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About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

IN MEMORIAM

These "Brief Historical Sketches" are naturally and sadly dedicated to our classmate whose idea it was that they would be interesting to us as we met at our Fortieth Reunion, and whose persistence even during his final illness succeeded in getting them together for our enjoyment.

Dr. Abraham Krasker, professor of education at Boston University, and director of two large camps in Maine, died on January 8th, in the midst of a still extremely useful career.

Starting after college as a high school teacher of science in Quincy, Mass., he pioneered in the field of visual education before entering the college field. At Boston University, where he received his doctorate, his greatest contribution was in the field of teacher training and in the promotion of visual education.

With his wife and son Richard he directed Indian Acres Boys' Camp and Forest Acres Girls' Camp in Fryeburg, Maine. These camps claim "over thirty-five years of nation-wide prestige", with winter headquarters in Boston and an office in New York City.

He also operated an adult camp on Lake Keekar in Lovell, Maine, and was instrumental in organizing the Aggasiz Village Camp for underprivileged boys, working with the late Harry Burroughs of the Burroughs Newsboys' Foundation.

According to the Boston Traveler, Abe founded the Rockwood Park School for Girls in Jamaica Plain, and built the Elizabeth Peabody House Camp for underprivileged children many years ago.

It is good to realize that many hours of his last weeks on earth were spent in the company of his friends in the Class of 1922, most of whom had answered his letters and thanked him for the project he was unable to see completed.
