him if hts Pam can get me hotel accommodations for the night of the 3rd and 4th. Regardless of where I may be staying, perhaps it would be well to set the afternoon of Friday the 3rd as one when we could get together. I have no commitments for any time that day, although I may be tied up that evening. An alternative would be the afternoon of Thursday, the 2nd. Otherwise, I want to retrieve the preliminary drawing he did for our 1965 Christmas Card. I would be most embarrassed to write and ask her about this if he was actually alive. Perhaps there are one or more societies that could be contacted of which he would have been a member and would have known had he passed away.

Dear Milfrid:

The long silence over the production of Strabo is merely that I have been so busy that I have not had an opportunity to get it together and complete the bibliographical studies on the various editions. When in London and on the continent I checked holdings in other centers and have notes to use for this section of the bool. At the moment I am doing my best to find time to edit manuscripts for the second volume of HUNTIA. This, too, is going to be late in getting out and for the simple reason that I have not had the time to give to it. We will do well if we can get the second volume of HUNTIA into the mails by the last of May.

I have just checked with Mrs. Ryave, our bookkeeper, to see whether or not the checks went out to you and John reimbursing you for the atrocious duties charged you for the Alcoa calendars. I should have checked sconer, for I find that the Foreign Department of the Mellon bank has not issued the checks until we got after them today. They should be out very shortly and come to youbby air. The whole trouble here was that the person in Alcoa to whom Mr. Hunt gave the order misunderstood his directions and instead of sending one copy each to eight members of the Committee, send eight copies to each member of the committee! You and John were interpretated by your customs officials as being importers of a commercial production. The whole thing was a confusion and compounding of errors and I ddeply regret the long period that has elapsed since you put out money for something that you didn't want in the first place. It will not happen again.

Yes, John has written me, as has his secretary, about his period of depression. It is disturbing, particularly so since we had thought that he was going to get back on to a more steady path. I wish that I could believe that the treatment he is receiving was the right one or was going to be permanently beneficial. Looking at it from the outside, I am sure that if I was in his postition I would seek the couch treatment rather than the shock treatment. However, this is something that others have no valid opinions on.

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
