The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

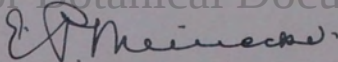

Dear Dr. Studhalter:

You have gone to a lot of trouble to read over the past correspondence and records of the S.M.S. and it must have been quite a chore. I am sorry that the records are not in better shape, but you see I had almost nothing to go on when I started. Beals left no records whatever, and all I got from Roberts was a few letters and a stack of very incompletely kept cards with names on them of all past members and subscribers, many of whom had long since resigned, died, or otherwise disappeared, so I started from scratch and by extensive correspondence with nearly every one on the records made out a temporary card index of members and subscribers, taking their word at face value because there was no proof to the contrary. As far as I know they were all honest and obliging with their information. Some even paid for issues of the Bryologist which they had been getting in spite of having resigned months or years before - (which accounts for some names on my books for which there are no cards.) Roberts left no financial statement whatever except for a printer's bill of about \$270, as I remember.

The discrepancy in the accounts is partly taken care of by the enclosed notices of bank charges, amounting to \$2.20. Apparently I have failed to enter similar charges, some of them perhaps on foreign checks, for which I have no receipts. In addition, when I moved to Seattle in the fall, a number of post office money orders followed me here and the authorities here would not honor them at their face value but deducted from 15¢ to 50¢ each according to the amount of the order (because they were not ~~cash~~ cashed at the town to which they were made out. The balance, that I can recall, was \$3.00 for postage and envelopes (I used stamped envelopes), \$2.00 of which should be balanced against my name instead of payment of dues for 1935. I hope that about straightens the accounts out!

I have repeatedly sent Dr. Jennings a list of those who are in good standing and should be receiving the Bryologist, with the request that he drop the others. This he has consistently ignored so that I get letters from people of whom I have never heard requesting that the subscription be discontinued, or else the issues are returned as refused by the addressee. Dr. Jennings is afraid of hurting someone's feelings, I think, and perhaps it is a wise policy. It does complicate book keeping, however.

The cards you have on which there is no account of standing are purely for the records in case the name comes up. Some are of resigned individuals, others of those who have died, and some are merely names gleaned from the records in various ways for whom a record might be useful.

You will find that your work will be greatly simplified if you discourage subscription agencies from handling any accounts. They deal indirectly with the people and are always getting things mixed up. I sent out notices to subscribers and to the agencies last year that in the future all business would be handled directly, and that if agencies must be used they would get no commission from the sale of the subscription. They used to collect 10-15%, which we could not readily spare.

Pardon the paper and the condition of this note. I am rushed, as usual.

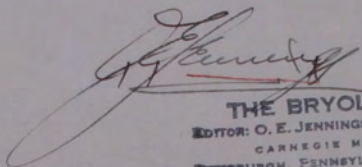

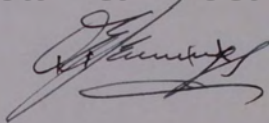
Here is some more general S.M.S. miscellany.---

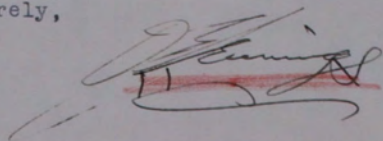

Dear Doctor Elmore:--

Your postal of May 23, 1937, and the specimen came promptly. Being at the time very busy I put the specimen in a press to await a little leisure. I did not get back to it soon as I should.

I have carefully studied the specimen. You think it is Anchusa officinalis and I do not blame you for that. At first I thought it was. A careful comparison with authentic specimens from Europe shows I think that it decidedly is not. A. officinalis is rough hirsute, very rough to the touch are all the surfaces of the leaves. While the specimen you send is lanate, very soft velvety to the touch. Comparison with herbarium specimens indicates your specimen to be Anchusa lanata Desf. now assigned to Cynoglossum cheirifolium L. In the specimen you send the flower clusters do not seem to be well developed but all the evidence I find indicates the conclusion I give. If this helps you any I am pleased.
