The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

Dear Dr. Degener,

Thank you for your letter 317/58 of May 5 and for the books which arrived shortly afterwards. They are grand and a most welcome addition to our library. I have arranged for some pandanus mats to be sent to my office and as soon as they arrive I will pack them up and consign them to you. It may be a little while before they are ready but you shall have them as soon as I can manage it.

2. Your offer of co-authorship in a Flora of Tonga is very tempting but I should have to ask Doctors Yuncker and Hurlimann for their permission before I said yes. I am now busy mounting the specimens they left here and am adding specimens as fast as I can - but the herbarium is really founded on the work they did and I could only use their identifications with their permission. I am writing to them.

3. Can you give me a rough idea of the cost of printing and publishing a Flora of Tonga, illustrated? The collecting that Yuncker and Hurlimann did was really very extensive, embracing the whole group, and I think that there is sufficient here for a fairly complete Flora. I should like to take advantage of your very generous offer and will approach the Tonga Government as soon as you can give me an idea of what it would cost.


Dear Dr. Degener:

Dear Drs. Degener.

I wish to thank you for your kindness to forward to me the additions to the Flora Hawaiensis. They have reached me safely at my CSIRO address. I have recently moved to the Australian National University and for the time being my new address is as printed above. However, I shall be going to New Guinea in November to travel around from place to place for 3 years, studying indigenous farming, shifting cultivation, the extent of cash crops etc. The vegetation dynamics are still fascinating me. My address in New Guinea will be c/o New Guinea Research Unit, Australian National University, Port Moresby.

I am just assuming that your health and happiness is as perfect as when I last had good fortune to be your guest. I have taken great delight in the visit to your place and wish that I could do something for you both in return. Please let me know. I have good news from Prof. Kaul and from the Hurlimanns (just a week ago). I wish I could visit you again some time. Maybe, if the University studies require investigations to be made in Hawaii.
