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#### About the Institute

The Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, a research division of Carnegie Mellon University, specializes in the history of botany and all aspects of plant science and serves the international scientific community through research and documentation. To this end, the Institute acquires and maintains authoritative collections of books, plant images, manuscripts, portraits and data files, and provides publications and other modes of information service. The Institute meets the reference needs of botanists, biologists, historians, conservationists, librarians, bibliographers and the public at large, especially those concerned with any aspect of the North American flora.

Hunt Institute was dedicated in 1961 as the Rachel McMasters Miller Hunt Botanical Library, an international center for bibliographical research and service in the interests of botany and horticulture, as well as a center for the study of all aspects of the history of the plant sciences. By 1971 the Library's activities had so diversified that the name was changed to Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Growth in collections and research projects led to the establishment of four programmatic departments: Archives, Art, Bibliography and the Library.

A few weeks ago the Hawaii State Senate passed a resolution commending Dr. Otto Degener for his many contributions and unceasing efforts to preserve Hawaii's nearly 900 species of threatened and endangered native plants. For 50 of his 80 years, Otto Degener's has been a voice of the wilderness of unrestrained development overspreading and engulfing Hawaii's unique island ecosystem, its uniqueness the result of the isolated evolution of a great diversity of plants over many thousands of years. He has fearlessly and energetically worked to educate and influence government officials, developers, journalists, conservationists, and the general public, not to a dreamy-eyed return to an imagined sylvan or pastoral ideal, but to their own little-realized self-interest in saving a portion of the Islands' various native habitats from the bulldozer, feral mammals, introduced game animals, and alien weeds. Long before the term "endangered species" entered the popular lexicon. Otto Degener was sounding the trumpet, calling attention to the high number of Hawaiian plant species destined to imminent extinction. Today the proportion of threatened and endangered native plants species on U. S. territory is nowhere higher than in Hawaii.

Working side by side with Otto has been Dr. Isa Irmgard Degener, his wife and a botanist in her own right. While Otto spent his early years just after World War I in the Bronx, a his own student of Nathaniel Lord Britton assigned to identify plants collected by Per Axel Rydberg in the Rockies and by Dr. Britton's lulu associates in the West Indies, and later a student of Elmer Merrill, the Garden's third director, studying more than 50,000 specimens of Hawaiian plants sent for safekeeping, Isa grew up in her native Germany, graduating magna cum laude from Berlin University just after World War II. She served for a time as botanical assistant to Dr. Sleumer, presently our Krukoff curator. After Otto and Isa married in 1953, the Degeners took up their studies on site in Hawaii, supported by a long series of NSF grants. With the possible exception of Dr. B. A. Krukoff, who was presented the Garden's Distinguished Service Award in 1970, no one living has had a longer professional association with the Garden than Otto Degener. The Degeners' Flora Hawaiiensis is a monument to their dedication to the sagacity in the complex floristic botany of the Islands. The family Degeneraciae and genus Degeneria, named for their discoverers, are tributes to their energy as botanical explorers and their discerning eye in sampling the diversity of plants in the Pacific

Given the Degeners' unswerving messianic zeal for their work and the depth of their commitment, it seems appropriate to quote the biblical reference illuminating the fly sheet in one of the volumes of Flora Hawaiiensis:

And I brought you into a plentiful country, To eat the fruit thereof and the goodness thereof; But when ye entered, ye defiled my land, And made mine heritage an abomination.

#### Drs. Otto and Isa Degener

The following was published in the Honolulu Advertiser: "Botanists ought to be considered the most important people in the world for they are specialists in plant life, without which no animal life, including man himself, could exist. Actually, you don't hear much about them. The atom smashers get the play . . . "That was written in March 1958. The occasion was publication of the fifth volume of Flora Hawaiiensis or New Illustrated Flora of the Hawaiian Islands, co-authored by Drs. Otto and Isa Degener. The article went on to speak of botanists combining adventure with scholarship, and plant explorers writing about their adventures as well as their scientific findings. The Degeners have done this in exemplary fashion.

While Flora Hawaiiensis focuses on the flora of the Hawaiian Islands, Dr. Otto Degener's roots run deep into the Botanical Garden. Born in East Orange, New Jersey, in 1899, this noted botanist, for whom the plant family Degeneriaceae is named, has made the Garden's Herbarium the main depository of his field collections. And since taking up residence in Hawaii in 1922, it has been to the Garden he has returned time and again these many years for study while enriching our Herbarium holdings.

Dr. Isa Irmgard Degener was born in Berlin, Germany, and in 1949 received her doctorate from the University of Berlin. The Degeners were married in 1953 and, as Otto Degener puts it, "have been teammates ever since."

While pressing onward with publication of additional volumes of Flora Hawaiiensis and other works, the Drs. Degener, as our Collaborators in Hawaiian Botany, have directed many of their efforts toward documentation and preservation of Hawaii's magnificent wildlife resources. In a resolution of commendation adopted March 22, 1979, the Hawaii Senate paid tribute to their "lifetime perseverance in relating humankind to the natural environment upon which we ultimately depend for survival as a species."

It is in recognition of their continuing contributions, through botany, to botanical science in general and to The New York Botanical Garden in particular, that the Board of Managers presents to Drs. Otto and Isa Degener the Distinguished Service Award.

COMMENDING DR. OTTO DEGENER.

WHEREAS, Dr. Degener stood alone for most of the past fifty years as a voice in the wilderness, steadily appealing year after year for recognition of Hawaii's botanical wonders and conservation of their habitats, having no peer in his unshakeable, deep commitment to Hawaii's natural environment; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Degener has been tireless in his forthright, fearless efforts to educate and influence government officials, developers, journalists, other conservationists, and the general public to seek protection of native habitats from the bulldozer, feral mammals, introduced game, and introduced weeds that naturalize in our native forests; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Degener has influenced and inspired many people in Hawaii and throughout the world with his deep love of fauna, flora, and the land which is Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, all of us who care about the natural beauty and special qualities of these islands that set Hawaii apart in the work of nature, owe a bottom-line debt of gratitude to Dr. Degener for his lifetime perseverance in relating humankind to the natural environment upon which we ultimately depend for survival as a species; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Degener, who will be eighty this year, continues to demonstrate his remarkable stamina, good humor, and zest to get on with research and writing projects--and initiate new ones; and

WHEREAS, this outstanding service of Dr. Otto Degener in fostering the preservation of our community's precious wildlife resources is worthy of our recognition and commendation; and

WHEREAS, it is particularly fitting that his five and onehalf decades of generous service to Hawaii be extolled by the State Legislature; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1979, that it commend Dr. Otto Degener for his contribution to the preservation and enhancement of Hawaii's wildlife resources; and
